


Georgia State University is committed to providing educational, personal, and community development that will enhance the quality of the student- athlete experience.

Panther Promise is an extension of the services provided by PASS - - Program for Academic Support Services. Through PASS and the Athletic Learning Lab, Georgia State's student-athlete development staff arranges tutoring in a wide range of courses, offers academic advisement and provides access to computers and a convenient place to study.

Other components of Panther Promise are the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program and the Panther Den, which offers a variety of services in conjunction with the University's Counseling Center to address the challenges that face the Georgia State University student-athlete.



GEORGIA STATE UNIVERSITY is one of the nation's leading urban research universities, educating Georgia's most diverse population of students. With more than 28,000 full-time students, it is the second largest institution in the University System of Georgia. Students arrive from every county in Georgia, every state in the nation and nearly 150 countries.

Georgia State University offers educational opportunities at both the graduate and undergraduate levels by blending the best of theoretical and applied inquiry, scholarly and professional pursuits, and scientific and artistic expression. 



Georgia State Continues Success in CAA

fter a long relationship with the Atlantic Sun
Conference (formerly the Trans America Athletic
Conference), the Panthers made a dramatic move to the
Colonial Athletic Association for the 2005-06 season one year earlier than planned.

Under the guidance of Director of Athletics Mary McElroy, a former NCAA student-athlete herself, Georgia State is making huge strides in its new league, capturing four league championships and battling for others in several sports.

Over the past nine years, Georgia State has accumulated 24 conference championships, 26 NCAA bids, 22 conference Coaches of the Year, 21 conference Players of the Year and nine All-Americans.

Last year, State's student-athletes hit the books hard as well with 108 earning the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award and six earning ESPN The Magazine Academic all-district recognition. Seven Panthers were named CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year for their sport. The 2007-08 season saw State's teams combine for 43 all-conference picks.

Volleyball led things off in the fall with its first winning record since 2003. The Panthers remained in contention for a CAA postseason tournament berth and finished tied for seventh at the conclusion of the regular season.

Men's and women's cross country finished third in their league championship meets, while the women's soccer team just missed the league tournament by one game.

The basketball teams battled well during the winter in one of the most competitive leagues in the country. The men's team upset preseason favorite George Mason at the Sports Arena while the women defeated Delaware on the road.

Women's tennis saw three players record 20+ win seasons as the Panthers won a CAA Tournament match and advanced to the semifinals for the second straight season.

Track & Field: Had 11 entrants earn NCAA Region bids. The women placed 4th at the CAA Championship while the 4x100m and 4x400m teams were conference champions. Mark Steeds and Jacob English also won individual titles.

M Golf: Made an NCAA Regional for the 9th time in 10 years. Individually, Joel Sjoholm finished 13th at the NCAA Championships.


Baseball: Senior infielder Jean-Michel Rochon-Salvas earned back-to-back CAA Scholar-Athlete of the Year awards.




