THE KICKOFF

Georgia State looks to conclude its encore season on a positive note as the Panthers host Campbell for Senior Day Saturday at 2 p.m. at the Georgia Dome.

The Panthers (2-8) have suffered three straight heart-breaking defeats, including last Saturday's 30-23 loss at West Alabama, in which GSU had moved inside the UWA 20-yard line in the final minute with a chance for the tying score before fumbling to end the game. Before that, the Panthers had dropped consecutive overtime games in which they had led in the fourth quarter. The three straight losses have been by a combined 13 points.

Campbell (6-4) had a school-record five-game winning streak snapped with a 34-31 loss at Valparaiso Saturday. Like Georgia State, Campbell is a relative newcomer to football after resurrecting a long-dormant program in 2008. This year's six victories are the most in the Camels' modern era.

Georgia State and Campbell are meeting for the second straight year. On Sept. 25, 2010, in the first road game in GSU history, the Panthers defeated Campbell, 24-21, on Iain Vance's 30-yard field goal with one second left. Vance's field goal capped a 10-play, 63-yard drive after the Camels had tied the game with a touchdown with 3:14 to play. (See Page 8 for full recap).

The two teams have played one common opponent this season in Old Dominion, which defeated Georgia State, 40-17 on Sept. 10, after knocking off Campbell, 41-14, one week earlier.

SENIOR SENDOFF

The Georgia State program will say farewell to 20 seniors who are playing their final home game at the Georgia Dome.

Of the 20, seven have been part of the program since the Panthers began practice in 2009 (Ben Jacoby, Brandon Jones, Michael Hall, Deron Jordan, Robert Truitt, Kevin Thompson, Cliff Ibarrondo), while the remaining 13 arrived prior to the 2010 season.

SPORTS COMMUNICATIONS

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The group of 20 includes four starters on the offensive line, two starters on the defensive line, and two starting linebackers, plus starters at tight end and safety.

Four seniors previously played at FBS schools (Joseph Gilbert, Clyde Yandell, Ben Jacoby and Bailey Woods) and one at an FCS program (Jocquez Fears), while others arrived from a variety of places, from Mars Hill College in North Carolina to Navarro College in Texas to Palomar College in Calif.

HILL SETS RECORDS

Quarterback Kelton Hill displayed his multi-talents when he set the Georgia State single-game rushing record while collecting a career-high in passing yards against West Alabama (Nov. 12).

The sophomore from Douglasville, Ga., rushed for 152 yards on 19 carries to surpass Donald Russell's record of 136 yards, set earlier this season against South Alabama. Included in his total was a 53-yard touchdown that is the longest scoring run in school history. He also scored on a two-yard run to tie the game in the fourth quarter.

Hill also set career highs with 19 completions for 228 yards, including a 33-yard TD pass to Albert Wilson. He totalled 380 yards of total offense.

ANOTHER 1,000-YARD RECEIVER

Albert Wilson had another productive outing against West Alabama (Nov. 12) with a career-high eight catches for 120 yards, his third 100-yard game of the season, including a 33-yard touchdown catch.

Wilson became the second Panther in as many weeks to reach the 1,000-yard mark for career receiving yards. He is Georgia State's career leader with 1,058 receiving yards on 55 catches. *That's an average of 19.2 yards per catch.* His eight touchdown receptions are also the school record, while his 55 catches rank second only to Danny Williams.

JAKE MAKING PLAYS

Outside linebacker Jake Muasau is closing his senior season with a bang. Over his last three games, Muasau has collected 22 tackles, five tackles for loss, including three sacks, and two interceptions.

Saturday against West Alabama, he had six tackles, two tackles for loss and an interception.

The senior with the famous mane earned honorable mention recognition as National Linebacker Performer of the Week by the CFPA for his play against UTSA (Oct. 29), when he collected a career-high 10 tackles with two sacks and an interception.

Muasau also made a huge defensive play in the Oct. 22 win over South Alabama when, on the game's final play in the second overtime, he pressured the quarterback into an errant throw that resulted in Mark Hogan's game-ending interception.

MR. CONSISTENCY

Georgia State has played 21 games in its history, and sophomore Danny Williams has caught at least one pass in each one of them.

Against St. Francis (Nov. 5), the sophomore from Orlando, Fla., became the first Panther to reach 1,000 yards receiving in his career. He now has 80 receptions--the GSU career record--for 1,042 yards and seven touchdowns.

Against Murray State (Oct. 8), Williams caught nine passes for 151 yards to set the Georgia State record for receiving yards in a game, which has since been surpassed by Albert Wilson. He hauled in a 43-yard touchdown pass and also had a 49-yard reception, and he earned honorable mention recognition for Wide Receiver Performer of the Week from the College Football Performance Awards.

Williams led GSU in receptions (54), receiving yards (649) and touchdown catches (5) during the inaugural season of 2010. This season, he has 26 catches for 393 yards and two scores.

He also owns the Panthers' single-game record for receptions (11 vs. Old Dominion in 2010). He has four of the seven 100-yard games in GSU history.

MORE EXPLOSIVE PLAYS FOR WILSON

Over a three-game stretch (South Alabama, UTSA, St. Francis), sophomore wide receiver Albert Wilson hooked up with quarterback Kelton Hill for four passes of 50 yards or more.

After hauling in scoring passes of 78 yards and 64 yards against South Alabama, the sophomore from Port St. Lucie, Fla., added a 54-yard touchdown pass at UTSA. Those are the three longest scoring passes in GSU history. He then had a 50-yard catch against St. Francis.

On the season, Wilson has seven receptions of more than 45 yards, four of them for touchdowns, and he averages 21.2 yards per catch. He ranks eighth in the nation in punt returns (11.9), 10th in receiving yards per game (95.0) and 17th in all-purpose yards (146.4).

HALL, JENKINS ARE GSU'S FIRST ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT SELECTIONS

Georgia State linebacker Michael Hall and noseguard Kalan Jenkins were named Thursday to the Capital One CoSIDA Academic All-District football team, becoming the first Panther football players to earn this honor.

Hall and Jenkins are now eligible for the Capital One Academic All-America football team.

Hall is a senior on the football field but a graduate student in the classroom after earning his degree in August in Exercise Science, graduating with a 3.41 grade point average. The Dublin, Ga., native is the Panthers' third-leading tackler with 52, including four tackles for loss and a forced fumble.

Jenkins, a senior from Midlothian, Texas, is a two-year starter on the GSU defensive line, moving to noseguard this season after playing defensive end during the Panthers' inaugural season. He maintains a 3.94 grade point average in Exercise Science.

Hall and Jenkins give Georgia State a total of seven Academic All-District selections so far this year, which equals GSU's high for one academic year, with winter and spring sports still to follow. The football honorees join women's soccer standouts Sarah Bennett, Bri Cagle and Jewel Evans, Vincent Foermer in men's soccer, and Vineece Verdun in volleyball.

MATT ON THE MARK

True freshman punter Matt Hubbard has steadily improved since taking over the punting duties. He now ranks 15th in the nation, averaging 42.0 yards per punt.

Against UTSA (Oct. 29), he averaged 47.0 yards on five punts, including a 64-yard punt that is the longest in Georgia State history. The Peachtree City, Ga., native earned honorable mention recognition as National Punter Performer of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards (CFPA).

Hubbard has been particularly sharp over the last five games, averaging 45.6 yards on 18 punts, with a net of 36.5

PANTHERS USE RECORDS, DEFENSE TO KNOCK OFF SOUTH ALABAMA

Georgia State used record-setting performances by running back Donald Russell and wide receiver Albert Wilson and clutch play by its defense to outlast South Alabama, 27-20, in two overtimes Oct. 22 at the Georgia Dome.

Russell set GSU records with 136 yards rushing on 20 carries, and his eighth touchdown of the season came on an eight-yard scamper in the second overtime for the game-winning score. In his first start at quarterback, Kelton Hill went 12-for-15 for 209 yards and threw touchdown passes of 78 and 64 yards to Wilson, who finished with a school-record 175 yards receiving. The GSU defense came up with five takeaways, including Mark Hogan's game-ending interception in overtime.

DEFENSE MAKES A STAND

Georgia State's defense turned in its best game of the season in the win over South Alabama. The GSU defense set the tone with a goal-line stand on the game's opening possession. After a 71-yard kickoff return, the Jaguars had a first-and-goal at the one-yard line, but the Panther defense stoned the run four straight plays, with Christo Bilukidi stopping Kendall Houston on fourth down for a one-yard loss.

In the first overtime, GSU forced a missed field goal. After GSU opened the second overtime with a touchdown, South Alabama moved to a first down at the three, but on second-and-goal, Jake Muasau pressured quarterback C.J. Bennett into an errant throw that was tipped in the end zone and corralled by Mark Hogan for the gameending interception.

The defense set a GSU record with five takeaways during the game, including

DEJA VU ALL OVER AGAIN FOR HOGAN

Mark Hogan grabbed the interception and went running - he thought he had sealed a victory over South Alabama (Oct. 22). Hogan had intercepted South Alabama quarterback C.J. Bennett at the goal line on what appeared to be the final play of regulation with Georgia State holding a 20-13 lead. But South Alabama was flagged for illegal motion - a dead ball foul because the Jaguars were never set and the clock had stopped on the previous play - so the down was replayed, and South Alabama scored the game-tying touchdown to force OT.

After GSU took a 27-20 lead in the second overtime, South Alabama faced second and goal at the two-yard line, needing a touchdown to force another session. Outside linebacker Jake Muasau pressured Bennett, who threw towards the end zone. The ball was batted in the air and came down in the hands of none other than . . . Mark Hogan.

RUNNING GAME GETS GOING

Georgia State's running game has showed improvement over the last five games, averaging 201 yards per game in that stretch.

In the overtime win over South Alabama (Oct. 22), GSU rushed 43 times for 220 yards, including a school-record 136 yards by running back Donald Russell.

Against South Carolina State (Oct. 15), the Panthers rushed for 244 yards on 45 attempts, both highs in Georgia State's history. The previous rushing record was 232 yards last season vs. Savannah State. Most of the damage was done by the trio of quarterback Kelton Hill (94 yards), Russell (85) and running back Travis Evans (62), who combined for 241 of the 244 yards.

The Panthers added 219 yards rushing on just 31 carries against West Alabama (Nov. 12), including a school-record 152 yards by quarterback Kelton Hill.

RUSSELL BOOSTS RUNNING GAME

Running back Donald Russell became the first 100-yard rusher in Georgia State history with 136 yards on 20 attempts (a GSU record) in the Panthers' 27-20 overtime win over South Alabama (Oct. 22). Most importantly, he scored the game-winning touchdown with an eight-yard run in the second extra session. In fact, in the two overtime periods, Russell carried the ball on every GSU play, gaining 43 yards on five carries.

The junior transfer from Kentucky is the team's leading rusher with 519 yards on 109 carries, an average of 4.8 yards per carry.

Russell has shown a penchant for finding the end zone, scoring at least one touchdown in every game he played this season until leaving the St. Francis game with an injury. He leads the team with nine touchdowns, which is also the GSU career record.

In the season opener against Clark Atlanta, Russell scored touchdowns of 20 yards and then three yards the first two times he touched the ball in a GSU uniform.

He also scored twice against Murray State (10-8-11) on runs of four and nine yards, the latter play coming after he took a direct snap in a wildcat formation.

AMAZING ALBERT

Georgia State wide receiver Albert Wilson was named FCS Independent Player of the Week by College Sports Madness after his record-setting performance in the Panthers' 27-20 victory over South Alabama in two overtimes. He also earned honorable mention recognition as CFPA National Wide Receiver Performer of the Week.

The sophomore from Port St. Lucie, Fla., set a new Georgia State record for receiving yards in a game with 175 yards on just five catches.

In the first quarter, Wilson grabbed screen pass and raced 78 yards for the Panthers' first touchdown and the longest play from scrimmage in Georgia State history. In the second quarter, he got behind the defense and hauled in a 64-yard touchdown pass from Kelton Hill, good for the

Earlier this season, Wilson had 146 receiving yards on six catches Sept. 17 at No. 16/17 Jacksonville State. He had a 54-yard catch and then a 53-yard reception late in the game on which he appeared headed for the end zone but pulled up with a hamstring injury.

In the season-opening win over Clark Atlanta, he was the game's leading receiver with three catches for 85 yards, including TD catches of 30 and 48 yards. He also returned three punts for 34 yards and had a 10-yard run. Against Old Dominion, he totalled a school-record 229 all-purpose yards, including four catches for 53 yards and seven punt returns for 85 yards.

Wilson was named to the 2011 CFPA Kick Returner Preseason Watch List and the preseason All-Independent team by Phil Steele's College Football Preview.

ANOTHER POSITION, NO PROBLEM FOR JOHN

In the first five games of the 2011 season, sophomore Ulrick John started at three different positions on the offensive line.

John, from Hinesville, Ga., entered the season as the Panthers' backup left tackle. He started the season opener at left tackle in place of injured Clyde Yandell.

Two games later, after Georgia State's top two centers were injured, John started at center against Houston. Then against Murray State, the 6-8, 290-pounder started at left guard while Joseph Gilbert served a one-game suspension.

UNDER THE GUNN

Cornerback D'Mario Gunn achieved a first in Georgia State history as he became the first Panther to grab two interceptions in a game against Murray State. Both picks came deep in Georgia State territory. The junior from Hampton, Ga., intercepted Casey Brockman's first pass of the game at the GSU 12, and then in the second quarter Gunn grabbed another interception at the Panthers' 11-yard line.

Gunn earned honorable mention recognition for Defensive Back Performer of the Week from the College Football Performance Awards.

GSU VS. FBS

Georgia State's program is in its infancy, but the Panthers have not shied away from tough competition, playing an FBS team in each of its first two seasons. In last year's inaugural season, Georgia State played at defending national champion and 10th-ranked Alabama, and this year the Panthers travelled to Houston.

Georgia State recently announced an FBS game for next season as the Panthers will visit Tennessee on Sept. 8, 2012.

JENKINS IS SEMIFINALIST FOR NATIONAL SCHOLAR ATHLETE AWARDS

Georgia State defensive lineman Kalan Jenkins is one of 127 candidates for the 2011 National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athlete Awards, presented by Fidelity Investments*. The 127 nominees also comprise the list of semifinalists for the 2011 William V. Campbell Trophy, endowed by HealthSouth, which recognizes an individual as the absolute best scholar-athlete in the nation.

A senior from Midlothian, Texas, Jenkins is the Panthers' starting noseguard this season after playing defensive end during GSU's inaugural season of 2010. The 6-5, 275-pounder is actually playing his fourth different position since arriving at GSU 18 months ago from Navarro College in Corsicana, Texas.

In the classroom, Jenkins maintains a grade point average of 3.94, and the exercise science major plans to pursue physical therapy in graduate school.

Nominated by their schools, which are limited to one nominee each, candidates for the awards must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first team player or significant contributor, and have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship.

SKELTON MAKES BIG PLAYS

Safety Demazio Skelton turned in a big play in each of Georgia State's first two games. In the opener against Clark Atlanta, the junior from Myrtle Beach, S.C., grabbed an interception off a tipped pass and returned it 26 yards to the CAU 20, setting up Georgia State's first touchdown.

Against Old Dominion, Skelton scooped up a fumble in the end zone and raced 93 yards before he was brought down at the seven-yard line. That is the third-longest play of any kind in GSU history, behind kickoff returns of 97 and 96 yards.

He added another big play at West Alabama as he blocked a punt for a safety, the first in Georgia State history.

BILUKIDI NOTICED BY CFL

Georgia State defensive lineman Christo Bilukidi is rated one of the top 15 prospects for the 2012 CFL Canadian Draft, according to a list published by the CFL Scouting Bureau.

Bilukidi is a 6-5, 290-pound senior from Ottawa, Ontario. He is playing his second season at Georgia State after transferring from Eastern Arizona J.C.

Tabbed to the preseason All-Independent team by Phil Steele's 2011 College Football Preview, he led Georgia State's inaugural team in sacks with five, along with seven tackles for loss, two forced fumbles and 51 tackles in 2010.

Born in Angola, Bilukidi lived in France and Brazil before settling in Canada. He played just one year of high school football at St. Patrick's in Ottawa.

The 2012 CFL Draft will be held next May and will include six rounds.

ANOTHER IMPRESSIVE OPENER

The kickoff of the encore season of Georgia State football produced exactly the same result as the kickoff of GSU's inaugural season: a 41-7 Georgia State victory before a tremendous crowd of 26,273 at the Georgia Dome.

And for the second straight year, a quarterback playing his first collegiate game under center turned in an impressive performance. Bo Schlechter passed for 196 yards and three touchdowns against Clark Atlanta while directing a GSU offense that rolled up 41 points and did not commit a turnover. Also making a strong debut was running back Donald Russell, a transfer from Kentucky who rushed for a team-high 56 yards and two touchdowns in his first game in a GSU uniform. Sophomore Albert Wilson caught touchdown passes of 30 and 48 yards. Safety Demazio Skelton and outside linebacker Robert Ferguson grabbed interceptions to set up touchdowns, and the GSU defense limited Clark Atlanta to a school-record 247 yards of total offense.

BENVENUTO EARNS NATIONAL AWARD

True freshman Christian Benvenuto had large shoes to fill, replacing third-team All-American Iain Vance as the Georgia State placekicker, and the rookie did not disappoint. Benvenuto was named National Placekicker Performer of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards (CFPA), sharing the honor with Cody Sandlin of UT-Martin.

On his first collegiate field goal try, Benvenuto booted a 44-yard field goal on GSU's first possession. He added a 45-yard field goal and was a perfect 4-for-4 on extra points. The Palm Coast, Fla., native also handled kickoff duties

Benvenuto was one of three Panthers honored by the CFPA. Quarterback Bo Schlechter was an honorable mention selection as Quarterback Performer of the Week, and tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi, who caught three passes for 28 yards, was an honorable mention choice as Tight End Performer of the Week.

SECOND LARGEST FCS CROWD

Georgia State had another tremendous crowd for opening night with 26,273 fans watching GSU defeat Clark Atlanta at the Georgia Dome.

The Georgia Dome was the second largest of the opening weekend in any FCS team's home stadium. The only FCS game to attract a larger crowd was UTSA's inaugural game, which drew 56,743 at the Alamodome. At a neutral site, the Chicago Football Classic drew 35,653 for Hampton and Alabama A&M at Soldier Field.

BO KNOWS QUARTERBACK, TOO

Sophomore Bo Schlechter started at quarterback for Georgia State in its season opener. The 6-3, 210-pounder is one of the best all-around athletes on the squad, but he was playing his first collegiate game at quarterback. His one pass attempt in 2010 came on a fake punt attempt.

Schlechter passed for 196 yards and three touchdowns against Clark Atlanta while directing a GSU offense that rolled up 41 points and did not commit a turnover. He completed 13-of-18 passes and also rushed nine times for 27 yards. He was named FCS Independent Player of the Week by College Sports Madness, and he was an honorable mention selection as Quarterback Performer of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards (CFPA).

A native of Wellington, Fla., Schlechter signed as part of the Panthers' first recruiting class in 2009. He played quarterback throughout a redshirt year in 2009 and competed for the starting berth in the 2010 preseason. When he didn't win the quarterback job, he elected to move to wide receiver and caught eight passes for 118 yards.

Schlechter has also punted for GSU. He averaged 44.5 yards per punt in 2010 and helped the Panthers to a net punting average of 37.3, which would have ranked among the Top 10 nationally had Georgia State been eligible for NCAA statistical rankings. He was a preseason, fourth-team All-American as well as an All-Independent by selection Phil Steele's 2011 College Football Preview.

TRANSFERS BOLSTER ROSTER

At the start of preseason camp, Georgia State added three transfers from FBS programs in running back Donald Russell and tight end Alex Smith, both from Kentucky, and defensive end A.J. Portee, who formerly played at Connecticut.

Russell and Portee both saw game action at their previous stops. That gives the Panthers a total of seven players with prior game experience at the FBS level. They join Ben Jacoby (Ball State), Clyde Yandell (Georgia Tech), Joseph Gilbert (Georgia Tech), Bailey Woods (Auburn) and Sidney Haynes (UCF).

FOUR POSITIONS FOR JENKINS

Senior noseguard Kalan Jenkins is now playing his fourth different position since arriving at Georgia State 18 months ago.

The Midlothian, Texas, native joined the program in January of 2010 after two seasons as a tight end at Navarro College. He remained at tight end for spring practice of 2010 before moving to defensive end, where he started every game during the inaugural season. This spring, he switched to defensive tackle, and then at the start of preseason camp, he moved even further inside to noseguard.

EXPERIENCED COACHES

Georgia State is blessed with a pair of coordinators with a wealth of major college experience in assistant head coach/defensive coordinator John Thompson and offensive coordinator John Bond.

Thompson previously served as defensive coordinator or co-coordinator at SEC schools Mississippi (2007), Florida (2002), Arkansas (2000-01), South Carolina (2005), as well as Memphis (1999), Southern Miss (1992-98), Louisiana Tech (1990-91) and Northwestern State (1988-89), for a total of 23 years as a Division I coordinator before coming to Georgia State.

Bond, a 26-year coaching veteran, directed prolific offenses at Georgia Tech (2007), Northern Illinois (2004-06), Army (2000-03) and Illinois State (1997-99) for a total of 13 years as a Division I coordinator.

Thompson and associate head coach/recruiting coordinator George Pugh also have head coaching experience. Thompson spent two seasons (2004-05) as the head coach at East Carolina, where he coached current NFL standout running back Chris Johnson. Pugh compiled a 19-10 record in three seasons at Alabama A&M (1989-91), winning three SIAC titles.

NFL FACILITIES

Georgia State is one of just eight collegiate programs to play its home games in the same facility as an NFL team. Six are FBS programs: Miami, Pittsburgh, San Diego State, Temple, Tulane and USF. The only other FCS program to play in an NFL facility is Tennessee State.

FATHERS & SONS

Three members of the Georgia State team are the sons of head coach Bill Curry's former players at Georgia Tech.

Mark Hogan, Jr. was GSU's first scholarship football player when he enrolled in January 2009. His father, Mark, Sr., played for Curry at Tech from 1982-85. Mark, Jr., spent the spring 2009 semester as a team of one, working out by himself.

The Panthers added another second-generation player in the summer of 2010 in Auburn transfer Bailey Woods, whose father, John, was an offensive lineman at Tech in 1976 when Curry was the offensive line coach.

This season, Nick Henderson is a freshman safety. His father, Steve, played for Curry at Georgia Tech in the early 1980s.

ANOTHER FAMOUS FATHER

Sophomore cornerback Brent McClendon is the son of former Chicago Bears running back Willie McClendon. The elder McClendon starred at Georgia, where he was the 1978 Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. Brent's older brother, Bryan, also played at Georgia and is now the running backs coach for the Bulldogs.

MATTHEWS HONORS HIGH SCHOOL TEAMMATE

For Georgia State cornerback Demarius Matthews, his jersey number holds special significance. Matthews, from Powder Springs, Ga., asked to wear No. 5 in honor of Rajaan Bennett, his teammate at McEachern High who was killed in an apparent murder-suicide in February 2010 when both were seniors. Bennett was an outstanding player himself who had earned a scholarship to Vanderbilt.

LAST MEETING WITH CAMPBELL

GEORGIA STATE 24, CAMPBELL 21

Game 4: Sept. 25, 2010 • 1 p.m.
Barker-Lane Stadium • Buies Creek, N.C.

Iain Vance booted a 30-yard field goal with just one second left to lift Georgia State to a 24-21 victory over Campbell Saturday afternoon at Barker-Lane Stadium, giving the Panthers (2-2) a win in their first-ever road game.

Vance's field goal capped a 10-play, 63-yard drive after Campbell (1-3) tied the game with a touchdown with 3:14 to play. GSU quarterback Drew Little completed three passes on the drive, including a 24-yard completion to tight end Arthur Williams to the Campbell 30, and then Rosevelt Watson got the Panthers into field goal range with runs of 15 and six yards down to the 24.

The Panthers ran two plays to run down the clock and get the ball into the middle of the field for Vance, the fifth-year senior from Duluth, Ga., who has not missed this season.

"We've put him under pressure in practice every single day since Aug. 11, 2009, just so that he would be ready for this," said GSU head coach Bill Curry.

Little's eight-yard touchdown pass to Danny Williams had put the Panthers ahead, 21-14, with 6:11 to play after a 13-play, 80-yard drive, but the Camels answered by moving 64 yards on just six plays. Quarterback Daniel Polk accounted for the game-tying score on a seven-yard run.

Little, the redshirt freshman from McDonough, Ga., completed 16 of 23 passes for 163 yards and two touchdowns on the day.

Rashaun Brown rushed for a career-high 133 yards on 19 carries for the Camels , who fell in the final seconds for the second straight game after allowing a touchdown to Davidson with 13 seconds left last week.

"I'm proud of my guys for one thing, which we've shown every day since we got here, and that is resilience," said Curry. "We will fight back every single time. We're 2-2 and we'll take that. Give credit to a very valiant Campbell team."

After a 14-all tie at the half, the Panthers' defense dodged two scoring threats in the second half as Campbell missed a pair of field goals, the second one coming early in the fourth quarter after third-down sack by GSU defensive tackle Christo Bilukidi.

From there, GSU took over at its own 20, and the Panthers moved down the field behind the combination of Little's passing and key runs by Travis Evans, who finished with 53 yards on 11 carries. Little started the drive with a 14-yard completion to Arthur Williams, then hit Parris Lee and Emmanuel Ogbuehi for short gains for a first down at the GSU 45. Then Evans carried three straight times, including a three-yard gain on thirdand-two. On first down at the Campbell 44, Little hit Danny Williams for five yards, and then Evans ran 18 vards down to the 21. After an incompletion and a six-yard gain by Evans, Little converted on third down with a five-yard strike to Danny Williams to the 10. On second down, Little again found Williams, this time in the corner of the end zone for an eight-yard scoring pass and a 21-14 lead with 6:11

On the two fourth-quarter scoring drives, Little was 9-for-10 for 82 yards.

The Panthers won the toss and elected to receive, which proved to be a good decision when Darren McCray took the opening kickoff and raced 94 yards for the score, staking Georgia State to the early, 7-0 lead. Not only was McCray's jaunt a first in Georgia State history, but it was also the first surrendered by the Campbell program in its third year of existence.

Campbell also had an early scoring chance when the Camels recovered a fumbled punt at the GSU 17-yard line. Five plays later, quarterback Daniel Polk punched it in from the one to knot the score at 7-all with 9:47 to play in the first quarter.

Georgia State answered on its first offensive possession with a 10-play, 51-yard drive, capped by Little's five-yard touchdown pass to Sidney Haynes as the Panthers regained the lead, 14-7, with 4:06 left in the first quarter.

The Camels tied the game by grinding out a 13-play, 94-yard drive that lasted nearly eight minutes. Georgia State appeared to have the drive stopped, but a roughing the passer call gave Campbell a key third-down conversion. Polk finished the drive with an 18-yard touchdown pass to Harrison Jordan, knotting the score at 14-all just 1:31 before halftime.

HEAD COACH BILL CURRY

BILL CURRY is the architect and builder of GEORGIA STATE UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL as the program's first head coach.

The Atlanta native and former head coach at Georgia Tech, Alabama and Kentucky, Bill Curry was introduced on June 12, 2008, eight weeks after the football program was officially launched on April 17.

Curry spent more than two years developing, directing and promoting the football program in preparation for Georgia State's inaugural season. When his Panthers took the field for the first time in 2010, the city of Atlanta and the football world took notice. Not only did his fledgling squad post a winning record at 6-5, but the program exceeded all expectations in terms of attendance, excitement and media exposure. Curry has called his current post the highlight of his storied career.

Curry brought to Georgia State his 17 years of experience as a head coach in the Southeastern Conference and the Atlantic Coast Conference—including Coach of the Year awards in both leagues—as well as an All-Pro playing career in

the National Football League, and, most recently, national notoriety as a college football analyst for ESPN.

In the NFL, he participated in three Super Bowls and two Pro Bowls and was part of three championship teams (1965, 1966 and 1970). As a center, Curry snapped the ball to legendary quarterbacks Bart Starr and Johnny Unitas, and he played for two of the most highly-regarded coaches in professional sports history in Vince Lombardi and Don Shula. His college coach, Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd, is an icon in Southern football annals.

Curry's 10-year playing career as a center included stops with the Green Bay Packers (1965-66), Baltimore Colts (1967-72), Houston Oilers (1973) and Los Angeles Rams (1974). He served as President of the NFL Players Association.

Curry entered the coaching ranks as offensive line coach at Georgia Tech in 1976. He then spent three years as an NFL assistant with the Packers (1977-79) before returning to his alma mater as head coach in 1980.

Curry took over a Georgia Tech program in transition, moving from independent status to the Atlantic Coast Conference while in need of facilities upgrades. His first two seasons were highlighted by a stunning 3-3 tie against No. 1-ranked Notre Dame in 1980, in which the Yellow Jackets' quarterback was a freshman walk-on named Ken Whisenhunt, who is now the head coach of the Arizona Cardinals, and a 24-21 victory at fourth-ranked Alabama the following year.

Curry's teams also scored a pair of victories over nationally-ranked Georgia teams as well as a win over 13th-ranked Clemson that snapped a 20-game ACC winning streak.

Curry's rebuilding efforts culminated in 1985, when he led Tech to a 9-2-1 season for the school's highest win total in two decades and its first bowl victory in 13 years, defeating heavily-favored Michigan State in the All-American Bowl. For his efforts, he was named ACC Coach of the Year.

Curry compiled a record of 20-11-3 over his final three seasons at Georgia Tech before moving

to Alabama in 1987. He posted a three-year record of 26-10 with the Crimson Tide, capped by the 1989 SEC title and Sugar Bowl berth.

In addition to being selected SEC Coach of the Year in 1989, Curry received the national coaching accolade named for his beloved mentor, the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award.

Curry then spent seven seasons at Kentucky (1990-96), highlighted by a berth in the 1993 Peach Bowl. At the time, that marked the Wildcats' fourth bowl berth in 40 years.

Through every stop, Curry has carried an indelible reputation for integrity and class, and he has been guided by the ideal that the education and well-being of the student-athlete is paramount.

In 2007, he was recognized by the American Football Coaches Association with the Amos Alonzo Stagg Award, which honors someone "whose services have been outstanding in the advancement of the best interests of football."

In 2008, he received the President Gerald R. Ford Legends Center Award, which is presented annually to someone who has played the center position at the collegiate or professional level, has made



extraordinary contributions to his team during his football career and has proven to be an exemplary citizen, philanthropist or leader in the business or football community.

Curry is a member of the State of Georgia Sports Hall of Fame and the Atlanta Sports Hall of Fame.

Curry also serves at Georgia State as a Distinguished Executive Fellow in the Robinson College of Business.

He is the author of the book, "Ten Men You Meet in the Huddle: Lessons from a Football Life," published in 2008.

Curry attended College Park High School in the Atlanta area before going on to Georgia Tech, where he earned his B.S. degree in Industrial Management in 1965.

He is married to the former Carolyn Newton of Atlanta, a graduate of Agnes Scott College who earned her master's degree and Ph.D. from Georgia State. Bill and Carolyn have two children and five grandchildren.

GEORGIA STATE 41, CLARK ATLANTA 7

Game 1: Sept. 2, 2011 • 7:30 p.m. Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

Georgia State opened its encore season with a 41-7 victory over Division II Clark Atlanta before 26,273 fans at the Georgia Dome. Sophomore Bo Schlechter, in his first collegiate start at quarterback, completed 13-of-18 passes for 196 yards and three touchdowns, two of them to Albert Wilson. Running back Donald Russell, playing his first game for GSU after transferring from Kentucky in the offseason, scored twice on the ground with 56 yards rushing to lead the Panthers.

"This was my first college start, but I tried to come out confident," Schlechter said. "It was just getting some plays run and I was able to build up some confidence going into the second quarter."

Schlechter, the starting punter and a reserve wide receiver last year during his freshman season, played in place of both Drew Little and Kelton Hill because of team-enforced suspensions to the Panthers' top two quarterbacks. He tossed the first TD pass of his college career to Jordan Giles on a 12-yard slant in the second quarter to make it a 24-0 GSU lead before halftime, then hit Wilson in the third and fourth quarters on scoring passes of 30 and 48 yards. The 48-yard TD connection is currently the longest touchdown pass in Panthers history.

"We had a quarterback who had never played a college game at quarterback and we had zero turnovers," said Georgia State head coach Bill Curry. "In my fondest dreams, I would have struggled to believe that."

Wilson finished with 85 yards receiving on three receptions, and tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi added 48 yards receiving on three catches. Travis Evans was the Panthers' second-leading rusher with 52 yards on eight attempts.

"We've been waiting for this moment for a long time," Wilson said. "We had a great camp this summer. We were all anxious to see how Bo would play. He showed up and played well."

Schlechter also retained punting duties, averaging 39 yards on four punts and leaving two inside the CAU 20-yard line, including a punt downed at the 1 late in the fourth quarter.

The defense had two key takeaways in the second quarter, with linebackers Robert Ferguson and Demazio Skelton snagging interceptions on back-to-back Clark Atlanta possessions to set up short touchdown drives.

The first interception, by Skelton on a pass from CAU quarterback Bryan Mann, gave GSU possession at the Clark Atlanta 34-yard line. The ensuing two-play scoring drive consisted of a 14-yard first-down pass to wide receiver Danny Williams, then a 20-yard touchdown run by Russell. On CAU's next possession, Ferguson intercepted quarterback T.J. Smith and returned it 31 yards to the 3-yard line, with Russell again rushing for the score on the next play to make it 17-0 Georgia State.

"We had terrific backs before, but Donald makes a difference when he handles the ball, and you saw that tonight," Curry said. "He has the capacity and the physicality to punish tacklers and spin away and run away from some others. That's a gift, and a lot of great backs have that."

GSU freshman kicker Christian Benvenuto converted his first collegiate field goal try from 44 yards out to make the score 3-0 with 3:34 left in the first quarter, then hit a 46-yarder in the third quarter for a perfect debut.

Clark Atlanta (0-1) got on the scoreboard with a 34-yard touchdown pass from Bryan Mann

to Terrence Milton on the first play of the fourth quarter. Georgia State (1-0) held CAU to 12 first downs and 140 yards rushing, and the quarterback duo of Mann and Smith combined for just 104 yards passing on 10 completions. Defensive end A.J. Portee tied for the lead in tackles with five total stops, and led the team with two tackles for loss.

"The run defense against their run offense was pretty good," Curry said. "We do have more athletic people defensively (than last year), our linebackers and our secondary run a lot faster than they did a year ago."

The 41-7 final is the same score by which Georgia State defeated Shorter University in its inaugural game in 2010, also in the Georgia Dome.

OLD DOMINION 40, GEORGIA STATE 17

Game 2: Sept. 10, 2011 • 12 p.m. (CSS) Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

Georgia State suffered its first loss of the season with a 40-17 home defeat to Old Dominion on Saturday at the Georgia Dome. It was the Panthers' (1-1) first match-up against a full-fledged member of the Colonial Athletic Association, as the third-year Old Dominion (2-0) program is in its first season of conference play.

The Panthers were shut out in the second half as Old Dominion extended its 27-17 halftime lead with two touchdown runs by quarterback Thomas DeMarco.

The game was also the Panthers' first ever against a repeat opponent; GSU dropped a 34-20 contest to Old Dominion last season in Norfolk, Va. With that game, ODU began a winning streak that it extended today to seven games.

"I would love to play a good game against ODU someday but we seem to save our worst for ODU," said Georgia State head coach Bill Curry. "So hats off to a good job by [Old Dominion]. We didn't find out today just how good they are because we really didn't test them. We gave them opportunities at every turn and they took advantage."

Quarterback Bo Schlechter, starting his second game for the Panthers, was 10-of-27 passing with an interception. Drew Little got his first snaps of the season late in the third quarter and finished 6-of-17 passing with two picks.

"We went out and played hard, but we had a couple of penalties and turnovers that shouldn't have happened," Schlechter said. "That caused us to get off key and we never could get back into it. We didn't execute our game plan like we should have."

A wild first half featured numerous miscues on both sides that led to points.

Old Dominion started the game with 51 and 45-yard field goals from Jarod Brown to jump out to a 6-0 lead. The Panthers' first score was made possible by an Antonio Vaughan fair catch fumble on a punt by Matt Hubbard. Nate Anthony subsequently recovered on the ODU 14 for the Panthers, and Christian Benvenuto ended the short drive with a 26-yard field goal to make it a 6-3 Old Dominion lead nine minutes into the game.

Later in the first quarter with Old Dominion leading 13-3, ODU safety Devon Simmons intercepted Schlechter and returned the pick 33 yards to the GSU 13. But several plays later, GSU linebacker Michael Hall forced Colby Goodwyn to fumble into the end zone, and linebacker Demazio Skelton returned it 93 yards to the Monarchs 7-yard line. Two plays later Donald Russell scored on a 2-yard run with 29 seconds left in the period to cut the ODU lead to three.

The Panthers, however, committed two special teams errors of their own in the second quarter. A Hubbard punt attempt was blocked by Alex Arain and returned 36 yards by Blair Roberts for an ODU touchdown with 12:16 left in the half.

A GSU scoring drive of 55 yards, capped by a 5-yard Travis Evans touchdown run, cut Old Dominion's lead to 20-17, but the Monarchs partially blocked another punt on the next Panthers possession, getting the ball at the GSU 19. ODU struck quickly with a DeMarco touchdown pass to Reid Evans to end the first-half scoring.

Georgia State was looking to cut into a 33-17 ODU lead when its most promising drive of the second half was cut short. Early in the fourth quarter, Little's pass attempt was tipped at the line and intercepted by Monarchs cornerback Eriq Lewis at the ODU 12-yard line.

Albert Wilson accounted for 77 punt return yards on six attempts and tied with Jordan Giles for the team lead with 53 yards receiving. Evans paced the Panthers with 74 yards on the ground.

JACKSONVILLE STATE 37, GEORGIA STATE 21

Game 3: Sept. 17, 2011 • 3:30 p.m. (CSS) Burgess-Snow Field • Jacksonville, Ala.

Georgia State played nearly even with 16th-ranked Jacksonville State for three quarters before succumbing in the fourth quarter and falling, 37-21, at Burgess-Snow Field.

GSU (1-2) wide receiver Albert Wilson set a school-record with 146 yards receiving on six catches, including receptions of 53 and his 54 yards. On his final catch covering 53 yards, the sophomore appeared headed for the end zone but pulled up with an injured hamstring.

Jacksonville State (2-1) quarterback Coty Blanchard completed nine of 11 passes for 155 yards and one touchdown while rushing 12 times for 77 yards and two scores. His 17-yard scoring run with four minutes remaining in the third quarter proved to be the key blow, putting the Gamecocks ahead, 24-14. The score came on fourth-and-one as Blanchard faked a handoff up the middle, snuck around the right side and then dove into the end

The Panthers answered with Travis Evans' threeyard touchdown run to pull within 24-21 late in the third quarter. The 80-yard drive was highlighted by a 54-yard completion from quarterback Bo Schechter to Wilson. Georgia State's longest pass play of the season moved the Panthers to the JSU 27, and from there, GSU kept it on the ground. On first down at the 15, Evans ran 12 yards to the three and then bulled his way into the end zone on the next play.

Holding a three-point lead, Jacksonville State ground out a 13-play, 74-yard drive that lasted 7:24 and was capped by Washaun Ealey's four-yard run. Ealey, the Georgia transfer, finished with 82 yards on the ground, and while backfield mate Calvin Middleton rushed for 89 yards and one score. For the game, JSU rushed for 246 yards.

Now leading 30-21, JSU forced the Panthers to go three-and-out and then managed another touchdown drive that was kept alive by a roughing the punter penalty. Blanchard scored from 11 yards out with 1:39 left for the final 37-21 margin.

"If we take the penalties and simply play intelligently, then we are right in the game," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "But we kept their drives alive with silly mistakes, and we didn't sustain enough offensively. We didn't show poise in the clutch."

The teams were tied at 14-all at the half. Jacksonville State opened the scoring on Blanchard's 28-yard touchdown pass to Kevyn Cooper with 10 minutes left in the first half, but Georgia State struck back as Schlechter found tight end Arthur Williams for an 11-yard touchdown with three minutes to play in the first quarter.

After the Gamecocks regained the lead early in the second quarter by blocking Drew Little's attempt at a quick kick and returning it 34 yards for a score, Georgia State again knotted the score on Donald's Russell's one-yard plunge. That score was set up by Demarius Matthews' 67-yard kickoff return to the JSU 24-yard line.

Schlechter passed for 145 yards and one touchdown while completing 15 of 26 passes. He added 29 yards rushing. Donald Russell managed 47 yards and a touchdown, while Evans finished with 41 yards rushing, one touchdown, and five catches for 27 yards.

HOUSTON 56, GEORGIA STATE 0

Game 4: Sept. 24, 2011 • 8 p.m. (CSS) Robertson Stadium • Houston, Texas

Playing just its second-ever game against an FBS opponent, Georgia State fell at Houston, 56-0, in night game at Robertson Stadium.

The loss was the third in a row for the Panthers, who dropped to 1-3 and were shut out for the first time in their brief history.

The Cougars improved to 4-0 behind recordsetting quarterback Case Keenum, who was every bit as good as advertised. The sixth-year senior completed 29 of 34 passes for 415 yards and two touchdowns.

He went 20-for-24 for 279 yards in the first half to stake the Cougars to a 35-0 lead at the intermission

The Cougars rolled up 732 yards of offense, including 561 yards in the air and 171 on the ground. Fourteen different Houston receivers caught passes, led by Justin Johnson with six catches for 83 yards, including touchdown catches of 18 and nine yards. Bryce Beall added 64 yards rushing and two touchdowns.

"Their speed really unnerved us, and we didn't play the fundamentals," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "We repeated the mistakes and stupid penalties we made the last two weeks. It's frustrating and it's embarrassing, and I don't know anything else to do except keep working."

The Panthers made a change at quarterback, starting Drew Little and also utilizing Kelton Hill. Little passed for 117 yards on 11 completions, while Hill contributed 33 yards rushing.

"Both quarterbacks were rusty, but we felt like we had to give them a chance," said Curry. "But we didn't protect them, and we didn't get [Houston] stopped on defense."

Travis Evans rushed for a career-best 70 yards on 14 carries for Georgia State, and wide receiver Danny Williams had his best game of the season with four catches for 70 yards, including a 42-yard catch.

Georgia State's best chance to score came late in the third quarter, when the Panthers drove for a first down at the Houston nine. But on second down, Little's pass was tipped in the air, and Marcus McGraw came down with the interception.

The Panthers played without their top receiver and offensive player Albert Wilson, who injured his hamstring last game, and one of its primary ball carriers in Donald Russell, who sustained a sprained knee in practice this week. Also missing from the GSU lineup due to injury were the team's top two centers in Ben Jacoby (knee) and Michael Davis (ankle) and starting free safety Brandon Jones (ankle).

Georgia State fell at home to Murray State, 48-24, at the Georgia Dome on Saturday. A third-quarter rally in which the Panthers scored 14 unanswered points fell short after Murray State regained control of the game in the fourth quarter.

The Panthers made the score 35-24 in the third after getting a 43-yard Kelton Hill touchdown pass to Danny Williams and a 9-yard rushing TD from Donald Russell, his second of the game.

"The team was defiant (going into halftime)," said head coach Bill Curry. "The team was ready to come back, which we did, but we didn't sustain."

The defense got a stop on the next series to set up a Panther drive that would take 6:33 off the clock and give freshman kicker Christian Benvenuto a chance to make it a one-score game on a 31-yard field goal try. But Benvenuto, who connected on a 46-yard field goal in the first quarter, missed wide left with 8:10 to play and the Panthers would not threaten again.

Georgia State (1-4) is in the midst of the program's first four-game losing streak after an opening win against Clark Atlanta University.

"We practice long and hard, and the staff works long and hard, but that isn't good enough," said head coach Bill Curry. "The results have to be displayed on the field."

Murray State (3-3) capitalized by adding two

touchdowns after the Benvenuto miss. The Racers, of the FCS Ohio Valley Conference, are the fourth team in a row to put up over 40 points on the Panther defense. Quarterback Casey Brockman finished 35-of-46 passing for 321 yards and four touchdowns.

Cornerback D'Mario Gunn was a bright spot on the Panther defense, intercepting Brockman twice. Gunn becomes the first Panther defender to register two interceptions in a game.

Russell put the Panthers on the board in the first quarter with a 4-yard touchdown. The junior running back has scored six touchdowns in four games this season, reaching the end zone in every game he has played at Georgia State after transferring from Kentucky in the offseason.

The Panthers used three quarterbacks in the game, starting Drew Little, who finished 17-of-38 passing with two interceptions. Bo Schlechter, who also punted six times in the game, entered the game late in the second half at quarterback.

"I don't feel like we've played four quarters of football all year," Little said. "We go out there and play strong one quarter, but not the next. We just haven't put it all together for four quarters yet. We've got to get back to the little things."

Hill, who saw his first game action of the year last week against Houston, found Williams for the wide-open touchdown pass on his first snap of the game. Williams set a school record for receiving yardage in the game with 151 on nine catches, breaking the record set last year by tight end Arthur Williams. Williams has a reception in each of Georgia State's 16 games as a program.

The first-quarter drive that culminated in Benvenuto's 46-yard field goal went for a school-record 90 yards, breaking the previous long of 85 yards against North Carolina Central last season.

The Panthers were again without starting wide receiver and return man Albert Wilson, who missed his second straight game with a hamstring injury suffered late in the contest against Jacksonville State.

Georgia State fell on the road at South Carolina State, 23-13, despite a school-record 244 yards rushing at Oliver C. Dawson Stadium.

The Panthers dropped their fifth straight to fall to 1-5 on the season, while South Carolina State improved to 4-3.

Georgia State played without starting quarterback Drew Little due to injury, so the Panthers relied on their ground attack while playing Bo Schlechter and Kelton Hill under center.

Hill rushed for 94 yards on 16 carries, missing his own school mark by just one yard. Running back Donald Russell added a season-high 85 yards and a touchdown.

"We've got to learn to finish the job," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "But we took another step forward, and we've got to look at it that way. We were in position to give ourselves a chance to win.

"It seems like every time we get something going, we lose the person who was the spark plug," Curry continued. "Today we had to play without Drew Little, so we relied on our other quarterbacks and tried to go with what they do well. But we're not going to use injuries as an excuse."

Georgia State took a 13-10 lead on Russell's nine-yard touchdown run with six minutes left in the third quarter. That was Russell's team-leading seventh score of the season, and the junior transfer from Kentucky has reached the end zone in every game he has played for GSU.

South Carolina State answered with a 34-yard field goal by Blake Erickson, tying the score at 13-all with an eight-play, 52-yard drive.

The Panthers were looking to regain the lead on their next possession with a first down at the SCSU 33.. But a false start penalty on third-and-one stalled the drive, and freshman Christian Benvenuto, who booted two first half field goals, was forced to try a 46-yarder into a stiff wind. From there, the Bulldogs drove for another field goal to take a 16-13 lead they would not relinquish.

Georgia State continued to move the ball on the ground, gaining a first down at the SCSU 42. But Hill was sacked on third-and-eight and the Panthers were forced to punt.

South Carolina State took over at its own 20 with 6:43 to play and began its game-clinching drive that covered 80 yards and 16 plays and ate up more than five minutes, culminating with quarterback Richard Cue's one-yard touchdown run.

Cue finished 16-for-30 for 213 yards passing, plus 45 yards rushing and two scores for SCSU. Asheton Jordon gained 74 yards on the ground.

GSU's 244 yards rushing included a combined total of 241 yards from the trio of Hill (94 yards), Russell (85) and Travis Evans (62) as the Panthers bettered their previous high of 232 yards on the ground, set last season against Savannah State.

However, with top passer Little sidelined, GSU managed just 76 yards in the air, going 6-for-20 with three interceptions.

The Panthers took a 6-3 lead into the locker room on a pair of field goals by Benvenuto, who connected from 23 and 40 yards.

GEORGIA STATE 27, SOUTH ALABAMA 20 (2 OT)

Game 7: Oct. 22, 2011 • 3 p.m. Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

Georgia State pulled out a dramatic doubleovertime victory over South Alabama, 27-20, on Homecoming weekend Saturday at the Georgia Dome. Donald Russell gave the Panthers a sevenpoint lead in the second overtime with an eight-yard touchdown run, and on South Alabama's ensuing possession, linebacker Mark Hogan intercepted a tipped pass at the one-yard line to end the game.

On the final play, linebacker Jake Muasau pressured Bennett into throwing a jump ball into the end zone. The pass was batted into the air and fell into Hogan's arms to give the Panthers the win.

"On the last play, my ear pad had fallen out, my vision was blurry," Hogan said. "I just knew to keep playing and something good would happen. I saw a lot of blue jerseys in the area, so I knew it might be tipped up in the air."

The victory broke a five-game losing streak for the Panthers, who were winless since the opening victory against Clark Atlanta.

"There have been several times when I could honestly say I've never been more proud of a group of men," said head coach Bill Curry. "It would have been very easy to pack it in these last few weeks."

Georgia State (2-5) got record-setting performances from Russell, who had the first 100-yard rushing game in school history with 136 yards on 20 attempts, and Albert Wilson, who set a school record with 175 yards receiving on five catches. Russell's overtime touchdown run was his eighth of the season, including at least one in every game he has played.

"I'm just happy to get the win," Russell said. "It hasn't sunk in yet. We've had a hard time finishing. But we showed today that we can finish and come out with the victory."

Wilson's two touchdown catches - a 78-yard screen pass in the first quarter, and a 64-yard bomb in the second - both took their places atop the record books as the Panthers' longest plays from scrimmages.

Georgia State also broke a school mark with five takeaways in the game. In the first half, the Panthers defense forced a fumble, a turnover on downs and two interceptions to kill four South Alabama drives in the red zone. The defense was at a disadvantage throughout the game with the Jaguars starting drives, on average, at their 45-yard line.

Kelton Hill, making his first start at quarterback, finished 12-of-15 passing for 209 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions, although the sophomore lost three fumbles. Hill started the game 6-for-6 for 161 yards and the two scores.

"It came down to me and the receivers staying after practice, getting our timing down," Hill said.

Placekicker Christian Benvenuto hit field goals of 46 yards in the third quarter and 45 in the fourth. The 46-yarder was a career-long.

The Panthers nearly won in regulation, as Hogan seemingly intercepted quarterback C.J. Bennett right outside the end zone with eight seconds on the clock and Georgia State leading 20-13. But the officials nullified the play, ruling that South Alabamahad committed a false start penalty and giving the Jaguars another play on fourth and 9. On the next play, Bennett found Corey Waldon in the end zone for the game-tying score to force overtime.

The first overtime sequence began with a missed 44-yard field goal by South Alabama kicker Jordan Means, leading to a Georgia State possession. After two rushes by Russell put the ball on the 7-yard line, the Panthers elected to attempt a 24-yard gamewinning field goal attempt on first down. Benvenuto's kick was blocked, however, setting up the second overtime period.

Georgia State again kept it on the ground with Russell in the second overtime, as he rushed three times and capped the possession with the 8-yard score

The game was Georgia State's third overtime contest in its history, and the first double-overtime game. Last season, the Panthers fell to Jacksonville State, 34-27, and defeated North Carolina Central, 20-17, both at home in one overtime.

In addition to stopping South Alabama in overtime, the GSU defense came up with a key goalline stand on the game's opening possession. After a 71-yard kickoff return, the Jaguars had a first-andgoal at the one-yard line, but the Panther defense stoned the run four straight plays, with Christo Bilukidi stopping Kendall Houston on fourth down for a one-yard loss.

During regulation, the Panthers came up with four takeaways inside the 25-yard line on interceptions by Jamal Ransby, Brent McClendon and Evan Bostic and a fumble recovery by Brandon Iones

One week after earning dramatic overtime victory, Georgia State was the victim in overtime, falling at UTSA, 17-14, Saturday at the Alamodome.

UTSA's (3-5) Sean Ianno tied the game with a 39-yard field goal with just 24 seconds left in regulation, and then the Roadrunners' placekicker booted the game-winning 32-yarder in the first overtime after GSU missed its field goal attempt in the extra session.

Georgia State (2-6) used the running of Donald Russell, who finished with 87 yards on 21 carries, and the passing combination of Kelton Hill-to-Albert Wilson to take a 14-0 lead in the first half before the Roadrunners began to chip away.

The GSU defense appeared to seal the victory with pass breakups by Demarius Matthews and Demazio Skelton on third and fourth down, respectively, giving the Panthers the ball at the UTSA 31 with a 14-11 lead and 3:42 left. But three plays netted just three yards, and Christian Benvenuto missed a 45-yard field goal.

That allowed UTSA to move in position for the

tying field goal. Quarterback Eric Soza, who passed for 189 yards, hit a 17-yard completion to Brandon Freeman on fourth down, and then found Freeman again for another 17 yards for a first down at the GSU 30.

In the overtime, GSU went on offense first and its possession began with a false start penalty, and ended with Benevenuto unable to hit a 48-yard field goal.

"UTSA is a good team, but this is a very disappointing loss because we just kept making mistakes and shooting ourselves in the foot," said GSU head coach Bill Curry.

"We've got to be able to run the ball when we need to, even if the other team knows we're going to run it, and we didn't get that done," he continued.

After a scoreless first quarter, Georgia State got on the board on Russell's 24-yard touchdown run, on which he appeared stopped behind the line of scrimmage before reversing field and outracing the defense to the end zone.

Russell's team-leading ninth touchdown of the season capped an eight-play drive that covered 97 yards, the longest drive in school history. The previous long was a 90-yard march against Murray State

After a squib kickoff and a 23-yard completion from Soza to Evan Okotcha, UTSA had a first down at the GSU 35, but the Panther defense held and forced the Roadrunners to try a 50-yard field goal that fell short, and put Georgia State back on offense.

On first down from the GSU 46, Hill found Wilson behind the defense for a 54-yard touchdown, the third time in the last two games that those two have hooked up for a scoring pass of more than 50 yards.

The Panthers looked to take the shutout into the locker room, but back-to-back roughing the passer penalties allowed UTSA to get in position for Ianno's 30-yard field goal just six seconds before the intermission.

The third quarter was also scoreless, Georgia State held its 14-3 lead until UTSA completed a 12-play, 80-yard drive, capped by a nine-yard scoring run by Chris Johnson. Soza then hit Freeman for the two-point conversion to pull the Roadrunners within three with 14 minutes to play. Georgia State appeared to have the drive stopped early on, but an offsides penalty nullified a third-down incompletion, and UTSA capitalized.

"That one definitely hurts because we had it in our grasp," said outside linebacker Jake Muasau, who finished with a game-high 10 tackles, two tackles for loss and an interception. "We have to learn from this and move on."

Hill, making his second straight start, completed six of 15 passes for 91 yards and rushed 11 times for 46 yards. The Panthers managed 164 yards rushing

Freshman punter Matt Hubbard had his best day, averaging 47 yards on five punts, including a 64-yarder that is the longest in GSU history.

Playing its third straight overtime, the Georgia State football team dropped a 30-27 decision in overtime to St. Francis (Ill.) Saturday at the Georgia

GSU quarterback Kelton Hill had a career-high 98 yards rushing with two touchdowns passing and another score on the ground.

The Panthers (2-7) held a 27-17 lead late in the fourth quarter, but St. Francis (8-2) rallied to score 10 points in the final five minutes, tying the game as time expired on a 31-yard field goal.

In overtime, the Panthers were stopped on their opening possession as Matt Ehasz' 47-yard field goal attempt bounced off the upright. The Saints' Sean Murray then hit a 30-yarder on USF's first possession to end the game.

Hill finished the game 14-for-24 passing for 197 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. He also had an eight-yard touchdown on the ground.

Sophomore Albert Wilson hauled in seven grabs for 89 yards while sophomore Danny Williams became the first player in school history to pass 1,000 career receiving yards, making two catches for 48 yards and a touchdown.

"It is very, very disappointing," head coach Bill Curry said after the loss. "(St. Francis) of course did a marvelous job. They are a good team and they deserved to win but this shouldn't have happened."

The Panthers took the opening drive down for a touchdown as Hill capped a five-play, 54 yard drive with a 22-yard pass to Williams over the middle. It was Williams' second touchdown grab of the season.

USF put together a 10-play drive in the second quarter to get inside the GSU 10 yard line, but the Panther defense held USF to a 24-yard field goal that made it 7-3.

Minutes later, USF quarterback E.J. White found wideout Desmond Page for a 58-yard touchdown strike to put the Saints on top, 10-7.

On GSU's next offensive snap, Hill ripped off a 52-yard run down the sideline to the Saints' 21. The

Panthers' drive would stall however, and Christian Benvenuto drilled a 36-yard field goal to tie the game, 10-10.

Hill then led GSU on a nine-play, 80-yard drive before halftime to reclaim the lead. Jordan Giles hauled in a 31-yard pass in the corner of the end zone with 27 seconds remaining in the half to give GSU a 17-10 advantage.

GSU took their opening possession of the second half on a 13-play, 65 yard scoring drive. The Panthers faced a 4th-and-12 after reaching USF's 32, but Hill found Wilson streaking over the middle for a 23-yard pass to extend the drive. Two plays later, Hill capped the seven-minute drive with an eight yard run for a touchdown, making it 24-10.

St. Francis drove the ball to the GSU 15 on their next possession, but the drive ended without a score as Murray missed a 31-yard attempt.

Hill went over the top to Wilson on the next play, launching a 50-yard strike down the right sideline that Wilson plucked out of double-coverage, bringing the third quarter to a close. The drive would later stall however as GSU failed to duplicate its fourth-down success, Hill being stopped on a scramble up the middle on 4th and 13.

USF quickly pulled back within one score after a three-play, 70-yard drive that ended with Anthony Hubert's 42-yard touchdown run, making it 24-17 GSU with 12:14 remaining in the game. The Saints then attempted an onside kick, but Panther Kail Singleton jumped on the loose ball to give GSU possession.

After the teams traded possessions, GSU's Ehasz connected on a 34-yard field goal with 5:05 remaining to extend the lead to 27-17.

White led the Saints down the field once more, ending with a two-yard touchdown pass to tight end Luke Gundersen in the back of the end zone to make it 27-24 with 1:24 on the clock.

The Saints then attempted their second onside kick, this time recovering it to extend the game. USF then drove for the tying score. After converting on 4th-and-3 for a first down at the GSU 30, White completed a 16-yard pass to Elliot Allen who barely made it out of bounds to stop the clock. With one second on the clock, and the ball at the GSU 14, Murray came on to kick the game-tying field goal from 31 yards and send the game into overtime.

The Panthers went on offense first in overtime but failed to move the ball. Facing 4th and 15 from the 30, GSU was forced to try a 47-yard field goal by Ehasz. The kick bounced off the bottom corner of the upright and was no good.

The Saints then took their possession to down to the 15-yard line after a quarterback keeper by White. After the Panther defense allowed just two yards on the next three plays, Murray came in and made the 30-yard game winner.

GSU has now played five overtime games in the program's two seasons.

WEST ALABAMA 30, GEORGIA STATE 23

Game 10: Nov. 12 • 7 p.m. ET Tiger Stadium • Livingston, Ala.

Matthew Willis rushed for 171 yards and scored the go-ahead touchdown on a four-yard run with 2:12 left to give West Alabama a 30-23 victory over Georgia State Saturday night at Tiger Stadium as the Panthers suffered another heart-breaking fourth quarter.

Kelton Hill rushed for a GSU record 152 yards tied the game for Georgia State (2-8) with a two-yard touchdown run with nine minutes to play. After West Alabama (8-3) took the lead, the GSU quarterback drove the Panthers into the red zone, hitting Nathaniel Minor for an eight-yard completion at the UWA 17 with 48 seconds left, but Minor, who had to leap for the catch, fumbled the ball to end the threat.

It was a frustrating game for Georgia State, which moved the ball throughout the second half but came up short in the red zone four times in the second half, including the final drive. GSU outgained the Tigers, 447-388, including 219 yards rushing and 228 yards passing, but had four costly turnovers.

"We were down inside the 10 four times in the second half and came away with nothing, and if you do that, you're going to get beat," said GSU head coach Bill Curry. "We fought valiantly, and we did a lot of good things on both sides of the ball, but ball

security is the most important factor in football."

Trailing 23-16, the Panthers appeared to be heading for the tying touchdown when Kelton Hill fumbled at the two yard line at the end of a long run. UWA recovered in the end zone for a touchback.

But on UWA's first play, Dexter Moody picked off Kyle Caldwell's pass over the middle and returned it to the nine yard line. After Malcolm Smith gained seven yards on first down, Hill took it in from the two, tying the game at 23-all with nine minutes to play.

The Panthers then had an excellent chance to take the lead after Christo Bilukidi recovered a fumbled pitch on UWA's next play to give GSU possession at the 11-yard line. But on third down, a miscue on the exchange caused GSU to fumble the ball right back to the Tigers, who took over at their own 14-yard line. The Tigers drove 86 yards in nine plays for the winning score.

Georgia State came up short on two scoring opportunities in the third quarter. Trailing 20-14, GSU opened the second half with the ball and drove down the field. The Panthers had third-and-one at the UWA four-yard line, but, with GSU's top three running backs all injured, Hill was stopped twice on quarterback sneaks, turning the ball over on downs. The drive proved particularly costly as the Panthers lost running backs Parris Lee and Travis Evans to injuries, with starter Donald Russell also injured and in uniform only for emergency duty.

But the GSU defense not only stopped UWA on three downs, but Demazio Skelton blocked the Tiger punt for a safety, the first in Georgia State history to pull the Panthers within 20-16.

Georgia State took the ensuing kickoff and again drove into the red zone but had to settle for a 30-yard field goal attempt by backup kicker Matt Ehasz, which bounced off the upright.

Hill, the sophomore from Douglasville, Ga., rushed for 152 yards and two touchdowns, including a 53-yard scoring run, to surpass the GSU singlegame record of 136 yards set earlier this season by Donald Russell. Hill also completed 19 of 36 passes for 228 yards and one touchdown.

Albert Wilson caught a career-high eight passes for 120 yards with a 33-yard scoring pass from Hill. That effort raised his career total to 1,058 receiving yards as he became the second Panther in as many weeks to reach the 1,000-yard mark.

Danny Williams, who broke 1,000 last week, had one catch, extending his streak of consecutive games with a reception to 21.

Jake Muasau had another big day for the GSU defense with six tackles, two tackles for loss and an interception.

For West Alabama, Willis carried the ball 33 times for 171 yards and scored twice. Quarterback Kyle Caldwell completed 15 of 20 passes for 166 yards and one touchdown.

Trailing 10-0 in the first quarter, Georgia State got on the board on a 33-yard touchdown pass from Hill to Wilson, his sixth touchdown catch of the season, all of them covering at least 30 yards.

After UWA moved ahead 17-7 on Willis' 11-yard touchdown run, the Panthers answered with a 53-yard scoring run by Hill, the second straight week in which the GSU quarterback has scored on a run of more than 50-yards. Last week against St. Francis, he raced 52 yards for a score. His 53-yard play equals the second-longest scoring run in GSU history, equaling his own 53-yard run last season against Lambuth.

The Panthers were on the move late in the first half, looking to tie the game or take the lead when, on third-and-10 at the UWA 34, D'Eric Jackson made a diving interception to give the Tigers the ball

with 1:35 left. UWA managed to get in position for a 40-yard field goal that hit the upright but bounced just over the cross bar, giving the Tigers a 20-14 advantage at the half.
