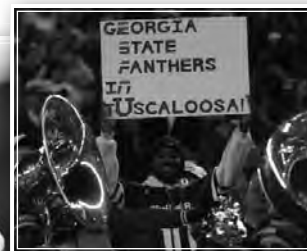

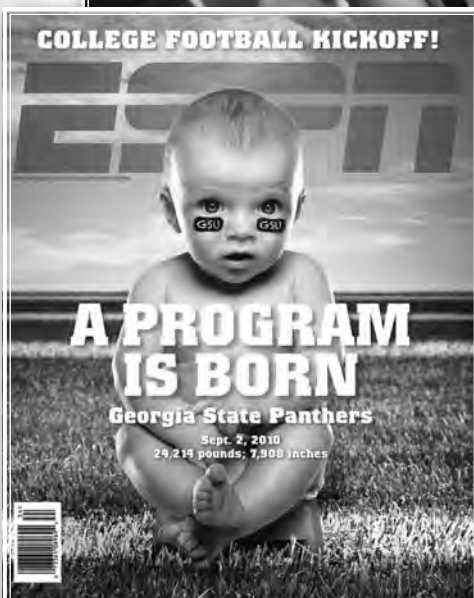

THE SUN BELT CONFERENCE MANTRA “Together We Rise”
exemplifies what has quickly become America’s most up-and-coming collegiate athletics conference.

Founded in 1976, the Sun Belt has adapted and evolved in its nearly 40 year existence. The league was originally formed as a home for some of the nation’s premier mid-major basketball teams and it wasn’t until a number of changes and the demand for a higher national profile that the league began sponsoring football in 2001. Because of this decision to move the league into the group of football playing conferences, the Sun Belt Conference has a permanent seat on the NCAA’s 18-member Board of Directors. As a result, the conference has a crucial voice on some of the most pressing issues in college athletics.

With the 2014-15 year marking the debut of the College Football Playoff (CFP), the Sun Belt continues to find itself among the 10 premier college football conferences and the new system is guaranteed universal access based on performance – there are no automatic qualifiers for the playoff system. Additionally, the CFP will mean that a spot among the premier bowl games of college football will be guaranteed to the highest-ranked champion from the “Group of Five” conferences: the Sun Belt Conference, American Athletic Conference, Mountain West Conference, Mid-American Conference and Conference USA.

With the College Football Playoff included with the league’s other bowl arrangements, the Sun Belt Conference is tied to seven total bowl games. The R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl, the GoDaddy Bowl, the Raycom Media Camellia Bowl, the Cure Bowl (debuting in 2015) all guarantee a home for a bowl eligible Sun Belt Conference team each year. And beginning with the 2016 season, the Sun Belt is also part of a rotation of conferences that will send a team to the Bahamas Bowl and the Miami Beach Bowl.

The influx of bowl game opportunities comes at a time

when the Sun Belt Conference is breaking win records year after year and the league is continually exceeding expectations.

The Sun Belt’s 21 non-conference football wins in the 2013 season was a record for the league - eclipsing the mark of 19 set the year prior. Additionally of note for the league’s non-conference win total was that the Sun Belt fared well against its peer opponents in the non-AQ BCS ranks. The Sun Belt finished a combined 8-1 against members of Conference-USA (4-1), the Mid-American Conference (3-0) and the Mountain West Conference (1-0). The Sun Belt also had the best overall non-conference win percentage when comparing the four non-AQ conferences.

The 2013 football season also saw two teams take home bowl championship trophies, as UL Lafayette won its third consecutive R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl and Arkansas State won its second consecutive GoDaddy Bowl.

Of course, football wasn’t the only sport that has seen recent success and all of the league’s sports have contributed to the “Rise” of the Sun Belt Conference.

In men’s basketball, league newcomer Georgia State put together one of the best conference performances in league

An influx of young coaches mixed with proven veterans makes both Sun Belt men's and women's basketball an exciting brand with vast potential.

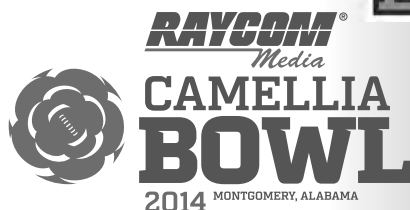
The Sun Belt Conference Men's and Women's Basketball Championships were played in New Orleans, the hometown of the Sun Belt at Lakefront Arena this past March in what was the first of a three-year deal that will have Sun Belt hoops in the "Big Easy" each March.

Baseball and softball continue to be among the league's standard-bearers for success as each continues to send teams on deep postseason runs and teams are easy to find in the national polls.

In baseball, UL Lafayette held a unanimous No. 1 national ranking during the 2014 season and hosted a NCAA regional and super regional. Not to be outdone, the UL Lafayette softball team also hosted the NCAA Tournament rounds and qualified for the 2014 edition of the Women's College World Series.

In recent years as many as four Sun Belt teams have advanced to the baseball postseason in a single year, while as many as three Sun Belt softball teams have accomplished that feat.

While the accomplishments of the Sun Belt's student-athletes and coaches deserve great praise, so to do the league's administrators who have helped set the tone for the future of the conference.

"We have never been as strong as we are now academically and financially and I believe we are getting stronger all the time athletically," former Sun Belt Conference President and Troy University Chancellor Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr. said recently. "I truly believe that the best is yet to come."

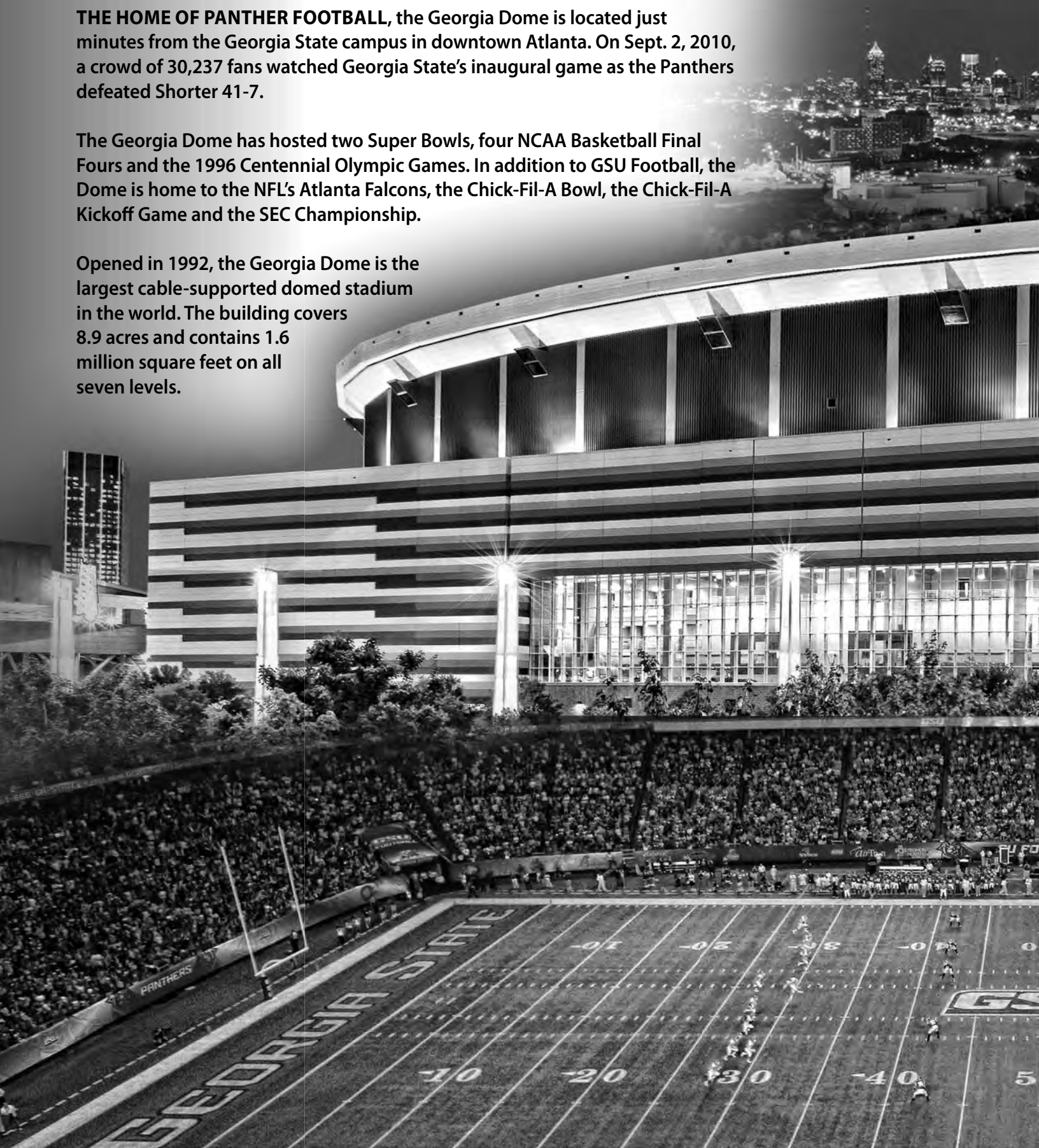
The Sun Belt Conference's membership consists of 11 football members for 2014 – Appalachian State, Arkansas State, Georgia Southern, Georgia State, Idaho, UL Lafayette, UL Monroe, New Mexico State, South Alabama, Texas State and Troy. UALR and UT Arlington compete in all-sports as non-football members while Idaho and New Mexico State are football-only members.

GEORGIA DOME

THE HOME OF PANTHER FOOTBALL, the Georgia Dome is located just minutes from the Georgia State campus in downtown Atlanta. On Sept. 2, 2010, a crowd of 30,237 fans watched Georgia State's inaugural game as the Panthers defeated Shorter 41-7.

The Georgia Dome has hosted two Super Bowls, four NCAA Basketball Final Fours and the 1996 Centennial Olympic Games. In addition to GSU Football, the Dome is home to the NFL's Atlanta Falcons, the Chick-Fil-A Bowl, the Chick-Fil-A Kickoff Game and the SEC Championship.

Opened in 1992, the Georgia Dome is the largest cable-supported domed stadium in the world. The building covers 8.9 acres and contains 1.6 million square feet on all seven levels.





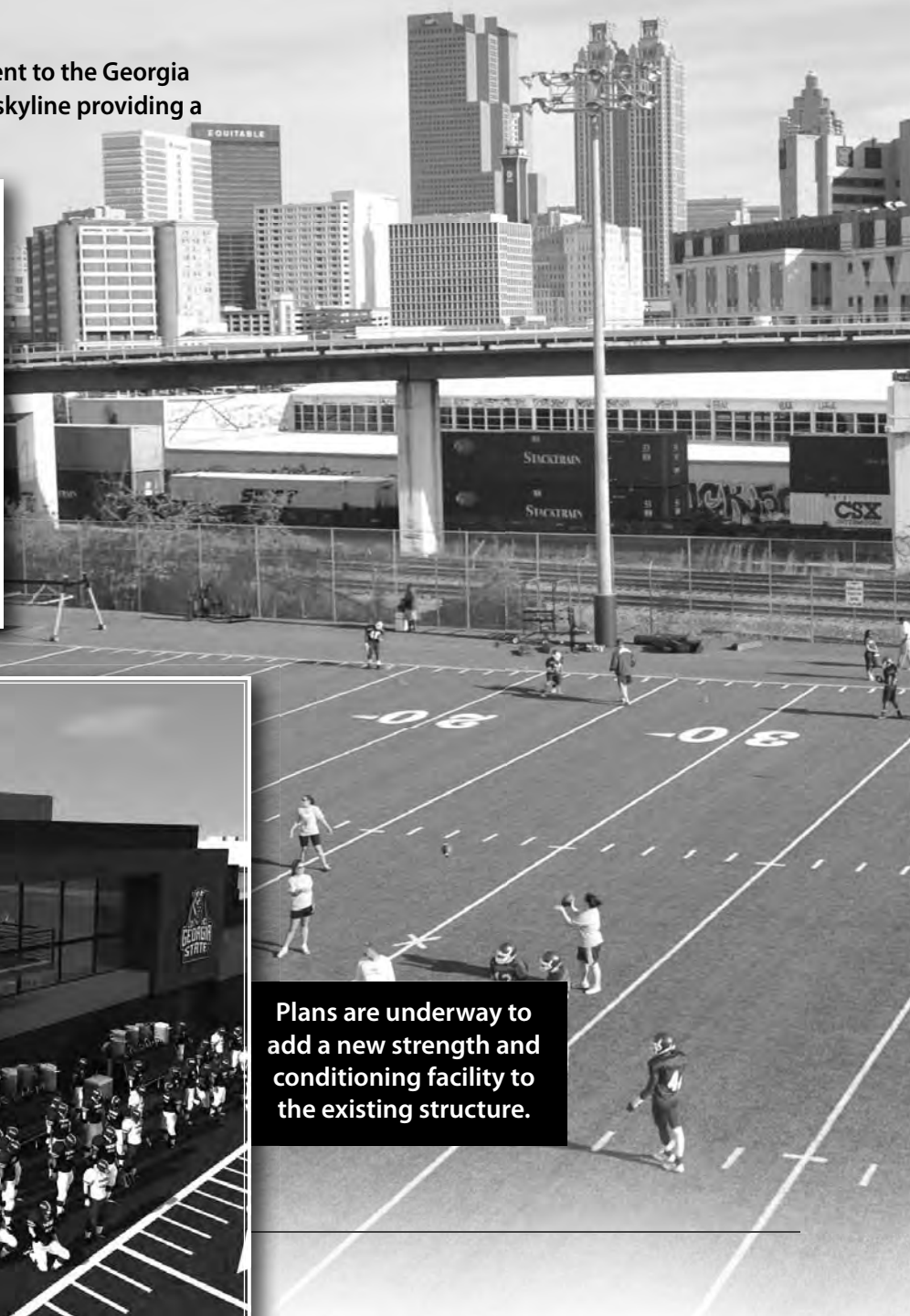
GSU PRACTICE COMPLEX

HOME TO THE GEORGIA STATE FOOTBALL PROGRAM on a daily basis, the GSU Practice Complex features a 120-yard synthetic turf field, completed in March 2010, as well as a 60-yard natural turf field.

An existing structure on the site was renovated and expanded, maintaining its historic architecture and charm while adding modern features. The 22,000-square foot facility was completed in 2011 and includes the Panthers' locker room, equipment room, athletic training room, theater-style team meeting room, individual position meeting rooms and coaches' offices.

Plans are in the works to add a state-of-the-art strength and conditioning facility to the complex.

The GSU Practice Complex is located adjacent to the Georgia State campus, with the downtown Atlanta skyline providing a dramatic backdrop.

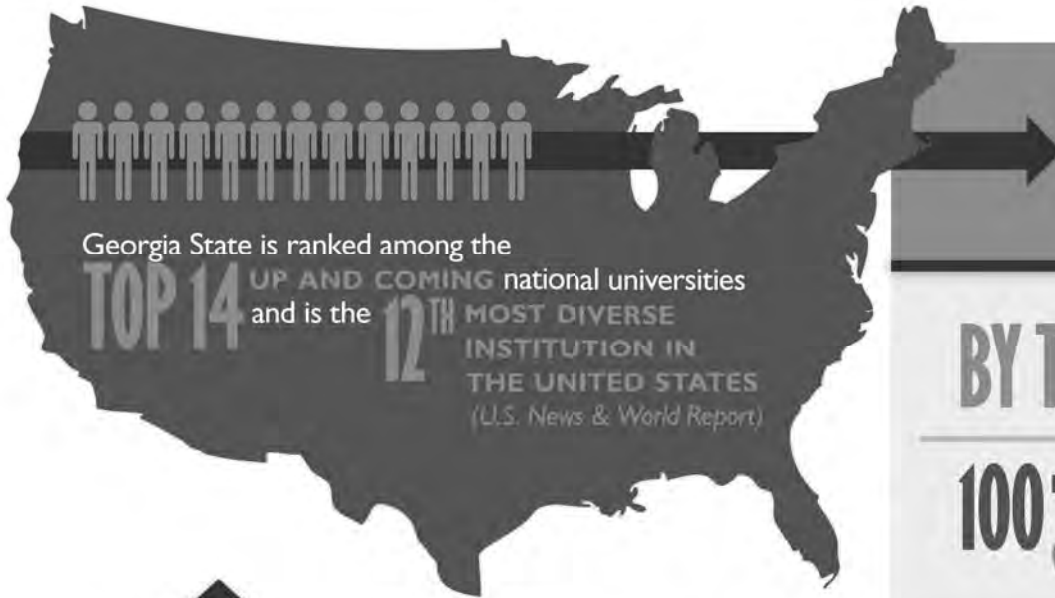

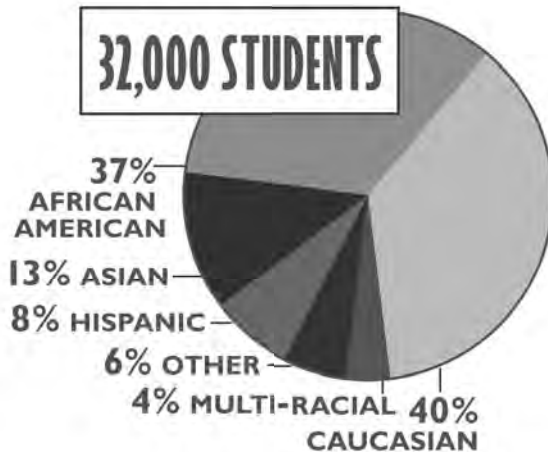

CAMPUS HOUSING

SOME OF THE FINEST HOUSING FACILITIES in the nation are on the Georgia State campus. On-campus housing continues to grow, and more than 4,000 GSU students now live on campus with a variety of options — traditional dorms, apartment-style or loft living.

Georgia State's nationally-recognized and award-winning on-campus housing provides students with opportunities to connect with the university community with educational, cultural, recreational and social programs.

The University Commons, opened in 2007, is a 4.2-acre complex of four buildings surrounding a landscaped courtyard. All units come with fully-equipped kitchens, furnished bedrooms and spacious living areas.

The fall of 2009 saw the opening of Patton Hall, which is suite-style for 325 residents and includes an on-site dining facility.

In 2010, GSU opened its first Greek housing, which consists of nine fraternities and sororities housed in three-story townhomes.

Opened in 2011, the Piedmont North Complex houses approximately 1,100 residents and offers a traditional residence hall lifestyle with all the amenities one would expect from a premier housing program, including a dining facility.

The University Lofts, opened in 2002, contain fully-furnished, loft-style apartments that blend urban style with modern features.

All residence halls feature a full range of amenities including study and community lounge areas, laundry facilities, 24/7 security patrols, on-site or nearby parking and more.

STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT

GEORGIA STATE ATHLETICS IS COMMITTED to providing educational, personal and community development that will enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience.

Georgia State's commitment to academic support and student-athlete development is paying dividends as the Panthers are enjoying unprecedented success in the classroom.

Georgia State's Student-Athlete Development department became just the second in the nation to be certified at the highest level by the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics.

The Georgia State program is headed by Associate Director of Athletics Brad Horton. Working directly with the football program are Assistant Directors Brittany Price and Jessica Summey and Academic Coordinator Britta DeLay.

SUCCESS IN THE CLASSROOM:

- Panther athletic teams have combined for a cumulative department grade-point average of at least 3.0 for 12 consecutive semesters
- The 3.06 cumulative grade-point average by all student-athletes in the spring of 2014 was the best semester GPA on record, and the second straight semester with at least a 3.05
- In the most recent release, Georgia State led all Sun Belt schools in Graduation Success Rate at 86 percent, above the national average of 81 percent
- A total of 13 student-athletes across nine sports have earned academic All-America honors since 1989, including one who was the 2013 NCAA Elite 89 Award winner in men's tennis

MARK P. BECKER

SINCE BEGINNING HIS TENURE as Georgia State University's seventh president in January 2009, President Mark P. Becker has led the institution through a dynamic period of major growth and advancement.

Under his leadership, the university adopted a comprehensive 10-year strategic plan aimed at making Georgia State one of the nation's premier urban research universities.

With a 10 percent increase in graduation rates in the last five years, Georgia State is achieving its vision of becoming a national model for undergraduate education by demonstrating that students of all backgrounds can succeed at high rates. The university has been recognized by the Education Trust for eliminating disparities in graduation rates based on race or ethnicity. Diverse Issues in Higher Education places Georgia State No. 1 in the nation among non-profit institutions in graduating African-American students and in the top 50 universities for graduating Asian-Americans. Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education magazine lists Georgia State as a top 100 university for graduating Hispanics, making the university one of only two non-Florida universities in the Southeast to attain this achievement.

During Becker's tenure Georgia State has set a series of university records for retention and graduation rates, as well as for the retention of the Georgia Lottery-funded HOPE Scholarship. This progress has been achieved as enrollment has grown from about 28,000 to more than 32,000 students, and the number of applications to the university has steadily risen and now exceeds 13,000. Private scholarship funding has increased significantly, and the university has more than doubled the number of students receiving support in the last two years.

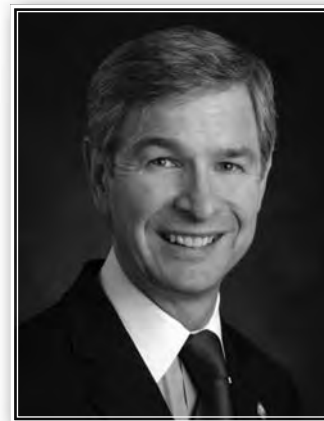
Research funding is at an all-time high, increasing nearly 15 percent in the last year alone. Federally sponsored research now accounts for 62 percent of the university's research portfolio, an important barometer of the university's research success. This growth has been aided by the Second Century Initiative, a faculty hiring program that has led to the development of new

interdisciplinary research centers.

Seeking to position Georgia State students and researchers to thrive in an increasingly complex and global landscape, Becker has worked with faculty leaders to enhance Georgia State's international profile. The university is working in five countries in which it is focusing its university-wide efforts: Brazil, China, South Africa, South Korea and Turkey.

Through its campus development, Georgia State is a major contributor to the revitalization of downtown Atlanta. Building on the work of former President Carl V. Patton, the university has expanded campus housing and dining, research and academic facilities. Georgia State enhanced its research capacity with the opening of the Parker H. "Pete" Petit Science Center in 2009 and is designing and building a second research building on the same site. The university enlarged its instructional capacity with a classroom expansion project completed in 2011. Student housing has almost doubled with the addition of Patton Hall, a Greek townhome complex, and the Piedmont North housing and dining complex. The opening of the \$10 million football practice facility enabled Georgia State to introduce its football program in fall 2010. The purchase of 3.5 acres of land on the eastern edge of the campus has made it possible for the university to have its first intramural recreation fields on its downtown campus.

The Sun Trust tower complex at 25 Park Place houses major units of the College of Arts and Sciences and the expanded university advising center. The university has a new front door for visitors with the opening last year of Centennial Hall at 100 Auburn Ave. The building houses Georgia State's Welcome Center, university administration and the recently established Honors College. A new Law School building is nearing completion, and the university has acquired 55 Park Place, a high-rise building that will be the new home of the Robinson



College of Business and the Andrew Young School of Policy Studies.

Assuring that Georgia State is appropriately partnered in Atlanta and beyond, Becker serves on multiple civic, community and professional boards.

Becker and his wife, Laura Voisin, are significant contributors to the university. They are focusing their philanthropy primarily on scholarships for students but also support the university's Library, the Rialto Center for the Arts and Georgia State's Women's Philanthropy Initiative.

Prior to his appointment as president of Georgia State, Becker was executive vice president for academic affairs and provost at the University of South Carolina.

Before assuming that role, Becker spent three years at the University of Minnesota as a biostatistics professor, dean of the School of Public Health and assistant vice president of Public Health, Preparedness and Emergency Response.

From 1989 to 2000, Becker was a professor and associate dean for academic affairs at the University of Michigan's School of Public Health. He also has held academic appointments at the University of Washington, the University of Florida and Cornell University.

Becker earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics from Towson State University in 1980, and his doctor's degree in statistics from the Pennsylvania State University in 1985. He is a Fellow of the American Statistical Association, and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Towson State and Penn State have recognized him with distinguished alumnus awards.

Becker grew up in Havre de Grace, Md., near Baltimore. He and his wife have two adult children, Matthew and Julia.

POSITION-BY-POSITION LOOK AT THE PANTHERS

POUNDING THE ROCK. That is the mantra of the Georgia State football program as the Panthers enter their second season under head coach Trent Miles and their second year in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) and Sun Belt Conference.

Miles, who executed a remarkable turnaround in five seasons at Indiana State before coming taking over the Panthers, looks to build a winning foundation for GSU's young program, which has only been playing football at any level since 2010.

To so do, Miles and his staff will rely heavily on new faces and young talent after graduating 27 seniors, including All-America wide receiver Albert Wilson, a free agent signee with the Kansas City Chiefs, and offensive tackle Ulrick John, who was drafted by the Indianapolis Colts.

The Panthers return 34 letterwinners, led by junior linebacker Joseph Peterson, an honorable mention all-conference selection in 2013 and GSU's leading tackler the last two years. The defense also features young standouts such as defensive end Shawayne Lawrence and outside linebacker Mackendy Cheridor, both sophomores, while the top returnee on offense is sophomore wide receiver Robert Davis. Senior punter Matt Hubbard is an all-star candidate.

The 2014 schedule is challenging, to say the least, as Georgia State makes trips to Washington and Clemson and hosts

Air Force in addition to navigating the Sun Belt, in which every 2013 opponent was bowl eligible.

QUARTERBACKS

The quarterback slot should feature the most interesting position battle of the preseason. Last year's starter, Ronnie Bell, returns but he was edged in the spring by junior college transfer Nick Arbuckle. The competition will continue in fall camp, when talented freshman Emiere Scaife, a 6-2, 218-pounder from Charlotte, N.C., also joins the fray.



Bell, a 5-11, 180-pound junior, set GSU season records with 2,573 yards passing and 2,686 yards of total offense and tossed 15 touchdown passes in 2013, but he completed just 50 percent of his passes and had 11 interceptions.

Arbuckle passed for nearly 7,000 yards and 73 touchdowns in two seasons at Pierce (Calif.) College. The 6-1, 230-pound Californian enrolled at Georgia State last January and immediately demonstrated leadership on the offense.

Also returning are junior Ben McLane and sophomore Clay Chastain. McLane, a 6-1, 210-pounder, started nine games in 2012 and passed for 1,592 yards and 10 touchdowns but threw 11 interceptions. Chastain, who stands 6-4 and 215 pounds, took a redshirt year in 2013 after transferring from Georgia Military College.

RUNNING BACKS

The Panthers are likely to use several ball carriers, including returnees Kyler Neal, Jonathan Jean-Bart, Gerald Howse and Duvall Smith, along with true freshman Krysten Hammon.

Neal, a sophomore, saw some action as a true freshman, carrying 24 times for 96 yards and then showed good progress in the spring. Jean-Bart, another sophomore, is the top returning rusher with 269 yards and one touchdown on 71 attempts. Howse and Smith, both seniors, had limited duty last fall.

Hammon is a promising rookie who rushed for nearly 2,000 yards as a senior at Dickinson High School in Houston, Texas.

WIDE RECEIVERS

The wide receiver position is one of several areas that were decimated by graduation. The most glaring absence is the loss of All-American Albert Wilson, who owns every Georgia State record for receiving, returns and all-purpose yardage, including 71 catches for 1,117 yards and eight touchdowns and 2,238 all-purpose yards last fall.

But in addition to Wilson, the

Panthers also graduated the school's second-leading receiver in Danny Williams, as well as three other receivers.

The position still does feature one of Georgia State's top returnees in sophomore Robert Davis. The 6-3, 198-pounder from Warner Robins, Ga., should contend for all-conference honors this fall after a strong freshman season in which he was the team's second-leading receiver with 44 catches for 711 yards and four touchdowns. He was the only freshman to rank among the Sun Belt top 10 in receiving yards and receptions, and just four freshmen in the nation averaged more receiving yards per game.

Senior Lynquez Blair has seen limited action in his first three years, but he was one of the Panthers' most improved players in the spring and looks to step into a more prominent role in his final season. He has 16 catches for 145 yards over the last two seasons.

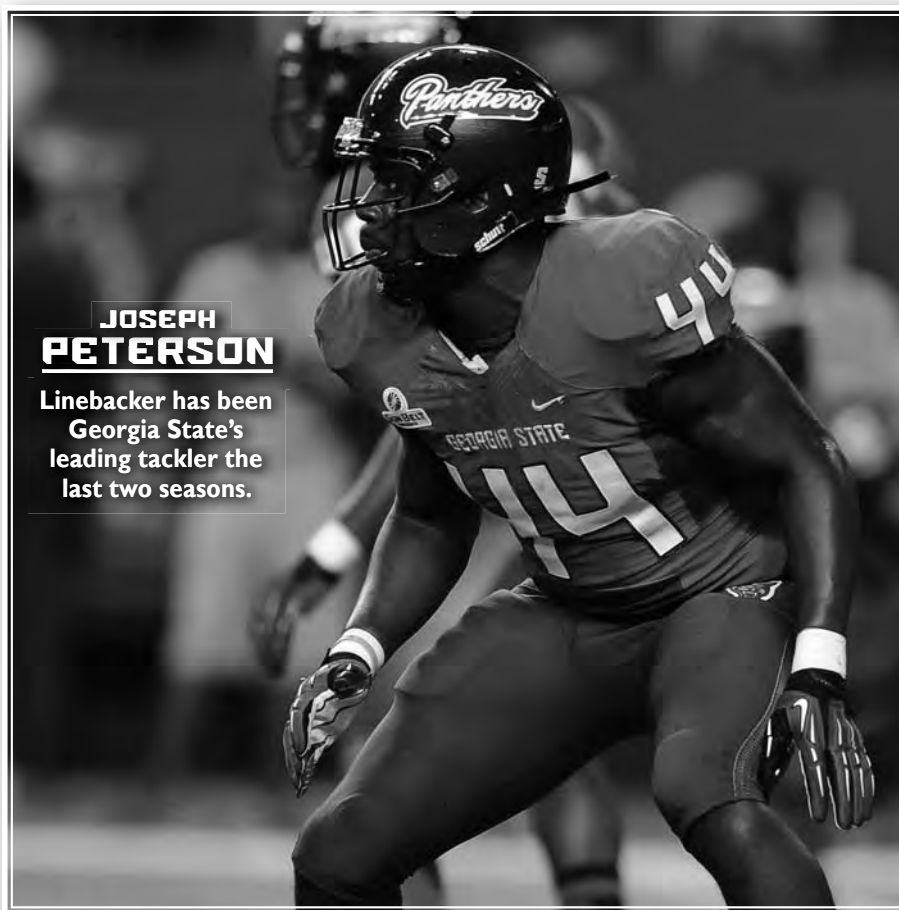
Two wide receivers are expected to contribute after coming off season-

ending knee injuries in 2013. Junior Nathaniel Minor, who caught seven passes for 59 yards in 2012, will be ready for the start of fall camp, while junior transfer Donovan Harden should be available early in the season. Harden played two seasons at Illinois State, where he had 46 receptions for 617 yards and six touchdowns in 2012. Junior Avery Sweeting is a potential deep threat with very good speed.

The Panthers will also look to their 2014 signing class for contributions at wide receiver from freshmen Tevish Clark, Maaseiah Francis and Glenn Smith and junior college transfer Michael Harrison.

TIGHT ENDS

An impact newcomer for the Panthers could earn the starting berth here in 6-4, 230-pound junior Joel Ruiz, who set out the 2013 season after transferring from Presbyterian.

SEASON PREVIEW

Ruiz teams with returning starter Keith Rucker, a 6-3, 235-pound sophomore, to give the Panthers a solid tandem at tight end. Rucker was GSU's fifth-leading receiver as a true freshman with 14 catches for 232 yards, including a career-high 121 yards against UL Lafayette.

Another promising tight end is redshirt freshman Bill Teknipp, who returns from a season-ending knee injury he sustained after playing in the first three games of 2013.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Panthers will feature a rebuilt offensive line after graduating three starters, including Indianapolis Colts draft pick Ulrick John.

The top returnee is versatile senior A.J. Kaplan, who is slated at left guard after starting at every position on the line except center last fall.

The 6-4, 270-pound Kaplan is joined by three talented junior college transfers to form the core of the offensive line. The

tackle positions feature 6-5, 340-pound Michael Ivory from Coffeyville (Kan.) C.C. on the left side, and 6-6, 315-pound Steve Wolgamott from Butler (Kan.) C.C. at right tackle. Taylor Evans, a 6-4, 285-pounder from Saddleback (Calif.) College, emerged from spring practice as the starting center.

Senior Tim Wynn, 6-3, 285, is another versatile veteran who has 21 career starts at guard and center. True freshman Alex Stoeher, a 6-2, 300-pounder who enrolled last January, made an impression at right guard in spring practice.

Other linemen with starting experience include 6-1, 280-pound senior Ronald Martin, who started two games at center last fall, and 6-4, 290-pound sophomore Garrett Gorringer, who made five starts at guard.

Also adding depth are 6-3, 286-pound sophomore center Mark Ruskell, 6-4, 290-pound sophomore tackle Jah-Mai Davidson, 6-4, 300-pound redshirt freshman guard Davis Moore,

and 6-5, 279-pound redshirt freshman Sebastian Willer, a convert from tight end who is working at left tackle. True freshman Gabe Mobley, 6-2 and 275 pounds, joins the mix this fall.



DEFENSIVE LINE

Georgia State's defensive line is filled with young talent, led by sophomore defensive end Shawayne Lawrence.

Lawrence, 6-4 and 270 pounds, started at 11 games at defensive end with 25 tackles and 3.5 tackles for loss despite being the youngest player on the team; he did not turn 18 until the final week of the season.

He will line up alongside another Lawrence, 6-1, 280-pound sophomore noseguard Jalen, who played in every game and made one start as a true freshman. Junior David Huey, 6-2 and 290 pounds, backs up at noseguard.

Sophomore ends Tevin Jones, 6-4 and 270 pounds, and Carnell Hopson, 6-2 and 260 pounds, were also thrown into the fire as true freshmen and will benefit from the year of experience. Redshirt freshmen Will Cunningham, 6-1 and 270 yards, and sophomore Tanner Strickland, 6-3 and 270 pounds, should also see action.

LINEBACKERS

The linebacker corps features the veteran duo of Joseph Peterson and Sean Jeppesen on the inside, and budding standout Mackendy Cheridor on the outside.

Peterson, a 6-0, 220-pound junior, is the Panthers' top returnee after earning honorable mention All-Sun Belt honors last fall, when he set the GSU season record with 103 tackles. He was also the Panthers' top tackler as a true freshman, giving him 168 career hits.

Jeppesen, a 6-0, 230-pound senior, is a former starting fullback who moved to linebacker for the final three games of last season. After playing both ways for those three games, he moved to defense full-time in the spring and takes over as the "mike" linebacker.

Backups at inside linebacker include sophomores Jameel Spencer and Kight Dallas, who gained experience as true freshmen last fall, and redshirt freshman Trey Payne. True freshmen Michael Shaw and Malik Ricks could also make an impact.

At outside linebacker, the 6-5, 250-pound Cheridor was a force as a

true freshman last fall, when he moved into the starting lineup midway through the season and finished with 34 tackles and 7.5 tackles for loss. Behind Cheridor are junior Melvin King and freshman Niemus Bryant.

At the other outside linebacker spot, junior college transfer Sheldon Wynn will have an opportunity to earn a starting berth, along with senior Jarrell Robinson, who has career totals of 96 tackles, 12 tackles for loss and two interceptions. Senior Spencer Haywood adds depth.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The secondary position was hard-hit by graduation, losing four cornerbacks and three safeties, so this group will feature many new faces, along with one familiar face in a new place.

Junior Tarris Batiste was the Panthers' second-leading tackler a year ago while playing outside linebacker, but he worked at safety in the spring to lend a veteran presence to an otherwise inexperienced secondary. Batiste made 77 tackles in 2013, including a team-high 9.5 tackles for loss.

Along with Batiste, the Panthers will look to junior college safety Nate Simon. Another junior college transfer, Sheldon Wynn, will get a look at Batiste's former outside linebacker spot but could also be an option at safety.

Other candidates at safety include a trio of sophomores in Bryan Williams, who missed the 2013 season with a back injury; Trent Hill, who made nine tackles in seven games; and LaDarion Young, who collected 22 tackles.

Newcomers will feature prominently at cornerback with 2014 signee Marcus Caffey, a transfer from Iowa Western C.C. who originally signed with Kentucky out of high school, and Bruce Dukes, a transfer from UCF, looking to earn starting berths.

Sophomores Myles Morris and Robert Dowling gained experience in 2013, and freshmen B.J. Clay, who enrolled in January, Antreal Allen and Chandon Sullivan should also be in the mix.

Secondary prospects in the freshman class also include cornerback Jerome Smith and safety Ronald Peterkin.

SPECIALISTS

Georgia State returns a pair of experienced kickers in senior punter Matt Hubbard and junior place-kicker Wil Lutz.

Hubbard is an all-conference candidate with a career average of 42.3 yards per punt, including a 42.0-yard norm last season. He previously earned second-team all-league honors in the Colonial Athletic Association as a sophomore, and he received third-team mention from College Sports Madness last fall.

Lutz is a two-year starter who made eight of 12 field goals last fall, highlighted by his school-record 53-yarder at top-ranked Alabama.

Freshman place-kicker Evan Pantels adds depth.

At long snapper, sophomore Justin Forrister is expected to take over for four-year starter Scotty McQueen, but former offensive lineman Daniel Zeigler will now concentrate on long-snapping.

TRENT MILES HEAD COACH

A PROVEN PROGRAM-BUILDER, Trent Miles was introduced as Georgia State's second head football coach on Dec. 3, 2012 and charged with the task of building the fledgling program as it jumped to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) and the Sun Belt Conference.

Miles, a former assistant coach at Stanford, Notre Dame and Washington, demonstrated the ability to build a winning program in five seasons as the head coach at Indiana State. The remarkable rebuilding job he did there earned notice, and Georgia State President Mark P. Becker and then-Director of Athletics Cheryl L. Levick jumped at the chance to bring Miles to Atlanta following the retirement of Bill Curry, the program's head coach from its inception in 2008.

Taking over a Georgia State program that had been playing for just three seasons, Miles immediately began to lay the foundation to enable the Panthers to compete at the highest level of college football. Miles and his staff are building the program through recruiting, player development and the establishment of a winning culture, all within the framework of a strong family atmosphere.

"We are committed to building this

program into one that competes for championships on the field and in the classroom," Miles said upon his hiring. "We will strive to represent our student body, alumni and the state of Georgia with character and integrity."

Despite playing at the FBS level for the first time with an undermanned roster, Miles' first Georgia State team showed progress throughout the 2013 season. Taking Miles' mantra of "Pounding the Rock" to heart, the Panthers earned respect for their hard-nosed play and competitiveness throughout a challenging season.

Under Miles' tutelage, wide receiver and return specialist Albert Wilson earned all-conference and All-America recognition with a record-setting season in 2013. Following the season, Wilson became the first Georgia State player to earn an invitation to the prestigious National Football League Scouting Combine and signed a free agent contract

with the Kansas City Chiefs. Miles also helped develop Ulrick John into an NFL prospect as the offensive tackle was drafted in the seventh round by the Indianapolis Colts, becoming the second draft pick in Georgia State's brief history.

Miles' emphasis on the total development of his student-athletes was in evidence as the Panthers earned the Sun Belt Conference's team academic award as the football program with highest grade point average in the league.

Miles' first head-coaching job was at his alma mater, Indiana State, where he took over a struggling program that had won just one game in the three seasons before his arrival in 2008. But it took just three years for him to produce a winning season, the first of three straight winning campaigns for Miles in Terre Haute.

After leading his 2010 Sycamores to a 6-5 mark for the school's first winning record since 1996, Miles was recognized as Missouri Valley Football Conference



Coach of the Year. He was named a finalist for the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year honor.

Miles guided ISU to another winning season in 2011 and then a 7-4 record in 2012, including a 5-3 mark in the MVFC. No Sycamore team had won more games since the 1984 squad on which Miles played, and the school's run of three straight winning seasons under Miles was the longest in Terre Haute since ISU had six straight from 1964-69.

Following the 2012 season, Miles was honored as the American Football Coaches Association Region Four Coach of the Year, earning that distinction for the second time in three seasons.

Under Miles' direction, ISU rose as high as No. 14 in the national polls and up to No. 5 in the GridIron Power Index in 2012. The No. 14 national ranking in The Sports Network Top 25 was the Sycamores' highest since joining the MVFC in 1987 as well as the highest in the Trent Miles era.

The highlight of the 2012 season was the Sycamores' 17-14 road victory at No. 1-ranked North Dakota State, the

defending FCS champion.

In his last two seasons at Indiana State, Miles coached one of the top players in the FCS ranks in running back Shakir Bell. A first-team All-American as a sophomore in 2011, Bell led the nation in rushing with 151.8 yards per game and tied for second in voting for the Walter Payton Award as the top player in the FCS. Bell was one of two first-team All-Americans who Miles coached in 2011 as defensive end Ben Obaseki was also named to the Associated Press first team. They were the first two AP first-team All-Americans in school history.

In 2012, Bell ranked sixth nationally in rushing (134.1 ypg) and again earned All-America accolades from AP (third team) and The Sports Network (second team). Cornerback Johnny Towalid was also recognized as an All-American by AP (second team) and The Sports Network (third team).

Indiana State led the MVFC in the number of all-conference selections in both 2011 (13) and 2012 (14).

Miles achieved success in 2010 with a prolific offense that ranked in the top 15 nationally in scoring with 31.2 points per

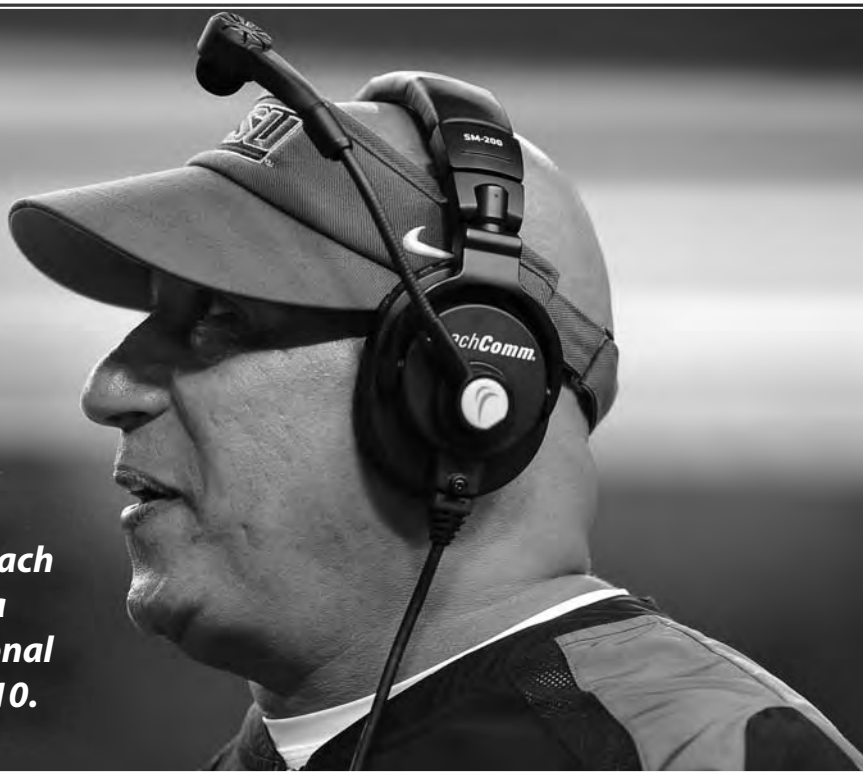
game, while his 2012 squad was built on a defense that finished third in the nation in points allowed (14.3 pg) and fifth in total defense (296.4 ypg).

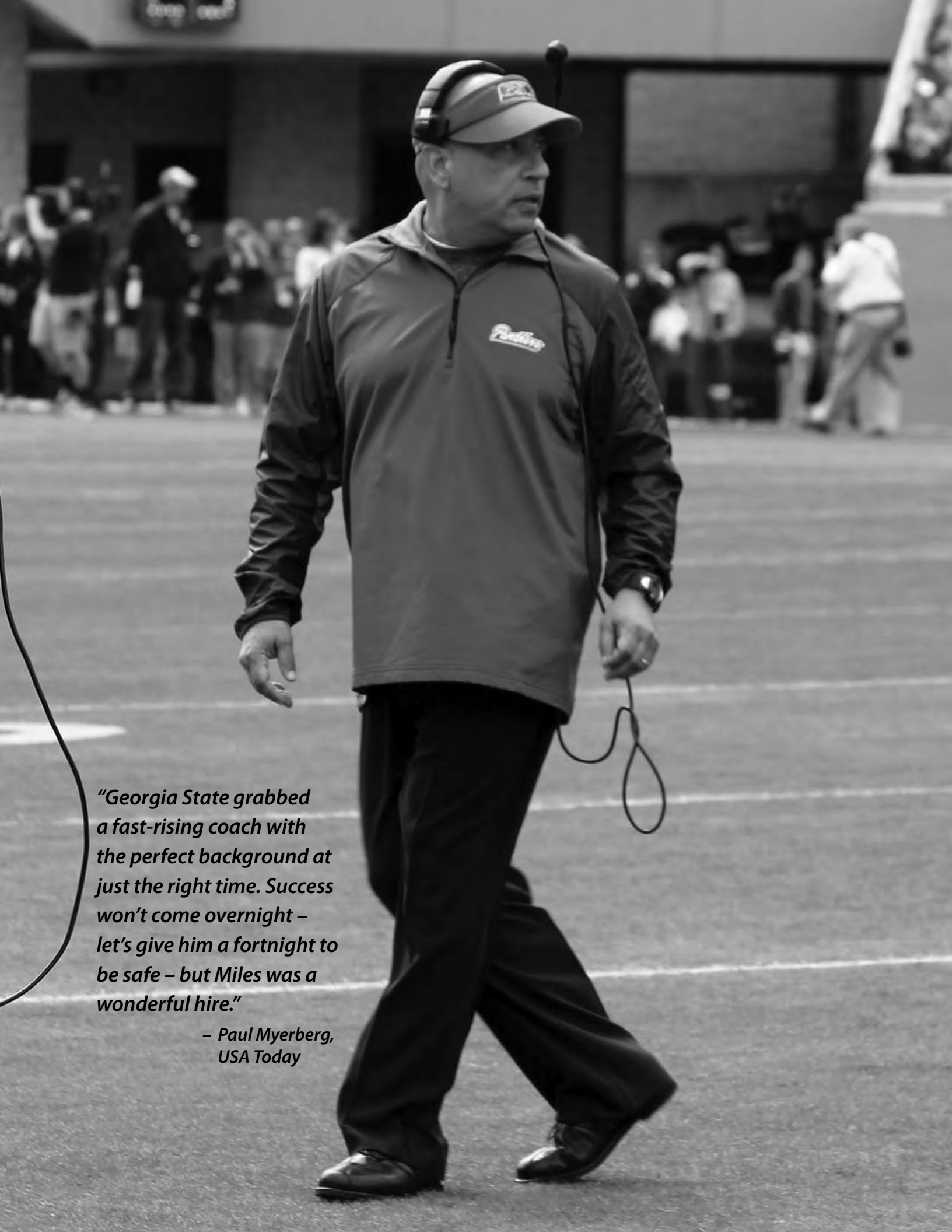
Among the many notable accomplishments by Indiana State under Miles in his last three seasons was the Sycamores' 44-16 victory over Western Kentucky in 2011, the program's first win over an FBS opponent since 2001. That 2011 Sycamore squad spent eight weeks in the national FCS polls, climbing to No. 16 in the nation.

Throughout his career, Miles has coached on both sides of the ball and possesses more than 20 years of college coaching experience as well as one year as a National Football League assistant with the Green Bay Packers. As an offensive assistant for the Packers in 2000, Miles worked with wide receivers and quality control. He coached NFL All-Pro receiver Antonio Freeman.

In the seven years following at Stanford (wide receivers, 2001), Notre Dame (wide receivers, 2002-04) and Washington (running backs, 2005-07), Miles also coached and developed many talented skill players. Among his pupils

Miles has twice been named AFCA Region Coach of the Year and was a finalist for several national coaching honors in 2010.

were: Stanford's Teyo Johnson, a second-round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2003; Notre Dame's Maurice Stovall and Arnaz Battle, both of whom went on to the NFL; Jeff Samardzija, an All-America wide receiver at Notre Dame who is now a Major League Baseball pitcher; and Louis Rankin, a 1,000-yard rusher at Washington.

Miles began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Indiana State (1987), New Mexico (1988-89) and Oklahoma (1990). While at New Mexico, one of his mentors was Marvin Lewis, now the head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Miles moved to an assistant coaching position at Northern Illinois for four seasons, working with receivers (1991-93) and then defensive backs (1994). Miles then headed west for a two-year stint at Hawaii, where he coached wide receivers (1995) and defensive backs (1996).

As wide receivers coach at Fresno State from 1997-99, Miles helped the Bulldogs to a share of the 1999 Mountain West Conference title and a berth in the Las Vegas Bowl. He also recruited and coached future NFL standout Bernard Berrian.

Miles, 50, is a native of Terre Haute, Ind., and a 1987 graduate of Indiana State with a degree in criminology. He was a wide receiver for the Sycamores from 1982-86, playing on the 1983 and 1984 squads that each won nine games and advanced to the FCS playoffs. The 1984 Sycamores were ranked No. 1 in the nation for much of the season, and that team was inducted into the Indiana State University Hall of Fame in 2002.

He is married to the former Bridget Hogan, and the couple has three daughters, Kaylee, Anna, and Charlie Elizabeth, and one son, Noah Michael.



HAROLD ETHERIDGE

Assistant Head Coach / Offensive Line

Second Year at GSU

Harold Etheridge, a veteran coach with more than two decades of experience, enters his second season at Georgia State after joining Trent Miles' coaching staff in 2013 as the offensive line coach and assistant head coach.

Etheridge previously worked with Miles for three seasons at Indiana State (2010-12), helping the Sycamores post three consecutive winning seasons for the first time since the 1960s.

In his first season at Georgia State, Etheridge helped develop offensive tackle Ulrick John into a National Football League prospect. John was selected in the seventh round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts.

At Indiana State, Etheridge served as Miles' offensive coordinator the last two years at Indiana State and his offensive line coach for three seasons.

In two years as the Sycamores' offensive coordinator, Etheridge produced one of the nation's top rushers in running back Shakir Bell. A first-team All-American as a sophomore in 2011, Bell led the nation in rushing with 151.8 yards per game and



was tied for second in voting for the Walter Payton Award as the top player in the FCS. In 2012, Bell ranked sixth nationally in rushing (134.1 ypg) while earning second-team All-America honors.

Between the 2010 and 2012 seasons, Indiana State had 17 offensive players earn all-conference recognition, including five offensive linemen.

Etheridge joined Miles' ISU staff in 2010 and made an immediate impact in the program's remarkable turnaround. The offensive line blocked for a unit that ranked 14th in the nation in scoring with 31.2 points per game for a school-record 351 points and 17th in total offense at 411.8 yards per game, helping the Sycamores post a 6-5 record for their first winning season since 1996.

Before going to ISU, Etheridge spent the previous two years coaching the offensive line at Washington State (2008-09) and one year in the same role at Northern Illinois (2007).

During a three-year stint as the offensive line coach at North Texas (2004-06), Etheridge produced a line that blocked for the nation's leading rusher in 2004 in Jamario Thomas, who ran for 180.1 yards per game. The Mean Green won the Sun Belt Conference title and earned a berth in the New Orleans Bowl.

Etheridge began his coaching career in the high school ranks, first at Gallup (N.M.) High School (1983-86) and then Ballard (Ky.) High School (1987-88).

From there, he moved to a collegiate position at Kentucky, serving as a graduate assistant working with offensive tackles in 1989-90. He worked under GSU's first head coach Bill Curry in his second season at UK.

Etheridge then spent the next nine seasons as the offensive line coach at Illinois State, helping the Redbirds earn a spot in the NCAA FCS playoffs in 1998 before winning the Gateway Conference title and reaching the FCS semifinal game in 1999.

In 2000, he moved with head coach Todd Berry to Army and coached the Black Knights' offensive line for four seasons.

A native of Gallup, N.M., Etheridge was a four-year starting offensive guard for Western New Mexico (1979-82). He earned a bachelor's degree in marketing and management from the school in 1982.

Etheridge, who in 2001 published a book entitled "Coaching the Front Liners," and his wife, Jeanne, are the parents of twins, Clayton and Eliza.





JEFF JAGODZINSKI

Offensive Coordinator
Second Year at GSU

Jeff Jagodzinski, a long-time National Football League assistant coach and a successful collegiate head coach, is the offensive coordinator on Trent Miles' Georgia State staff.

Before joining the GSU staff in 2013, Jagodzinski previously worked with Miles on the Green Bay Packers' staff in 2000.

Jagodzinski made an immediate impact at Georgia State, where his offense produced a record-setting season for wide receiver Albert Wilson. Wilson earned all-conference and All-America recognition, was invited to the National Football League Scouting Combine and signed a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs. Another offensive starter, tackle Ulrick John, was drafted in the seventh round by the Indianapolis Colts.

Jagodzinski is well-acquainted with the city of Atlanta, having served as the Atlanta Falcons' tight ends coach in 2004 and then offensive line coach in 2005. He is also familiar to Atlanta fans as the college head coach of Falcons' quarterback Matt Ryan.

Jagodzinski enjoyed two highly successful seasons as the head coach at Boston College, posting a 20-8 record and capturing back-to-back Atlantic Coast Conference Atlantic Division crowns. In 2007, with Ryan at quarterback, Jagodzinski

led the Eagles to an 11-3 record—BC's highest win total since 1940—a berth in the ACC Championship game and a bowl-game victory over Michigan State.

In addition to the exploits of ACC Player of the Year Ryan on offense, Jagodzinski's first BC squad also featured a strong defense that was No. 2 in the nation against the run. Safety Jamie Silva was a first-team All-America selection.

Even after Ryan became the No. 2 pick in the 2008 NFL draft following, Jagodzinski kept BC winning in 2008 with a 9-5 record and another trip to the ACC title game.

Along with Ryan, Jagodzinski coached three other future first-round draft picks at Boston College in nose tackle B.J. Raji (2009, Green Bay) and offensive linemen Gosder Cherilus (2008, Detroit) and Anthony Castonzo (2011, Indianapolis).

Jagodzinski began his coaching career in 1985 as the running backs coach at his alma mater, Wisconsin-Whitewater. In 1986, he served as the offensive line coach at Northern Illinois before spending two years (1987-88) as a graduate assistant at LSU.

In 1989, Jagodzinski began an eight-year stint as the offensive line coach at East Carolina (1989-96), highlighted by the 1991 season, when the Pirates posted an 11-1 record. That ECU team featured future NFL quarterback Jeff Blake.

He then spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator at Boston College (1997-98) on Tom O'Brien's staff. At BC, Jagodzinski's offenses averaged more than 400 yards per game in each of his two seasons, featuring future Pro Bowl quarterback Matt Hasselbeck in 1997 and All-American running back Mike Cloud in 1998, who ranked third in the nation in rushing.

Jagodzinski began his NFL career in 1999, joining the Green Bay Packers as tight ends coach from 1999-2003. It was there that he worked with Miles in 2000.



He then moved to the Atlanta Falcons, where he served as tight ends in coach in 2004, helping Atlanta reach the NFC Championship game, and then offensive line coach in 2005. During that time, the Falcons featured one of the NFL's most successful rushing offenses, leading the league in both rushing yards per game and rushing yards per carry those two years. In 2005, Jagodzinski's line blocked for Pro Bowl running back Warrick Dunn, who gained over 1,400 yards.

Jagodzinski returned to the Packers as offensive coordinator for one season (2006) before taking over as head coach at Boston College. Under his direction, Green Bay ranked among the top 10 in the NFL in total offense.

In college and the NFL, Jagodzinski has been part of offensive staffs that worked with future Pro Bowl quarterbacks Brett Favre, Michael Vick, Aaron Rogers and Matt Ryan.

He served as the head coach of the Omaha Nighthawks of the UFL in 2010, and in 2012, he worked as a volunteer assistant coach at Ave Maria University in Florida.

Jagodzinski was a three-year starter and four-year player (1981-84) at fullback at Wisconsin-Whitewater. He earned a B.S. degree in education at UW-Whitewater in 1985.

Jagodzinski and his wife, Lisa, have five children: Josh, JoAnne, Jessica, Jacqueline and Jennifer.





JESSE MINTER

Defensive Coordinator
Second Year at GSU

Jesse Minter, formerly the defensive coordinator under Trent Miles at Indiana State, followed Miles to Georgia State in 2013 to be the Panthers' defensive coordinator.

In his first season with the Panthers, Minter worked with a young GSU defense that relied upon numerous true freshmen. The defense produced All-Sun Belt Conference linebacker Joseph Peterson, who collected more than 100 tackles.

In 2012 in his final season at Indiana State, Minter constructed a defensive unit that ranked third in the FCS in



scoring defense, allowing just 14.3 points per game, and sixth nationally in total defense at 296.4 yards per game. The Sycamores also ranked fifth nationally in pass efficiency defense, 14th in passing yards allowed and 28th in rushing yards allowed.

One of the highlights of the 2012 season was Indiana State's 17-14 road victory at No. 1-ranked and defending FCS champion North Dakota State. In that game, cornerback Johnny Towalid scored 14 points for ISU by returning a pair of interceptions for touchdowns.

Over the 2011-12 seasons, 13 Indiana State defensive standouts earned All-Missouri Valley Football Conference honors.

Minter originally joined Miles' defensive staff at Indiana State in 2009 before being elevated to the coordinator position for the 2011 season. He was a key component in the Sycamores' remarkable turnaround under Miles that saw ISU post a winning season in 2010 for the first time since 1996. The program added winning

campaigns in 2011 and 2012 to give ISU three consecutive winning seasons for the first time since the 1960s.

Minter went to Indiana State following two years as a graduate assistant at Cincinnati, where he served on Brian Kelly's staff, working with the defensive staff and assisting in coaching the linebackers. The Bearcats won the Big East Conference title in 2008 and earned a BCS berth in the Orange Bowl. The Cincinnati defense led the nation in takeaways in 2007.

Minter spent the 2006 season as a football intern at Notre Dame, when the Irish posted a 10-3 record.

He played college football at the College of Mount St. Joseph (Ohio), which compiled a school-record 30-10 mark during his four years, including back-to-back conference titles and Division III playoff appearances.

A native of Yorktown, Ind., Minter is married to the former Rachelle Wittich. His father is former Cincinnati head football coach Rick Minter.





LUKE HUARD

Quarterbacks

Second Year at GSU

Luke Huard, formerly the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Illinois State, joined the Georgia State coaching staff for the 2013 season as the quarterbacks coach under head coach Trent Miles.

Huard's impact was evident in his first season with the Panthers as quarterback Ronnie Bell set GSU records with more than 2,500 yards of passing and total offense.

Before coming to GSU in 2013, Huard spent the previous four seasons at Illinois State, including one year (2009) as quarterbacks coach before he was elevated to offensive coordinator for his last three seasons (2010-12) there.

In 2012, Huard's unit led the Missouri Valley Football Conference in passing and total offense as the Redbirds averaged



better than 30 points a game while compiling a 9-4 record and advancing to the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs.

In his four years at ISU, Huard developed quarterback Matt Brown, who was the MVFC Newcomer of the Year in 2009, a three-time all-conference honoree and the MVFC Offensive Player of the Year in 2012.

Huard previously worked with Miles at Washington, where he served as a graduate assistant in 2007-08.

While at Washington, Huard worked with the Huskies' quarterbacks, including current Tennessee Titans' signal caller Jake Locker, who was the Pac-10 Newcomer of the Year in 2007.

Huard began his coaching career as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Tacoma's Washington High School following graduation from North Carolina in 2002. He then spent four seasons as the head coach at Interlake High School (Wash.), where he led the program to its first winning season in 10 years in 2004.

In 2004, he also served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the Eastside Hawks, a semi-professional football team that went 10-0 and won the Northwest Football League title.

Huard was a three-year member of the North Carolina football team. As a quarterback, he played in seven games for the Tar Heels, including four starts, as a freshman in 1999.

As a high school quarterback at Puyallup (Wash.) High School, Huard was Washington's Gatorade Player of the Year and an honorable-mention All-America selection as a senior.

Huard comes from a football family. Both of his older brothers, Brock and Damon, were standout quarterbacks at Washington and went on to play professionally in the NFL. Huard's father, Mike, coached all three sons at Puyallup High School, where he also coached future NFL quarterback Billy Joe Hobert.

Huard is married to the former Dolly Tan, and the couple recently welcomed their first child, daughter Serena Grace.





SHANNON JACKSON

Defensive Line

Second Year at GSU

Shannon Jackson is in his second year on the Georgia State football staff of head coach Trent Miles in as defensive line coach, the same position he held on Miles' staff at Indiana State the previous five years.

In 2012, Jackson, who also served as assistant head coach at Indiana State, helped coach a defense that ranked third in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 14.3 points per game, and sixth nationally in total defense at 296.4 yards per game. The Sycamores were fifth nationally in pass efficiency defense, 14th in passing yards allowed and 28th in rushing yards allowed.

The highlight of the 2012 season was Indiana State's 17-14 road victory at No. 1-ranked and defending FCS champion North Dakota State. In that game, the ISU defense scored 14 points.

In 2011, ISU defensive end Ben Obaseki earned first-team All-America honors by the Associated Press as he and teammate Shakir Bell, a running back, became the first Sycamores to earn this honor.

Jackson spent a total of 10 seasons at Indiana State, originally coaching on the Sycamores' staff from 2000-04 before returning to his alma mater in 2008 when Miles took over.

He was a key component in the Sycamores' remarkable turnaround under Miles that saw ISU post a winning season in 2010 for the first time since 1996. The program added winning campaigns in 2011 and 2012 to give ISU three consecutive winnings seasons for the first time since the 1960s.



Before returning to Indiana State, Jackson spent three years coaching the defensive line at Eastern Illinois (2005-07). In 2006, he helped coach a defensive unit that led the nation with 36 turnovers forced.



In the summer of 2003, Jackson worked with the Jacksonville Jaguars' staff through the NFL's Minority Internship Program.

After a standout playing career at Indiana State, Jackson began his coaching career in 2000 as a graduate assistant on the ISU staff, working with tight ends. He moved to a full-time position as a defensive assistant from 2001-03.

In that first stint at ISU, he tutored Kyle Mitchell, who went on to break the school sack record that Jackson himself had set during his playing days. Jackson also coached Richard Harris, who signed a free agent contract with the Tennessee Titans.

Jackson was a standout defensive lineman for the Sycamores, earning All-America recognition as a senior in 1999.

A native of Fort Wayne, Ind., Jackson earned a bachelor's degree from Indiana State in criminology in 2000. He and his wife, Sumalayo, have a son, Bryson, and a daughter, Brylee.



TIM LAPPANO

***Wide Receivers
First Year at GSU***

Tim Lappano, who possesses more than 30 years of coaching experience in major college programs and the National Football League, was named Georgia State's wide receivers coach in March 2014.

Lappano joined head coach Trent Miles' staff after five seasons with the NFL's Detroit Lions, where he coached All-Pro wide receiver Calvin Johnson in 2013. He coached the Lions' tight ends the previous four years and worked with Brandon Pettigrew, who had more than 70 receptions in back-to-back seasons.

Lappano coached with Miles for three seasons at Washington, where he served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 2005-08. Miles was on that offensive staff as running backs coach from 2005-07 before taking the head coaching job at Indiana State.

While at Washington, Lappano recruited and mentored future NFL first-round draft pick Jake Locker.

In addition to his most recent stint with the Lions, Lappano has NFL experience with the San Francisco 49ers, where he served as running backs coach



from 2003-04, and the Seattle Seahawks, where he coached running backs in 1998.

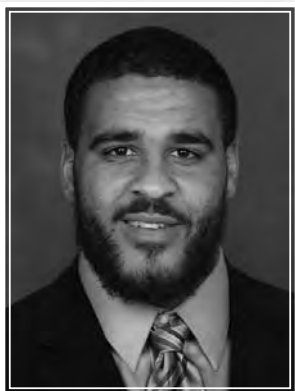
Lappano has spent 16 years with college programs in major conferences, mostly in the Pacific-10 (now Pacific-12) Conference. He served as offensive coordinator at Oregon State from 1999-2002, as assistant head coach and running backs coach at California from 1992-95, and as assistant coach at Washington State from 1987-92, including the final two years as offensive coordinator. Running Backs

Second Year at GSU

Brock Lough enters his second season on the Georgia State staff and his first as the running backs coach.

Lough originally joined Trent Miles' staff in 2013 as a graduate assistant. After working with the running backs in that capacity in 2013, he was elevated to a full-time coaching position for 2014.



Lough is well-acquainted with Miles, after playing for him and working under him at Indiana State.

Before coming to GSU, Lough served as a volunteer assistant coach at Terre Haute South High School and worked S.O.S. High School Skills Camp in Indianapolis, Ind.

Lough began his coaching career as a student assistant with the Sycamores during the 2012 season.

A native of Terre Haute, Ind., Lough was an all-conference fullback for the Sycamores. Following his senior season of 2011, he signed a free agent contract with the Cincinnati Bengals and attended the team's rookie minicamp.

He earned his bachelor's degree from Indiana State in 2012.



P.J. VOLKER

Linebackers / Recruiting Coordinator
Second Year at GSU

P.J. Volker joined head coach Trent Miles' Georgia State football staff in 2013 as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator after serving in the same capacity under Miles at Indiana State.

In his first season at Georgia State, Volker coached all-conference linebacker Joseph Peterson, who set the Panthers' single-season record with 103 tackles.

Volker spent three years (2010-12) with Miles as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator for the Sycamores, helping ISU post three straight winning seasons.



In 2012, he helped coach a defensive unit that ranked third in the FCS in scoring defense, allowing just 14.3 points per game, and sixth nationally in total defense at 296.4 yards per game. One of the highlights for ISU's defense in 2012 was an outstanding performance in the Sycamores' stunning 17-14 upset at No. 1-ranked North Dakota State, in which the defense accounted for 14 points.

Over his three seasons, seven Indiana State linebackers were named to the all-conference team, including three-time selection Aaron Archie, who made over 100 tackles each of the last two years.

Volker originally joined Miles' defensive staff at Indiana State in 2010 and took part in bringing about the program's dramatic turnaround. In his first year, the Sycamores posted a breakout season with a 6-5 record in 2010, their first winning season since 1996.

Volker went to ISU in 2010 from Thomas More College, a Division III program in Kentucky where he coached the linebackers and served as the program's recruiting coordinator. He began his coaching career as the running backs coach at Thiel College.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Volker was a three-year letterwinner and two-time all-conference selection at the College of Mount St. Joseph (Ohio). He was recently honored with the school's Future Five Award, which honors alumni who have graduated within the last 20 years who have excelled in their professions and provided service to their communities.

He is married to the former Amanda Naseef.





J.D. WILLIAMS

Secondary / Special Teams

Second Year at GSU

J.D. Williams, who combines 17 years of college coaching experience with a successful career in the National Football League, enters his second season at Georgia State as the secondary coach and special teams coordinator on head coach Trent Miles' staff.

In 2013, the GSU special teams featured all-conference return specialist Albert Wilson, who ranked in the top five in the Sun Belt Conference in punt returns and kickoff returns.

Williams, a former first-round NFL draft pick who was a member of four Super Bowl teams with the Buffalo Bills, came to Georgia State in 2013 after three seasons on the defensive staff at UNLV. He also has seven years of experience in the Pac-10 (now the Pac-12) and previously worked with Miles at both Washington and Fresno State.

At UNLV, Williams served two seasons (2010-11) as the Runnin' Rebels' assistant head coach, secondary coach and pass defense coordinator before he was elevated to defensive coordinator in 2012, when he continued to coach the defensive backs.

Williams went to UNLV after spending the 2009 season as the cornerbacks coach at Utah. The Utes posted a 10-3 record, including a victory over Washington in the Poinsettia Bowl, and ranked 16th in the nation in passing yards and ninth in pass efficiency defense.

That followed three seasons at Washington (2006-08) and four seasons at California (2002-05). At Washington, he worked on the same staff with Miles



his first two years. During his tenure at California, Williams helped the Golden Bears to a 33-17 overall record and three bowl game appearances.



Williams moved into coaching in 1997 after his NFL playing career, beginning as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Fresno State, where Miles was on the coaching staff. He then coached the secondary at San Jose State in 1998 and Cal Poly in 1999 before returning to Fresno State as secondary coach for two years (2000-01). He helped the Bulldogs to an 18-7 record and a pair of bowl berths.

After a standout playing career at Fresno State, Williams was a first-round NFL Draft pick in 1990, going to the Buffalo Bills with the 16th selection. He went on to play on the Bills' four Super Bowl teams from 1990-93, including Super Bowl XXVIII at the Georgia Dome. He also played for the Arizona Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers before his six-year pro career ended after the 1996 season.

Williams, from Coalinga, Calif., earned his bachelor's degree in criminology from Fresno State in 1997. He and his wife, Jamie, have four children: Nicole, Kyra, Zoe and David.

2013 GAME SUMMARIES

SAMFORD 31, GEORGIA STATE 21

Game 1: Aug. 30, 2013 • 7 p.m. (ESPN3)

Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

Quarterback Ronnie Bell threw for 391 yards and three touchdowns but Georgia State dropped its inaugural game in the Football Bowl Subdivision as Samford rallied with 24 straight second-half points for a 31-21 victory in the Georgia Dome.

Senior receiver Kelton Hill caught a pair of first-half touchdown passes from Bell as the Panthers built a 14-7 lead going into halftime. Hill's touchdowns made him the first in GSU history to have a career TD by passing, rushing and receiving.

The Bulldogs then scored three touchdowns in the span of eight minutes in the third and fourth quarters to open a lead late in the ballgame.

Senior Albert Wilson caught eight passes for 167 yards, including a 40-yard touchdown catch in the fourth quarter. That effort is the second-most receiving yards in a single game for a Panther receiver, behind Wilson's own 175-yard outing against South Alabama in 2011.

Not only was the game the Panthers' first in the FBS, but it was also the opening game under the direction of head coach Trent Miles.

"It was a tough start, but I am very proud of our young men," Miles said. "They competed and we've got to teach them how to win. They responded well and didn't hang their heads. When something went wrong they kept fighting back."

Samford running back Fabian Truss rushed for 78 yards and a fourth-quarter touchdown. Truss also returned the game's opening kickoff 100 yards for the first score of the contest. The return marked the first time the Panthers have allowed a kickoff return for a touchdown in program history.

Bell completed 28 of 51 passes, but also had two costly interceptions. One of those was returned for a touchdown by Samford cornerback Jaquiski Tarrt, proving to be the turning point of the game and momentum shift.

Tarrt's touchdown tied the game at 14-14 heading into the fourth quarter. Samford then went on a 10-play, 62-yard drive, capped by Truss' one-yard scoring run, to take the lead for good with 11:21 to play at 21-14.

GSU outgained Samford in total yards 463-298 and ran 76 plays to 67 by Samford.

After the Panthers fell behind 7-0, Bell guided GSU on a seven-play, 73-yard drive, hitting Hill for a 21-yard touchdown to even the score with 7:17 to play in the first quarter.

Bell and Hill hooked up again in the second quarter, this time for a 17-yard scoring play to cap an 87-yard drive and put the Panthers ahead 14-7 with 12:48 left in the first half.

One of the highlights for the Georgia State defense was a goal-line stand on which the Panthers stopped Samford three times inside the 1-yard line. On third-and-goal at the 1, Terrance Woodard stopped Truss for no gain, and then on fourth down, Truss again gained nothing and the Panthers celebrated, but GSU was flagged for being offside. This time, Tarris Batiste tackled Summerlin for a 3-yard loss to give possession back to the Panthers.

CHATTANOOGA 42, GEORGIA STATE 14

Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

Chattanooga collected 401 yards rushing on the way to a 42-14 victory over Georgia State at the Georgia Dome.

Georgia State wide receiver Albert Wilson had seven catches for 132 yards and two touchdowns, his second straight 100-yard effort and the eighth of his career.

In the fourth quarter, Georgia State inserted quarterback Ben McLane, who led the Panther offense to consecutive scoring drives in less than a minute and a half.

McLane connected with Wilson for touchdowns of five and 30 yards to cap both drives.

McLane replaced starting QB Ronnie Bell, who completed 9-of-22 pass attempts during the first three quarters but was frequently pressured. McLane was 7-of-12 and finished with 164 yards.

"Ronnie got beat up," head coach Trent Miles said. "He was running for his life. They manhandled us up front. They got pressure on our quarterback, and we weren't able to run the football."

Freshman wide receiver Robert Davis added four catches for 100 yards, giving the Panthers two 100-yard receivers in the same game for just the second time in school history.

Panther punter Matt Hubbard booted seven punts for 304 yards, or an average of 43.3 yards per kick.

Chattanooga dominated during the first three quarters, rushing for 317 yards while holding the Panthers to only 18 yards on the ground, en route to a 42-0 lead heading into the final quarter of play.

The visiting Mocs took the opening kickoff and marched 70 yards for a touchdown and a quick 7-0 lead, capped by a two-yard run by RB Keon Williams. Williams racked up a personal-best 126 yards on 20 carries.

On its second possession, Chattanooga faked a field goal, resulting in a 27-yard touchdown pass to tight end Faysal Shafaat. Shafaat caught another touchdown pass in the second quarter to establish a 21-0 score by halftime.

During the third quarter, Mocs QB Jacob Huesman scrambled for a pair of touchdowns of nine and 26 yards. Huesman totaled 86 yards on 12 rushing attempts. Chattanooga added another score on the ground at the start of the fourth quarter.

WEST VIRGINIA 41, GEORGIA STATE 7

Game 3: Sept. 14, 2013 • Noon (ROOT)

Georgia State fell at West Virginia 41-7 at Milan Puskar Stadium.

The Panthers (0-3) trailed just 10-0 late in the second quarter and 17-7 late in the third before West Virginia (2-1) pulled away. Travis Evans rushed for a career high 118 yards for the Panthers, including a 65-yard touchdown run.

Evans' scoring play is the longest run in Georgia State's brief history and the Panthers' fourth-longest play from scrimmage.

West Virginia's Charles Sims rushed for 116 yards, including a 32-yard touchdown run on the first play of the fourth quarter to put the Mountaineers ahead 27-7. Making his first start, redshirt freshman quarterback Ford Childress passed for 359 yards and three scores, completing 25-of-41 passes.

Trailing 17-0 at the half, Georgia State held the Mountaineers on the opening possession of the third quarter as Jarrell Robinson sacked Childress for a 10-yard loss on fourth-and-3, giving the Panthers the ball at their own 35-yard line. On the first play, Evans ran around the left side and broke loose down the sideline for the touchdown. That pulled GSU within 17-7 with 11:33 to play in the third quarter.

"Obviously it was blocked well, and Travis did a great job and, we're happy with that," GSU head coach Trent Miles said. "We need more of those, and we have to be able to find consistent drives."

Georgia State then forced West Virginia punt and regained possession at their own 16. But three plays netted just three yards, and the Panthers had to punt.

After the Mountaineers drove to a first down at the GSU 11, the Panther defense stiffened, and WVU settled for a 23-yard field goal by Josh Lambert and a 20-7 lead with 4:31 left in the third.

But the GSU offense was unable to sustain a drive after that, and the Mountaineers tacked on three fourth-quarter touchdowns, the last one coming with just 12 seconds left.

"I thought our kids battled, but that should be a given. Obviously we're very disappointed with the result," Miles said. "I'm not going to sit here and tell you that we're happy with the way that we competed because that should be a given in the program. We executed poorly in certain situations, which allowed the game to get a little out of hand."

JACKSONVILLE ST. 32, GEORGIA STATE 26

Game 4: Sept. 21, 2013 • 2 p.m. (ESPN3)

Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.

Despite mounting a fourth-quarter rally to tie the game and force overtime, Georgia State (0-4) fell to Jacksonville State (4-0) 32-26 in a back-and-forth contest at the Georgia Dome.

Trailing 23-9 to start the fourth quarter, the Panthers strung together two touchdowns in less than two minutes to tie the score. Both teams then traded field goals before regulation expired with the score knotted at 26-26.

After GSU missed a 42-yard field goal on the opening possession of overtime, the Gamecocks drove down the short field for the touchdown and the victory. The 25-yard drive was capped by DaMarcus James' third rushing score of the afternoon.

"With the exception of just a few plays in the game, we gave ourselves a chance to win that game at the end," GSU head coach Trent Miles said. "And I felt so bad for our young men because it didn't happen. And they're devastated, but at the same time they're committed to understanding what it takes and continue to keep working and pounding that rock every day until it breaks. And we almost got it done."

"My hats off to Jacksonville State and their program. They deserved the victory."

Facing a 14-point deficit entering the final quarter, Georgia State got a boost in momentum when cornerback C.J. Scott blocked a Jacksonville State punt and recovered the ball in the end zone for a touchdown.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Panthers' Dontavis Crocker recovered a fumble, giving GSU the ball at the 13-yard line. Quarterback Ronnie Bell finished the drive by connecting with Robert Davis for his second passing touchdown of the day.

With 2:58 left on the clock, Jacksonville State booted a 34-yard field goal to regain a three-point edge. But the Panthers used those remaining minutes to drive down and allow Wil Lutz to kick a last-second, game-tying field goal to force overtime. Bell converted on fourth-and-3 with a 17-yard run and added a 12-yard run for a first down.

Lutz finished the game 2-for-4 in field goal attempts. After converting the Panthers' first field goal of the year on a 39-yard try in the first quarter, Lutz barely missed a 50-yard field goal when the ball just glanced off the right upright.

On the first play of the game, Bell hit senior receiver Albert Wilson in stride for a 75-yard touchdown. Wilson finished the game with 158 yards on seven catches and the one score. Wilson also had 97 yards on kickoff returns, 15 yards rushing and 10 yards on punt returns for 280 all-purpose yards.

That play now stands as the fourth-longest play in Panther football history, all of which have involved Wilson. It is also the 12th play of his career covering 50 yards or more.

James supplied a pair of first-half 1-yard touchdown rushes for Jacksonville State to help the Gamecocks build a 20-9 halftime advantage. The Gamecocks benefited from a pair of Panther turnovers, which were both turned into touchdowns.

That included an interception by Bell with less than a minute to play in the half. That set up a 41-yard scoring drive for Jacksonville State capped off by a 5-yard scramble into the endzone by QB Eli Jenkins.

The teams combined for 861 yards with JSU gaining 461 and host GSU 400 yards. The Panthers ran for a season-best 150 yards with Bell scrambling for 79 of those from the pocket.

The game was the sixth overtime contest in

Georgia State football history. The Panthers hold a 2-4 record in those games, including a pair of losses to Jacksonville State. The two teams' first meeting in 2010 also ended in overtime.

Matt Hubbard tied his own school record with an 80-yard punt during the fourth quarter. Hubbard finished with four punts for 183 yards, an average of 45.8 yards per kick.

ALABAMA 45, GEORGIA STATE 3

Game 5: Oct. 5, 2013 • 12:21 p.m. (SEC TV)
Bryant-Denny Stadium • Tuscaloosa, Ala.

Georgia State fell at No. 1 Alabama 45-3 at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

Alabama (5-0) looked every bit the nation's top team and defending BCS national champions, led by quarterback A.J. McCarron, who completed 15-of-16 passes for 166 yards and four touchdowns in less than two quarters of play.

The Crimson Tide jumped on Georgia State (0-5) with 38 first-half points before the Panthers played Alabama within 7-3 in the second half.

"My hats off to Alabama - they're the No. 1 team in the nation for a reason," GSU head coach Trent Miles said. "They're a great football team, extremely talented and well-coached.

"Our young men competed hard, but when you're playing the No. 1 team in the nation at their place and you're a tremendous underdog, you can't help them. We went out and helped them in the first half. We fumbled a kickoff return, we had some missed tackles, we had some young guys not get lined up correctly. Make no mistake, Alabama did what they needed to, but we didn't need to help them.

"At halftime, we discussed coming out in the second half and playing like the score was 0-0, and it was a 7-3 ballgame in the second half," Miles continued. "We can build on that and get some momentum going into conference play."

Georgia State's Wil Lutz booted a school-record 53-yard field in the third quarter to get the Panthers on the scoreboard against an Alabama defense that has allowed just three field goals over the last three games. The previous GSU record

for longest field goal was 49 yards by Iain Vance against Morehead State in 2010.

"Coach Miles asked me if I had the distance, and I told him, 'Give me a shot,'" said Lutz, the sophomore from Newnan, Ga. "I wish it meant more, but I'm grateful for the opportunity."

GSU quarterback Ronnie Bell completed 11-of-20 passes for 146 yards. Albert Wilson was the Panthers' leading receiver with four catches for 60 yards, including a 34-yard reception that set up Lutz's field goal. Freshman Robert Davis and sophomore Avery Sweeting added three receptions each.

"Our young men are disappointed that they lost, but they're more disappointed in their overall execution in the first half," Miles said.

The Panthers only committed one turnover but the fumbled kickoff return late in the first quarter gave Alabama the ball at the GSU 10-yard line. On the next play, McCarron found DeAndrew White for a 10-yard touchdown as White made a spectacular one-handed catch to put the Crimson Tide ahead 21-0.

The Panthers also hurt themselves with a season-high 10 penalties, including several pre-snap penalties likely caused by a late personnel change due to injuries. With all three of Georgia State's tight ends injured for this game, true freshman offensive lineman Brandon Pertile lined up at tight end for the first time.

TROY 35, GEORGIA STATE 28

In the program's first Sun Belt Conference game, Georgia State fell 35-28 to Troy in the Panthers' Homecoming game at the Georgia Dome. The Panthers (0-6, 0-1) rallied to score 21 second-half points and take the lead in the fourth quarter before Troy (4-3, 2-1) scored the go-ahead touchdown with 3:17 left in the game.

Ronnie Bell tied a school record with four touchdown passes, two to Albert Wilson, who finished the game with seven catches for 153 yards and 119 yards on just two kickoff returns.

"I thought our team battled and proved that they belong in this conference, and I am very happy with the way they played," said Georgia State head coach Trent Miles. "I am not happy with the result, obviously, everyone is disappointed with losing. This was an FCS football team a year ago that won one game. We jumped into FBS and went toe-to-toe for 56 minutes and had every opportunity to win the game.

"We proved that this is going to be a very good conference for us, and we will be able to compete."

Georgia State took a 28-21 lead on the first play of the fourth quarter, as Bell found Wilson on a 38-yard pass down the middle for a touchdown. Wilson helped set up the scoring drive after fielding a Troy kickoff at his own goal line and returning it to the GSU 48-yard line.

Troy answered with fourth-quarter touchdown drives of 75 and 63 yards to seal the win. The final score came after Chris Pickett intercepted Bell's pass at the Troy 17-yard line and returned it to his team's 37. Two plays later, Chris Williams caught a 54-yard touchdown pass from Corey Robinson, his third scoring pass of the day.

"Troy is an excellent football team and offensively it showed," Miles said. "You make one mistake at the end, they go down the field and cash it in to put the nail in the coffin on us. Hat's off to them, they are going to win a lot of football games."

Down 14-7 at halftime, Georgia State stormed back to take the lead after the Panthers defense forced two consecutive turnovers and blocked a punt to begin the second half. After Troy took the kickoff to start the third quarter, Trojans running back Brandon Burks fumbled on the next play from scrimmage after getting hit by Panther linebacker Mackendy Cheridor, and Tarris Batiste recovered the ball at the Troy 43.

The Panthers capitalized soon after when Bell found Wilson for an 8-yard touchdown pass. Bell converted third-down plays on the previous two series when he found Wilson for a 13-yard gain on third-and-6 and Robert Davis for an 11-yard gain on third-and-3.

Troy's next two possessions ended on a Jarrell Robinson interception in Georgia State territory and a blocked punt by Demarius Matthews that was downed at the Troy 31. After the block, the Panthers scored on the very next play on a touchdown pass from Bell to Davis, despite a defensive pass-interference call, to give the Panthers a 21-14 lead.

The Panthers' first touchdown tied the score at 7-7 with 2:29 to go in the first quarter with a nine-play, 75-yard touchdown drive capped by a 7-yard scoring pass from Bell to Kelton Hill. The touchdown was set up by consecutive first-down completions as Bell found Davis for a 21-yard gain and then hit Jonathan Jean-Bart on a 26-yard screen pass to get to the Troy 6-yard line.

The Georgia State defense forced three turnovers, as Batiste intercepted a Robinson pass in the end zone in the second quarter to go along with his fumble recovery and Jarrell Robinson's interception. Linebacker Joseph Peterson led the defense with 16 total tackles.

Bell finished 22-of-50 for 370 yards passing and one interception, the only Panthers turnover. Davis amassed 76 receiving yards, and Hill had 60. The Panther offense put up 422 total yards, its highest total of the season.

Troy's Robinson, the FBS active leader in career passing yards, was 21-for-37 for 350 yards with three scores. Eric Thomas caught six passes for 113 yards and one touchdown, and Williams added four grabs for 152 yards. The Trojans ran an eye-popping 102 offensive plays in the game.

With both teams looking for the first Sun Belt Conference victory in program history, Texas State edged Georgia State 24-17 at Bobcat Stadium.

With the game tied at 10-10 in the fourth quarter, Texas State (4-3, 1-2 Sun Belt) scored the go-ahead touchdown on a three-yard run by Chris Nutall. That put the Bobcats ahead 17-10 with 8:01 to play before both teams added late touchdowns.

Georgia State (0-7, 0-2 Sun Belt) outgained the Bobcats 368-343, including 208 yards passing by Ronnie Bell, 71 yards rushing by Travis Evans and 73 yards receiving by Albert Wilson. The Panthers' defense allowed just 47 yards passing on five completions, the lowest figures in school history.

But Texas State's combination of Nutall (90 yards on nine carries, two touchdowns) and Robert Lowe (career-high 177 yards, one touchdown) proved to be the difference.

"We just have to learn how to get over that hump and quit doing the things that beat ourselves," Georgia State head coach Trent Miles said. "But we're playing hard. I'm proud of them. I had a lot of guys out this game and we still were able to put ourselves in position to win.

"We're getting better because we're executing better. It just hasn't shown in wins yet."

Georgia State drove 81 yards early in the fourth quarter for the tying field goal, a 19-yard boot by Wil Lutz that knotted the score at 10-10 with 11:21 to play. On the drive, Bell hit Wilson for completions of 12 and 21 yards and found tight end Keith Rucker for 15 yards. On third-and-8 at the Texas State 9, Bell scrambled up the middle but was just shy of the first down, forcing the tying field goal.

On Texas State's ensuing possession, the Panthers appeared to have the Bobcats stopped



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with an incomplete pass on third down, but GSU was flagged for pass interference to keep the drive alive. Two plays later, Nutall avoided a would-be tackler to scamper up the middle for 35 yards down to the GSU 9. He scored the go-ahead touchdown two plays later.

After an exchange of punts, Georgia State took over at its own 16-yard line with 5:26 to play. On 3rd-and-4 from the GSU 39, Bell threw incomplete, and then his fourth-down pass was intercepted.

Lowe scored for the Bobcats with 1:33 to play, and then Georgia State answered with Bell's 5-yard touchdown pass to Robert Davis but it came with just one second left.

Georgia State took the opening kickoff and marched 80 yards for a touchdown. On the first play from scrimmage, Albert Wilson raced 47 yards on a reverse, the longest run of his career.

After a would-be touchdown by Jonathan Jean-Bart was called back for a holding penalty, the Panthers converted a fourth-and-1 by Sean Jeppesen to keep the drive alive. On the next play, Bell snuck in for the 1-yard score to give the Panthers a 7-0 lead five minutes into the game. The score was the first rushing touchdown of Bell's career.

The Bobcats got on the board with Nutall's 34-yard touchdown run with 2:04 left in the first half. On their next possession, Lowe broke another long run, going 59 yards before he was knocked out of bounds at the 4-yard line by Demarius Matthews. But the GSU defense held and forced a field goal, putting Texas State ahead 10-7 with 11:30 to play in the first half.

"They (Lowe and Nutall) are good running backs. Texas State is a good football team, and they are two wins away from being bowl eligible," Miles said.

GSU linebacker Robert Ferguson finished with eight tackles, raising his career total to 164 as he passed Mark Hogan (157) to become the Panthers' career tackling leader.

With 71 yards rushing, Evans topped the 1,400-yard mark for his career. He now has 1,403 career yards, just nine behind Donald Russell's school record of 1,412.

The Panthers managed 368 yards of offense, including 160 yards rushing, despite playing with a makeshift offensive line that was missing three starters in center Cade Yates, left tackle Ulrick John and left guard Tim Wynn.

Georgia State fell at Louisiana-Monroe 38-10 at Malone Stadium in Monroe, La.

ULM (4-4, 2-1 Sun Belt) quarterback Kolton Browning passed for 224 yards and four touchdowns in his first game back from injury. The Preseason Player of the Year was injured Sept. 28 against Tulane and was thought to be out for the season but returned tonight. Centarius Donald added 126 yards rushing.

Georgia State's (0-8, 0-3 Sun Belt) Robert Ferguson returned a fumble 87 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter for the first defensive touchdown in the Panthers' history. In last week's game, Ferguson became GSU's career tackling leader. Terrance Woodard sacked Browning, who fumbled, and Ferguson scooped up the ball and raced for the end zone.

ULM jumped to a 14-0 lead with two first quarter touchdowns, the second one set up by an interception that gave the Warhawks possession at the GSU 33.

After Ferguson's touchdown pulled the Panthers within 14-7, the GSU defense forced ULM to go three-and-out. Georgia State took over at its own 13 drove deep into ULM territory for a 25-yard field goal by Wil Lutz.

Now trailing 14-10 with seven minutes left in the second quarter, Georgia State tried an onside kick, and freshman Kight Dallas recovered the ball for the Panthers. But on third down at the GSU 45, Ben McLane's pass was intercepted. ULM took

over at the GSU 31 and scored four plays later on Browning's 19-yard touchdown pass to Je'Ron Hamm for a 21-10 lead.

GSU played two quarterbacks in the game, but both starter Ronnie Bell and backup McLane struggled, combining to complete just 12 passes for 108 yards with three interceptions and a fumble.

"You can't turn the ball over four times against a good football team and expect to have a chance," GSU head coach Trent Miles said. "We got it to 14-10, we recover an on-side kick and have the momentum, but we gave it right back. Then we had a chance to put points on the board at the end of the first half and we fumbled."

Contributing to Georgia State's offensive struggles were more injuries on the offensive line. Already starting its third center in Ronald Martin, Georgia State lost Martin and then Mark Ruskell to injuries during the game. Tim Wynn took over, playing center for the first time since 2010.

"A positive from tonight was the play of Tim Wynn," Miles said. "We don't have a center right now because of injuries, and he stepped in late in the first half and then played the entire second half."

Freshman Jonathan Jean-Bart rushed for 60 yards on just seven carries for the Panthers, and freshman Kyler Neal added 34 yards on five attempts.

Travis Evans rushed for 25 yards to become Georgia State's career rushing leader, passing Donald Russell (1,412, 2011-12). Evans now has 1,428 career yards.

Georgia State fell to Sun Belt Conference foe Western Kentucky 44-28 at the Georgia Dome. The Panthers (0-9, 0-4 Sun Belt) scored two touchdowns on back-to-back drives in the third quarter to cut the WKU lead to 31-21 late in the period, but the Hilltoppers (5-4, 2-3) regained control with two fourth-quarter touchdown drives of their own.

Trailing 31-7 in the third, the Panthers executed a 10-play, 73-yard touchdown drive set up by a 32-yard pass from Ronnie Bell to Avery Sweeting that put the Panthers at the WKU 4-yard line. Two plays later, Travis Evans rushed for a 2-yard touchdown to cut the Hilltopper lead to 31-14. Evans rushed six times for 31 yards on the scoring drive.

After the GSU defense forced a three-and-out, the Panthers scored again with 0:54 left in the third quarter on an 11-yard touchdown run by freshman Jonathan Jean-Bart, who was initially called out-of-bounds at the 1-yard line but was determined to have crossed the goal line after a review. The touchdown was the first of Jean-Bart's career.

The Hilltoppers, however, stemmed the Panther rally as Keshawn Simpson scored his third rushing touchdown with 10:18 to go in the game. Quarterback Nelson Fishback, who got the majority of the snaps after starter Brandon Doughty left in the third quarter with an injury, added to the WKU tally with a 5-yard touchdown pass with 3:40 left.

Georgia State came right back with a 75-yard drive that ended in a 19-yard touchdown pass from Bell to Sweeting. The Panthers recovered the ensuing onside kick, but turned the ball over on downs with under a minute remaining.

"Our kids battled today," GSU head coach Trent Miles said. "Give Western Kentucky and coach Petrino the credit. They found a way to win the football game. We dug ourselves a huge hole. We were unable to sustain any drives in the first half with our offense except for one big play. We had too many three-and-outs and left our defense on the field way too much. We can't turn the football over.

"The kids battled back and made it a game. At one point it was a 10-point game. They [Western Kentucky] were able to go down and extend the

lead. The kids showed again that they're fighters. We went back out and answered it and put it ourselves back in the game, but give Western Kentucky the credit."

After Western Kentucky started the game with two scoring drives to take a 10-0 lead, the Panthers got on the scoreboard at the 1:33 mark in the first quarter. On a third-and-2 play, Bell found Robert Davis for a 67-yard touchdown pass as Davis made a juggling catch near midfield and raced the rest of the way after the WKU defensive back fell down. The pass play was the fifth longest for a touchdown in GSU history (the top four were caught by Albert Wilson). The touchdown reception was the fourth of the year for Davis, who led the team with 84 yards receiving.

The teams traded punts until Simpson capped a WKU drive with a 1-yard touchdown run with 4:02 remaining in the first half. After another GSU punt, the Hilltoppers struck again with :52 left when Doughty found Kadeem Jones for a 16-yard touchdown pass to take a 24-7 lead into halftime. Simpson got his second touchdown of the day on a 2-yard run in the third quarter.

Wilson, the second-leading active player in career total yards behind Western Kentucky's Antonio Andrews (143 total yards today), finished with 72 yards receiving, 66 kickoff return yards (22.0 average), and six punt return yards to tally 144 today and bring his career mark to 5,588. Andrews' 143 yards snapped a streak of 15 consecutive games with at least 150 all-purpose yards. Bell finished the game 26-of-41 passing for 325 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions.

The Panther defense forced one turnover, as cornerback Brent McClendon made a diving interception at the GSU 31 on a deep Doughty pass in the third quarter. That was McClendon's fifth career interception, tying for the GSU career lead.

Robert Ferguson and Joseph Peterson tied for the team high with 10 total tackles, and Theo Agnew finished with nine.

Georgia State quarterback Ronnie Bell set school records for career and single-season total offense and career passing yards and the Panthers were tied with the Sun Belt Conference's top team late in the third quarter before UL-Lafayette pulled away for a 35-21 victory at the Georgia Dome.

UL-Lafayette quarterback Terrance Broadway threw four touchdown passes as the Ragin' Cajuns won their eighth straight game to improve to 8-2, 5-0 in the Sun Belt Conference.

Bell finished the game with 229 yards passing, 46 yards rushing and a pair of touchdowns through the air. In only two years with the program, Bell has compiled 2,596 career passing yards and 2,772 yards of total offense, including 2,197 yards this season.

During the game, senior receiver Albert Wilson also broke Georgia State (0-10, 0-5 Sun Belt) single-season records for receptions (58) and all-purpose yards (1,834). Wilson already holds the career marks in both of those categories. Wilson also led the team with 66 yards rushing in the game.

Wilson's 22-yard touchdown reception tied the game at 21-all with five minutes left in the third quarter, but the Ragin' Cajuns answered on their next possession with an eight-play, 75-yard drive, capped by Broadway's 36-yard touchdown pass to freshman Elijah McGuire. That gave UL-Lafayette a 28-21 lead with 1:47 left in the third quarter.

Georgia State drove deep into UL-Lafayette territory on its next possession, but freshman Tyler Neal was stopped one yard short on fourth-and-3 at the UL 16-yard line.

After another Broadway scoring pass pushed the Ragin' Cajuns' lead to 35-21, Georgia State drove into UL-Lafayette on its next two possessions

but came up short on fourth down both times.

In the first half, Georgia State committed a pair of costly turnovers in the red zone. Starting quarterback Ben McLane fumbled on the UL-Lafayette 3-yard line in the first quarter and Bell threw an interception near the goal line in the second quarter to spoil potential scoring opportunities for GSU.

However, the Panthers also benefited from a first-half turnover. As time expired on the first quarter, the Panthers' defense recovered a Ragin' Cajun fumble at the ULL 16-yard line. Georgia State used the short field to convert a 5-yard touchdown run by senior Travis Evans and briefly tie the contest at 7-7.

On fourth-and-3 with only 24 seconds remaining in the first half, Bell connected with freshman tight end Keith Rucker for a 42-yard touchdown, the first score of Rucker's career. Rucker finished the game with six receptions for a career-high 121 yards.

Broadway tossed four touchdown passes, in the game including two to the freshman McGuire, who had 107 yards rushing and 125 yards receiving. McGuire took a first-quarter shovel pass 80 yards for a score and received a screen pass in the third quarter that covered 36 yards for the score.

The Panthers scored first in the second half when Bell connected with Wilson on a 22-yard swing pass to tie the game at 21-21. Broadway then connected for a pair of second-half touchdown passes to build a 35-21 advantage for the visiting Ragin' Cajuns.

Linebacker Joseph Peterson turned in a stellar game defensively, leading the Panthers with twelve tackles and three tackles for loss, including a pair of third-down sacks.

ARKANSAS STATE 35, GEORGIA STATE 33

Liberty Bank Stadium • Jonesboro, Ark.

Kelton Hill's 70-yard touchdown pass to Albert Wilson pulled Georgia State within two points of Arkansas State with two minutes left, but the Panthers' try for a game-tying two-point conversion failed and GSU fell to the Red Wolves 35-33 at Liberty Bank Stadium.

Georgia State (0-11, 0-6 Sun Belt) outgained the second-place team in the Sun Belt Conference 432-290, but the Panthers hurt themselves with four turnovers and a blocked punt, which led directly to 21 points for Arkansas State (7-4, 5-1 Sun Belt).

Wilson also had an 80-yard touchdown run, making him the first player in GSU history with 100 yards rushing and receiving in the same game, and Hill added a 17-yard touchdown catch from Ronnie Bell to become the first Panther to throw and catch a touchdown in the same game.

Wilson's 80-yard touchdown run, the longest run and third-longest play from scrimmage in school history, gave the Panthers a 17-7 lead with 6:42 left in the second quarter. The play capped a crazy sequence because on the previous play, Arkansas State's Kyle Coleman scooped up a Georgia State fumble at the GSU 25-yard line and was heading for the end zone. But Wilson punched the ball out from behind, and the ball bounced into the end zone and out of bounds for a touchback. On the next play, Wilson took a handoff from Bell and raced for the end zone.

Georgia State took its 17-7 lead into the intermission, but the Panthers gave Arkansas State 14 points in the first four minutes of the second half on a fumble return for a touchdown and then a blocked punt for a touchdown. That put the Red Wolves ahead 21-17 before their offense ran a play in the third quarter.

The Panthers responded on their next possession, driving 75 yards on just five plays for a go-ahead score, which came on Bell's 17-yard pass to Hill. Bell set up the score with a 28-yard completion to Wilson out to the ASU 47 and a 28-yard pass to Robert Davis down to the 17, and Georgia State led 24-21 with nine minutes to play in the third quarter.

But the Panthers again hurt themselves with

a crucial turnover, this time a fumble that the Red Wolves recovered at the GSU 27. The Panthers forced a fourth-and-1 at the 7, but ASU quarterback Adam Kennedy converted for a first-and-goal, and then Michael Gordon ran five yards for the touchdown, putting Arkansas State ahead 28-24 with 3:39 left in the third quarter.

Bell again drove the Panthers deep into Arkansas State territory with a first down at the 10, but Georgia State had to settle for Wil Lutz's 35-yard field goal on the first play of the fourth quarter, cutting the deficit to 28-27.

ASU added another touchdown on its next possession, extending its lead to 35-27 on Kennedy's 5-yard touchdown pass to J.D. McKissic with 10:51 to play.

Still trailing 35-27, Georgia State took over at its own 23 with 3:03 left. After Bell hit Danny Williams for seven yards on first down, the Panthers executed their trick play with Hill, the former quarterback now playing wide receiver. Hill took the pitch from Bell and then found Wilson behind the secondary for the 70-yard bomb, pulling the Panthers within two points. On the try for two, Bell was pressured and overthrew Wilson in the end zone. With two minutes still to play, the Panthers tried and onside kick but were unable to recover it, and Arkansas State was able to run out the clock.

Arkansas State opened the scoring with a touchdown on its first possession, and then Lutz put the Panthers on the scoreboard with a 40-yard field goal early in the first quarter. Bell gave GSU its first lead with a 4-yard touchdown run with 1:45 left in the first quarter. He set up the score with a 25-yard completion to Davis at the 4-yard line.

Wilson finished with seven receptions for 149 yards and two rushes for a career-high 104 yards, helping the Panthers to a season-high 184 yards. His 149 receiving yards pushed him over the 1,000-yard mark for the season, breaking his own GSU season record of 947 yards that he set last season.

Bell was 13-for-25 for 178 yards as he surpassed the GSU season record for passing yards with 2,258 on the year.

Joseph Peterson finished with a game-high 13 tackles to raise his season total to a Georgia State-record 92.

In limiting the Red Wolves to 290 yards of total offense, the Georgia State defense came up with two fourth-down stops, recovered a fumble, and held ASU to 1-for-12 on third downs.

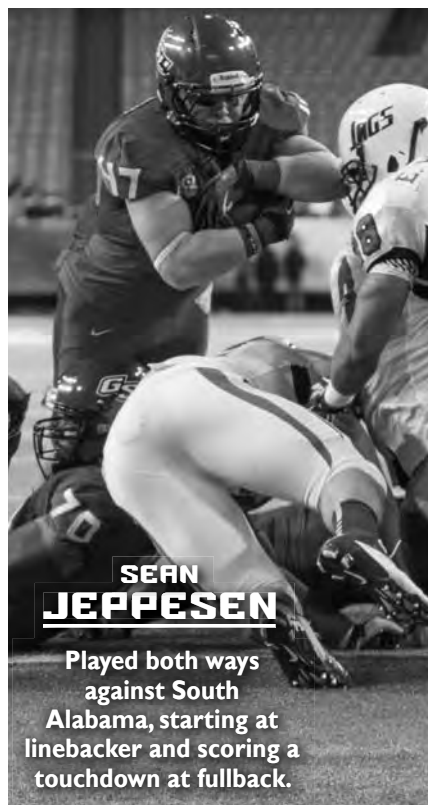
Robert Davis' 80-yard, third quarter catch-and-run highlighted Georgia State's final game of the 2013 season as the Panthers fell to South Alabama 38-17 at the Georgia Dome.

A freshman from Warner Robins, Ga., Davis snared a short Ronnie Bell pass over the middle, juke'd his defender and raced across the field and down the sideline to the USA 1-yard line midway through the third period. His dash turned into the longest pass play of the season, the longest non-scoring play and the third-longest play in school history. It set up Bell, who then plunged across from the 1 to cap the 81-yard, three-play drive in 1:06.

The scoring drive was one of the few drives the Panthers could sustain. They finished 0-of-10 on third downs and lost the total offense battle 522-345 on the day.

Bell finished 17-of-34 passing for 321 yards and Davis ended with a season-high 110 receiving yards on four catches. It was Bell's fourth 300-yard game of the season and ends his year with 2,573 yards passing. It was Davis' second 100-yard game.

Star wide receiver Albert Wilson ended the final game of his stellar career with six catches for 101 yards and had 168 all-purpose yards to finish as one of the top performers in the country this season. Wilson was one of 25 seniors honored before the game in Senior Day festivities, the first four-year class to pass through the Panther



program. This was Wilson's 13th 100-yard receiving game. He finishes with 175 career catches for 3,190 yards. Wilson finishes among the top 40 in NCAA FBS history with 6,235 all-purpose yards.

"I can't say enough about Albert. I love Albert," GSU head coach Trent Miles said. "People don't know the way Albert is in the locker room. He's had a very difficult life and made something very positive out of it and became a leader. He showed up every day and gave everything he had. He had great effort and great attitude. I love him and I look forward to watching him compete at the next level because he will have the opportunity. I need more Albert Wilsons."

Junior fullback Sean Jeppesen scored the final points of the game with a 1-yard touchdown run to pull Georgia State within 21 points. Jeppesen played both ways in the game, starting at linebacker and making three tackles.

USA running back Jay Jones opened the scoring with two first-half touchdowns, rushing for 11 from 5 and 17 yards out in the first period as USA jumped to a 14-0 lead. Jones helped South Alabama to 306 yards of offense in the opening two quarters before he finished with 102 yard on 17 carries.

The Panthers got on the board with a Wil Lutz 33-yard field goal early in the second period. GSU enjoyed starting that drive with a short field as well following Wilson's career-long 62-yard punt return.

Metheny added the Jaguars' third score of the day with a 1-yard sneak after South Alabama converted on fourth down inside the 5-yard line. Metheny completed 19-of-28 passes for 280 yards in the game. His favorite target was Shavarez Smith, who had 10 catches for 194 yards and one

score. Metheny added 50 yards on the ground.

Aleem Sunanon knocked through a 42-yard field goal with 34 seconds left before halftime to give USA the 21-point cushion at the intermission. Kendall Houston scored USA's final points of the third quarter on a 1-yard run to finish off a 6 minute, 28 second drive, the only scoring drive for either team over four minutes.

Georgia State senior linebacker Robert Ferguson finished his career as the only player to play all 45 games in the first four seasons of the program with a school-best 199 career tackles after his five today..

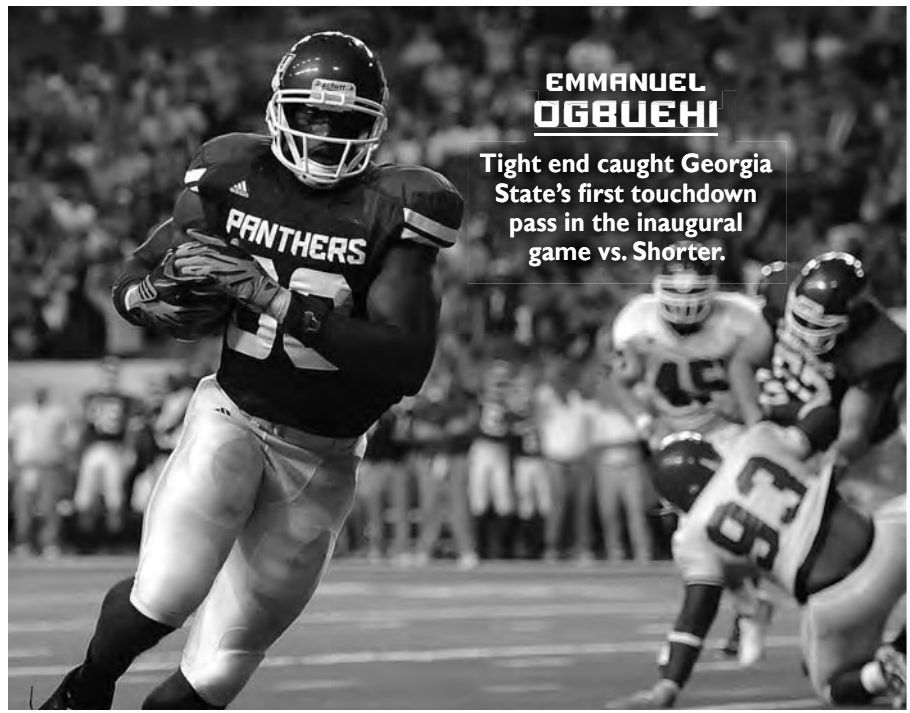
