GAME COVERAGE: Television coverage is on ESPNU. Announcers are Ryan Ruocco and Charles Arbuckle. This is Georgia State's second appearance on ESPNU, following GSU's 2010 game at Alabama. Every Georgia State game this season will be televised, including every Sun Belt Conference game on one of the ESPN platforms.

Radio coverage is available on the Grady Health System Georgia State Radio Network, including Atlanta flagship 1340 The Fan 3. Dave Cohen is in his 32nd season as the play-by-play voice of Georgia State athletics, while Harper LeBel and Brandon Leak join him from the booth, and Sam Crenshaw adds sideline coverage.

FIRST FBS GAME IN THE NATION: Georgia State hosts the first FBS game of 2014 as Abilene Christian visits the Georgia Dome for a 7 p.m. contest that will be nationally-televised on ESPNU.

Both programs have been on the move, with Georgia State completing its transition to the FBS level, while Abilene Christian is a newcomer to Division I after making the climb from Division II to FCS.

Entering its second season under head coach Trent Miles, Georgia State returns 12 starters and 34 letterwinners, led by preseason all-conference linebacker Joseph Peterson. The defense also features young standouts like defensive end Shawayne Lawrence and outside linebacker Mackendy Cheridor, both sophomores.

The Panthers' top returnee on offense is also a sophomore in wide receiver Robert Davis, who was one of the nation's top freshmen pass-catchers a year ago with 44 receptions for 711 yards. Junior college transfer Nick Arbuckle will make his first start at quarterback.

Senior punter Matt Hubbard is an all-star candidate with a career average of 42.3 yards per kick.

ACU has posted eight straight winning seasons. The Wildcats compiled a 7-4 record in 2012 in their final season in Division II and then began their transition to Division I with a 6-5 mark in 2013, when they featured a high-powered offense that averaged 487 yards and 45.5 points per game.

Head coach Ken Collums is in his third season as the ACU head coach after previously serving as the program's offensive coordinator.

The two teams are meeting for the first time in football.

FULL FBS MEMBER: Georgia State, which began playing football in 2010, is now fully certified as an NCAA FBS program. Beginning this year, GSU is eligible for the Sun Belt Conference title and postseason bowl games.

The move to FBS was a two-year transition which began in 2012. On April 9, 2012, Georgia State accepted an invitation to join the Sun Belt Conference and move to the FBS level. That fall, the Panthers played an FCS and CAA schedule. In 2013, Georgia State played its first season in the Sun Belt while completing its FBS transition.

SEASON OPENERS: For the fifth time in five seasons of football, Georgia State is opening the season on a weeknight at the Georgia Dome, including two Thursday night games and two Friday night contests before this year's Wednesday night affair. The Panthers are 2-2 in season openers.

POUNDING THE ROCK: As Georgia State builds its program, head coach Trent Miles has used the metaphor "pounding the rock." He reminds the Panthers that if you keep pounding the rock, keep working and chipping away, eventually it will break.

Even though it was not reflected in the win column, progress was evident during Miles' first season at the helm as the Panthers dropped four games by a touchdown or less in 2013, including a 35-33 loss to Sun Belt co-champion Arkansas State. GSU scored a touchdown with two minutes left to pull within two points, but the try for a game-tying two-point conversion failed.

Against co-champion UL-Lafayette, Georgia State tied the game at 21-21 with five minutes left in the third quarter before ULL won 35-21.

The Panthers fell by a single score in three straight games against Jacksonville State (32-26 in overtime), Troy (35-28) and Texas State (24-17). In each game, GSU was leading or tied in the fourth quarter.

FIRST-TIME STARTERS: Georgia State's depth chart features 11 new starters, including eight players on offense who are projected to make their first start. Nick Arbuckle will be the Panthers' fifth different opening-day starting quarterback in five seasons.

The situation is reversed on defense, where eight of the 11 projected starters have previously started at least one game. The three first-time starters are all in the secondary in cornerbacks Bruce Dukes and Marcus Caffey and safety Nate Simon.

Placekicker Wil Lutz and punter Matt Hubbard are returning starters, but long-snapper Daniel Zeigler is a first-time starter.

JOE PETE: Georgia State's top returnee on defense is junior linebacker Joseph Peterson, aka Joe Pete.

The 6-0, 225-pounder has led the Panthers in tackles the last two seasons, collecting a total of 168 career hits to rank second in GSU history. In 2013 he was third in the Sun Belt Conference with 9.4 tackles per game.

After earning honorable mention All-Sun Belt honors last fall, Peterson enters 2014 as a preseason all-conference pick.

NFL FLAVOR: The Georgia State coaching staff features significant coaching and playing experience in the National Football League. Head coach Trent Miles spent the 2000 season as an assistant coach on Mike Sherman's staff with the Green Bay Packers. It was there that he first worked with Jeff Jagodzinski, now his offensive coordinator at GSU. Jagodzinski served on the Packers' staff from 1999-03, then moved to the Atlanta Falcons as tight ends coach (2004) and offensive line coach (2005) before returning to Green Bay as offensive coordinator in 2006.

Wide receivers coach Tim Lappano joined the GSU staff this year after five years with the Detroit Lions, where he coached All-Pro Calvin Johnson last fall. Lappano previously coached with San Francisco (2003-04) and Seattle (1998).

Secondary coach and special teams coordinator J.D. Williams was a first-round draft pick in 1990 by the Buffalo Bills, for whom he played in four straight Super Bowls. His six-year NFL career also included stops in Arizona and San Francisco.

WHERE'S THE BEEF: Georgia State's projected starting offensive line features four of the five players at 300 pounds or more.

Starting left tackle Michael Ivory, a junior college transfer, is the largest player on the team at 6-5 and 340 pounds. Left guard Taylor Evans, another junior college transfer, is 305 pounds, while center Tim Wynn and right guard Alex Stoehr, a true freshman, check in at 300 pounds. The smallest starter is senior A.J. Kaplan at 275 pounds.

DAVIS POISED FOR SOPHOMORE

SUCCESS: Sophomore wide receiver Robert Davis enters his second season as Georgia State's top offensive weapon after a strong freshman campaign. He was a preseason All-Sun Belt Conference pick by Athlon (third team).

The 6-3, 198-pounder was the Panthers' second-leading receiver in 2013 with 44 catches for 711 yards and four touchdowns. He finished the season with a career-high 110 yards receiving on four catches vs. South Alabama, highlighted by an an 80-yard touchdown catch.

Only four freshmen in the nation averaged more receiving yards per game than Davis in 2013, and only eight rookies had more catches. Not bad for a player who was very lightly recruited after playing in a run-oriented offense at Northside-Warner Robins High School, where he caught only 11 passes as a senior.

ACADEMIC HONORS: Georgia State's first year in the Sun Belt Conference was a positive one in the classroom. The Panthers earned the league's team academic award with the top grade point average in the conference.

LOOKING AHEAD: Georgia State's future non-conference schedules features an ambitious array of opponents from Power 5 conferences, combined with regional foes.

Most recently, GSU announced that the Panthers will open the 2018 season by hosting Atlanta neighbor Kennesaw State, which begins its program in 2015.

RINGING THE BELL: Backup quarter-back Ronnie Bell owns or shares several school records.

He enters his junior season as Georgia State's career leader in passing yards (3,095) and total offense (3,261). He is tied for the career lead with 18 touchdown passes.

Last season, when he started 11 of 12 games, Bell set GSU season records with 2,573 yards passing and 2,686 yards of total offense.

Bell tied the school record with four touchdown passes against Troy, when he completed 22 passes for 370 yards in the game, the thirdhighest total in GSU annals.

PANTHERS PURSUING NFL DREAMS:

Five former Panthers are in NFL camps this summer, looking to earn roster spots, including three 2013 seniors.

Offensive tackle Ulrick John was selected in seventh round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts, becoming the second Panther to be drafted. He was injured in the Colts' first preseason game.

A pair of 2013 seniors signed free agent contracts in wide receiver Albert Wilson with the Kansas City Chiefs and defensive lineman Theo Agnew with the Atlanta Falcons.

Defensive lineman Christo Bilukidi, a GSU senior in 2011, was drafted by the Oakland Raiders in 2012 and now plays for the Cincinnati Bengals. Bilukidi was the first former Panther to be drafted and the first to play in an NFL regular season game. Across the state, tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi is in camp with the Cleveland Browns. He caught a touchdown pass in the Browns' second exhibition.

COBB NAMED AD: Veteran athletic administrator Charlie Cobb was introduced as Georgia State's Director of Athletics by President Mark Becker on Aug. 15, 2014. Cobb comes to Georgia State after nine years as the Director of Athletics at Appalachian State. During his time there, the Mountaineer football program won three consecutive FCS national titles, and Cobb helped create \$50 million in facilities improvements.

A former offensive lineman at NC State, Cobb also worked in athletic administration at his alma mater before going to App State. He also has Atlanta roots, having worked at the Atlanta Sports Council, the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and the Georgia Dome.

TRUE FRESHMEN MAKE IMPACT:

Underscoring the job that head coach Trent Miles and his staff have done in recruiting in their first two years, true freshmen should again play an important role for the Panthers.

In 203, 15 true freshmen from Miles' first recruiting class saw action, including 13 who started at least one game.

Entering the season opener, six true freshmen are listed on the depth chart, including starting right guard Alex Stoehr. Two other prominent freshmen on offense should be wide receiver/returner Glenn Smith and running back Krysten Hammon, and quarterback Emiere Scaife could see action. Additional true freshmen could play as backups or on special teams.

LAST OF THE FIRSTS: Georgia State has just 13 seniors on its roster. Of that group, only four were members of Georgia State's inaugural team in 2010: center Tim Wynn, linebacker Jarrell Robinson, center Ronald Martin and defensive lineman Marcus Stetzer. Wynn is the only one who actually played during that season; the other three red-shirted.

NFL FACILITIES: Georgia State is one of eight Division I programs to play its home games in the same facility as an NFL team. The others are Miami, Pittsburgh, San Diego State, Temple, USF, Tennessee State and UMass.

HEAD COACH TRENT MILES

A PROVEN PROGRAM-BUILDER, Trent Miles was introduced as Georgia State's second head football coach on Dec. 3, 2012 and charged with the task of building the fledgling program as it jumped to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) and the Sun Belt Conference.

Miles, a former assistant coach at Stanford, Notre Dame and Washington, demonstrated the ability to build a winning program in five seasons as the head coach at Indiana State. The remarkable rebuilding job he did there earned notice, and Georgia State President Mark P. Becker and then-Director of Athletics Cheryl L. Levick jumped at the chance to bring Miles to Atlanta following the retirement of Bill Curry, the program's head coach from its inception in 2008.

Taking over a Georgia State program that had been playing for just three seasons, Miles immediately began to lay the foundation to enable the Panthers to compete at the highest level of college football. Miles and his staff are building the program through recruiting, player development and the establishment of a winning culture, all within the framework of a strong family atmosphere.

Despite playing at the FBS level for the first time with an undermanned roster, Miles' first Georgia State team showed progress throughout the 2013 season. Taking Miles' mantra of "Pounding the Rock" to heart, the Panthers earned respect for their hard-nosed play and competitiveness throughout a challenging season.

Under Miles' tutelage, wide receiver and return specialist Albert Wilson earned all-conference and All-America recognition with a recordsetting season in 2013. Following the season, Wilson became the first Georgia State player to earn an invitation to the prestigious National Football League Scouting Combine and then signed a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs. Miles also helped develop Ulrick John into an NFL prospect as the offensive tackle was drafted in the seventh round by the Indianapolis Colts, becoming the second draft pick in Georgia State's brief history.

Miles' emphasis on the total development of his student-athletes was in evidence as the Panthers earned the Sun Belt Conference's team academic award as the football program with highest grade point average in the league.

Miles' first head-coaching job was at his alma mater, Indiana State, where he took over a struggling program that had won just one game in the three seasons before his arrival in 2008. But it took just three years for him to produce a winning season, the first of three straight winning campaigns for Miles in Terre Haute.

After leading his 2010 Sycamores to a 6-5 mark for the school's first winning record since 1996, Miles was recognized as Missouri Valley Football Conference Coach of the Year. He was named a finalist for the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year honor.

Miles guided ISU to another winning season in 2011 and then a 7-4 record in 2012, including

a 5-3 mark in the MVFC. No Sycamore team had won more games since the 1984 squad on which Miles played, and the school's run of three straight winning seasons under Miles was the longest in Terre Haute since ISU had six straight from 1964-69.

Following the 2012 season, Miles was honored as the American Football Coaches Association Region Four Coach of the Year, earning that distinction for the second time in three seasons.

Throughout his career, Miles has coached on both sides of the ball and possesses more than 20 years of college coaching experience as well as one year as a National Football League assistant with the Green Bay Packers. As an offensive assistant for the Packers in 2000, Miles worked with wide receivers and quality control. He coached NFL All-Pro receiver Antonio Freeman.

In the seven years following at Stanford (wide receivers, 2001), Notre Dame (wide receivers, 2002-04) and Washington (running backs, 2005-07), Miles also coached and developed many talented skill players. Among his pupils were Stanford's Teyo Johnson, a second-round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2003, Notre Dame's Maurice Stovall and Arnaz Battle, both of whom went on to the NFL, Jeff Samardzija, an All-America wide receiver at Notre Dame who is now a Major League Baseball pitcher, and Louis Rankin, a 1,000-yard rusher at Washington.

Miles began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Indiana State (1987), New Mexico (1988-89) and Oklahoma (1990). While at New Mexico, one of his mentors was Marvin Lewis, now the head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Miles moved to an assistant coaching position at Northern Illinois for four seasons, working with receivers (1991-93) and then defensive backs (1994). Miles then headed west for a two-year stint at Hawai'i, where he coached wide receivers (1995) and defensive backs (1996).

As wide receivers coach at Fresno State from 1997-99, Miles helped the Bulldogs to a share of the 1999 Mountain West Conference title and a berth in the Las Vegas Bowl. He also recruited and coached future NFL standout Bernard Berrian.

Miles, 51, is a native of Terre Haute, Ind., and a 1987 graduate of Indiana State with a degree in criminology. He was a wide receiver for the Sycamores from 1982-86, playing on the 1983 and 1984 squads that each won nine games and reached the FCS playoffs. The 1984 Sycamores were ranked No. 1 in the nation for much of the season, and that team was inducted into the Indiana State University Hall of Fame in 2002.

He is married to the former Bridget Hogan, and the couple has three daughters, Kaylee, Anna, and Charlie Elizabeth, and one son, Noah Michael.
