GAME COVERAGE: Television coverage is on ESPN3. Announcers are Matt Stewart and Pat Hill. Every Georgia State game this season will be televised, including every Sun Belt Conference game on one of the ESPN platforms.

Radio coverage is available on the Grady Health System Georgia State Radio Network, including Atlanta flagship 1340 The Fan 3 as well as Georgia State's WRAS-FM 88.5. Dave Cohen is in his 32nd season as the play-by-play voice of Panther athletics, while Harper LeBel and Brandon Leak join him from the booth, and Sam Crenshaw adds sideline coverage.

THE KICKOFF: In a highly anticipated matchup, Georgia State faces in-state rival Georgia Southern in football for the first time Saturday at 2 p.m. ET at the Georgia Dome.

The Panthers (1-6, 0-4 Sun Belt) are coming off a 30-27 defeat at South Alabama, their third three-point loss in Sun Belt play in which they led late in the fourth quarter.

Georgia Southern (5-2, 4-0 Sun Belt) had an open date.

Georgia State quarterback Nick Arbuckle leads the Sun Belt in passing (294.9 yps) and total offense (300.3 ypg). As a team, the Panthers are averaging 27.0 points and 417.4 yards per game.

Arbuckle's top targets include wide receivers Donovan Harden (34 receptions, 521 yards, 3 TD), Robert Davis (33 receptions, 442 yards, 1 TD), and LynQuez Blair (27 receptions, 341 yards, 3 TD) and tight end Joel Ruiz (24 receptions, 331 yards, 2 TD). Ruiz leads all tight ends in the nation in receiving yards per game (67.7) and is second in receptions per game (5.2).

Linebacker Joseph Peterson leads the Georgia State defense, averaging 11.3 tackles per game to rank third in the Sun Belt and 11th nationally. He is GSU's career tackling leader with 247.

Junior kicker Wil Lutz is Georgia State's career leader in field goals (17) and points by kicking (118). He ranks among the Sun Belt leaders with 15 touchbacks on kickoffs, and he is averaging 39.2 yards on 15 punts.

Under first-year head coach Willie Fritz, Georgia Southern is in first place in the Sun Belt and leads the league in scoring (41.3 ppg) and total offense (505.6 ypg), including 370.0 rushing yards per game. The Eagles feature the league's top two rushers in running back Matt Breida (118.7 ypg) and quarterback Kevin Ellison (93.6 ypg).

Georgia Southern is the third of four straight Georgia State opponents who have an open date the week before facing the Panthers. UL Lafayette and South Alabama also did not play the week before facing Georgia State, and next week's foe, Appalachian State, is off this week. Then the Panthers' final two Sun Belt opponents, Troy and Texas State, both play Thursday night games the week before facing Georgia State so they have an extra two days of rest.

THREE CLOSE LOSSES IN SUN BELT PLAY: Three of Georgia State's four Sun Belt Conference losses have been by three points, and in each one, the Panthers rallied to take the lead in the fourth quarter before falling.

Most recently, the Panthers fell 30-27 at South Alabama. In a back-and-forth game with seven lead changes, Georgia State drove 76 yards and scored the go-ahead touchdown on Duvall Smith's 1-yard run with 9:48 left, but South Alabama answered with the winning touchdown with 4:02 to play. Georgia State moved to the USA 40 on its final drive before the Jaguars held on fourth down and then ran out the clock.

In GSU's 34-31 loss at UL Lafayette (Oct. 4), the lead changed hands five times in the second half. Georgia State took a 31-28 lead on Marcus Caffey's 2-yard touchdown run with 6:35 to play, but ULL answered with a touchdown with 3:34 to play. The Panthers had one final chance but had a long gain into ULL territory wiped out by a penalty.

Against New Mexico State, the Panthers drove 86 yards on 13 plays, capped by Arbuckle's 1-yard touchdown run on fourth down that gave Georgia State a 31-27 lead with 2:30 left. But New Mexico State answered with a touchdown pass with just 15 seconds left for the 34-31 victory.

RUIZ ON MACKAY AWARD WATCH LIST: Tight end Joel Ruiz was named to the 2014 John Mackey Award Midseason Watch List, released Oct. 13. The John Mackey Award is given annually to the most outstanding collegiate tight end. He was also named to the Midseason All-Sun Belt first team, announced Oct. 17 by Phil Steele.

Ruiz LEADS THE NATION in receiving yards by a tight end with 67.7 yards per game, and he ranks second among all tight ends with 5.2 receptions per game.

The junior from Kingsland, Ga., is Georgia State's third-leading receiver

with 31 catches and three touchdowns in six games, and he ranks fourth in the Sun Belt in receiving yards.

Earlier this season, he was honored as the John Mackey Award National Tight End of the Week after catching seven passes for 111 yards and two touchdowns against Abilene Christian in his first game in a Georgia State uniform after transferring from Presbyterian. He had seven catches for 75 yards and a touchdown in the Panthers' 30-27 loss at South Alabama (Oct. 18).

Ruiz is the first Georgia State Panther to be recognized on a watch list for one of the major FBS awards.

HARDEN JUST MISSES SCHOOL

RECORD: Junior receiver Donovan Harden enjoyed his best game in a Georgia State uniform against South Alabama with 10 catches for 132 yards and two touchdowns.

Harden's 10 catches left him just one shy of the school single-game record of 11, and he is only the second receiver in Georgia State history with 10 or receptions in a game. The junior from Rialto, Calif., caught touchdowns of 44 yards and five yards from Nick Arbuckle in the back-and-forth battle. He also had a 34-yard reception on third down down to the 4-yard line to set up another Georgia State touchdown.

Harden, a transfer from Illinois State, is the Panthers' leading receiver with 34 catches for 521 yards and three touchdowns.

TRIO NAMED MIDSEASON ALL-SUN

BELT: Tight end Joel Ruiz, linebacker Joseph Peterson and place-kicker Joel Ruiz were named to the Midseason All-Sun Belt first team announced Oct. 17 by Phil Steele.

Ruiz is one of the nation's top tight ends who ranks fifth in the league in receptions and sixth in receiving yards. Peterson is third in the Sun Belt and 11th nationally with 11.3 tackles per game. Lutz is 5-for-5 on field goals, including a game-winner vs. Abilene Christian, and 24-for-24 on PATs.

CAFFEY SETS RECORDS IN FIRST

GAME AT RUNNING BACK: With injuries thinning the ranks at running back, Marcus Caffey moved from cornerback to running back prior to the UL Lafayette game and had an impressive debut on offense. Carrying the ball a school-record 27 times, Caffey rushed for 90 yards and three touchdowns, also a Georgia State record. He scored on runs of 12, one and two yards.

The Panthers lost both Kyler Neal and Jonathan Jean-Bart to season-ending knee injuries against Washington, so Caffey made the move after starting the first four games at cornerback. A transfer from Iowa Western Community College, the 6-0, 195-pound Caffey originally signed with Kentucky as a running back after an all-state career at Atlanta's Grady High School. He rushed for 1,600 yards and 17 touchdowns as a senior, earned second-team all-state accolades in

Class AAA and was rated among the nation's top 50 running backs by Rivals and Scout.com.

LUTZ HONORED BY SUN BELT:

Placekicker/punter Wil Lutz was named Sun Belt Conference Special Teams Player of the Week after his performance against UL Lafayette, where he became the Panthers' career leader in field goals and successfully executed a fake punt.

A junior from Newnan, Ga., Lutz hit just one field goal against the Ragin' Cajuns, but it was from 48 yards, the third-longest in Georgia State history. It was also the 16th of his career for the GSU school record. Lutz's field goal came on the final play of the first half and sent the Panthers into the locker room with a 17-14 lead.

Starting at punter for the first time in his career, Lutz punted three times for a 38.0-yard average, but it was the time he didn't punt that really made a difference for the Panthers. With Georgia State punting on 4th-and-11 from its own 19-yard line, Lutz was attempting a rugby-style punt when he took off down the right sideline and gained 26 yards for the first down. Lutz's play helped lead to the Panthers' first touchdown of the game. He also averaged 64.2 yards on five kickoffs with two touchbacks.

Lutz is the second Panther to be honored with a Sun Belt weekly award, along with quarterback Nick Arbuckle after the Air Force game.

TACKLES RECORD FOR JOE PETE:

Junior inside linebacker Joseph Peterson is Georgia State's career tackling leader with 237. He surpassed the previous Panther mark (199 by Robert Ferguson) against Air Force, his 25th game in a GSU uniform.

The 6-0, 225-pounder is leading the Panthers in tackles for the third straight season, averaging 11.5 hits per game to rank second in the Sun Belt Conference and seventh in the NCAA. In 2013 he finished third in the Sun Belt with 9.4 tackles per game, setting the GSU season record with 103 hits.

After earning honorable mention All-Sun Belt honors last fall, Peterson entered 2014 as a preseason all-conference pick.

Peterson opened the 2014 season with a game-high 11 tackles against Abilene Christian, plus a key interception in the fourth quarter that helped swing the momentum in Georgia State's favor and set up the Panthers' comeback. Against New Mexico State, he collected 15 tackles--one shy of the GSU single-game record that he set last year against Troy. He added 14 tackles at Washington.

GOING FOR A LONG DRIVE:

Georgia State's improved offense has helped the Panthers put together numerous long scoring drives this season.

The Panthers have scored 25 touchdowns, but they have accomplished that the hard way. The average length of Georgia State's touchdown drives is 73 yards, and the Panthers have travelled 70 yards or more on 15 of their 25 touchdown drives. Only one touchdown drive all season has been less than 50 yards.

Against UL Lafayette alone, Georgia State's touchdown drives covered 91, 96, 88 and 75 yards. The 96-yard drive is the second-longest

drive in school history and the Panthers' longest since a 97-yard march against UTSA in 2011.

One reason that the Panthers have been able to sustain drives is efficiency on third down. Georgia State leads the Sun Belt, converting 47 percent of third-down opportunities.

INJURIES TAKING THEIR TOLL: Georgia State has lost at least five key players to season-ending injuries. The Panthers are now playing without starting left tackle Michael Ivory, starting running back Kyler Neal and backup Jonathan Jean-Bart. On defense, Georgia State has lost two key safeties in Bryan Williams and LaDarion Young, and outside linebacker Mackendy Cheridor is out with a knee injury that could be season-ending.

ARBUCKLE SHARES SUN BELT AWARD: Nick Arbuckle tied the Georgia State single-game record with 414 yards passing and accounted for three touchdowns in the Panthers' 48-38 loss to Air Force. He was named Co-Offensive Player of the Week in the Sun Belt Conference (with Georgia Southern quarterback Kevin Ellison) on Sept. 15, and he was also honored as Sun Belt Player of the Week by Athlon.

Arbuckle completed 26 of 42 passes, including a pair of second-half touchdown passes to LynQuez Blair, covering 15 and 13 yards. He added a one-yard touchdown run in the third quarter to win Georgia State's first Sun Belt weekly award.

Arbuckle hooked up with Kyler Neal for a 73-yard completion that is the sixth-longest pass play in school history.

The junior from Camarillo, Calif., led the Panthers to 549 yards of total offense, the second-highest total in school history.

HERE'S TO YOU, MR. ROBINSON: Senior linebacker Jarrell Robinson became Georgia State's career leader in tackles for loss against Air Force. He now has 19 tackles behind the line of scrimmage to surpass Jake Muasau (16.5).

This season, Robinson is fourth in the Sun Belt Conference with seven tackles for loss.

Robinson enjoyed the best game of his career in the Panthers' season-opening victory over Abilene Christian. After moving from inside linebacker to the outside, the Portal, Ga., native collected four tackles for loss against ACU, including two sacks, and a pass breakup. He tied the single-game mark for tackles for loss in that game.

JEPPESEN SHOWS VERSATILITY: Senior Sean Jeppesen is playing his third different position in the last eight games. Jeppesen was the Panthers' starting fullback in 2013 before adding linebacker duties for the final three games to ease depth problems. In last year's season finale vs. South Alabama, he made three tackles at linebacker and scored a touchdown at fullback. Jeppesen moved to defense full-time in the offseason and began 2014 at middle linebacker. Now he is playing outside linebacker following the injury to starter Mackendy Cheridor.

WHAT A DEBUT FOR ARBUCKLE: Quarterback Nick Arbuckle made an impressive debut in his first game in a Georgia State

uniform, leading the Panthers to a 38-37, come-from-behind win over Abilene Christian. The junior college transfer from Pierce (Calif.) College completed 31 of 47 passes for 413 yards and four touchdowns and rallied the Panthers from a nine-point deficit in the final five minutes. After hitting Joel Ruiz with a 12-yard TD pass with 4:31 left, Arbuckle drove the Panthers 72 yards on 13 plays in the final 2:41, setting up Wil Lutz's winning field goal with 4 seconds left.

More on Arbuckle's debut:

- Tied the school record with four touchdown passes, joining Ronnie Bell, Kelton Hill and Drew Little (twice);
- Passed for 413 yards, one shy of the school record of 414 yards by Drew Little vs. Old Dominion in 2010.
- Set the Georgia State record with 438 yards of total offense;
- Converted two fourth downs on the game-winning drive, connecting with Joel Ruiz for 12 yards on 4th-and-5 from the GSU 24 and with LynQuez Blair for 24 yards on 4th-and-19 from the GSU 27.
- Covered the final 30 yards of the game-winning drive with his legs, rushing 13 yards to the ACU 26 and then 17 yards down to the ACU 9-yard line.

NATIONAL AWARD FOR RUIZ: Tight end Joel Ruiz was named John Mackey Tight End of the Week by the John Mackey Award. The junior from Kingsland, Ga., had a career-best game with seven receptions for 111 yards and two touchdowns as Georgia State beat Abilene Christian 38-37.

Playing his first game for Georgia State after transferring from Presbyterian, Ruiz scored the Panthers' first touchdown of 2014 on a 34-yard reception from quarterback Nick Arbuckle. Then he set up Georgia State's next touchdown with a 19-yard catch down to the 2-yard line. In the fourth quarter, he caught a 9-yard touchdown to pull the Panthers within two points with 4:31 to play, and then on the game-winning drive, he hauled in a 12-yard completion on 4th-and-9 from the GSU 24.

Ruiz's blocking helped Georgia State rush for 153 yards and compile a school-record 566 yards of total offense.

FIRST GAME-WINNER FOR LUTZ:

Place-kicker Wil Lutz booted a 26-yard field goal with just 4 seconds left to lift Georgia State to the 38-37 victory over Abilene Christian. That was the first game-winning field goal for the junior from Newnan, Ga., who has hit 13-of-20 career field goals and 48-of-49 extra points.

Lutz's kick is the third last-second, game-winning field in GSU history. Both others came in the inaugural season of 2010 by FCS All-American Iain Vance. Vance kicked a 30-yard field with one second left for a 24-21 victory at Campbell and then hit a 33-yard field goal in overtime for a 20-17 win over North Carolina Central.

FULL FBS MEMBER: Georgia State, which began playing football in 2010, is now fully certified as an NCAA FBS program. Beginning this year, GSU is eligible for the Sun Belt Conference title and postseason bowl games.

The move to FBS was a two-year transition which began in 2012. On April 9, 2012, Georgia State accepted an invitation to join the Sun Belt Conference and move to the FBS level. That fall, the Panthers played an FCS and CAA schedule. In 2013, Georgia State played its first season in the Sun Belt while completing its FBS transition.

FRESHMEN MAKE IMPACT: Nine true freshmen have seen action so far. Alex Stoehr is the Panthers' starter at right guard, and Chandon Sullivan is starting at cornerback. Eight other rookies have played, including wide receivers Glenn Smith and Todd Boyd, cornerbacks Antreal Allen and B.J. Clay, and linebackers James Traylor and Malik Ricks.

Georgia State played 15 true freshmen in 2013, including 13 who started at least one game.

NFL FLAVOR: The Georgia State coaching staff features significant coaching and playing experience in the National Football League. Head coach Trent Miles spent the 2000 season as an assistant coach on Mike Sherman's staff with the Green Bay Packers. It was there that he first worked with Jeff Jagodzinski, now his offensive coordinator at GSU. Jagodzinski served on the Packers' staff from 1999-03, then moved to the Atlanta Falcons as tight ends coach (2004) and offensive line coach (2005) before returning to Green Bay as offensive coordinator in 2006.

Wide receivers coach Tim Lappano joined the GSU staff this year after five years with the Detroit Lions, where he coached All-Pro Calvin Johnson last fall. Lappano previously coached with San Francisco (2003-04) and Seattle (1998).

Secondary coach and special teams coordinator J.D. Williams was a first-round draft pick in 1990 by the Buffalo Bills, for whom he played in four straight Super Bowls. His six-year NFL career also included stops in Arizona and San Francisco.

DAVIS ENJOYING SOPHOMORE

SUCCESS: Sophomore wide receiver Robert Davis, a preseason All-Sun Belt Conference pick by Athlon (third team), is the Panthers' second-leading receiver with 33 catches for 442 yards and one touchdown.

He opened his second season with a career-high eight receptions for 90 yards. He added four catches for 70 yards against New Mexico State, and then caught his first touchdown of the season at Washington. Davis had four catches for 108 yards at South Alabama.

Davis ranks third in Georgia State history with 77 receptions for 1,153 yards with five touchdowns.

Last year as a true freshman, the 6-3, 198-pounder was the Panthers' second-leading receiver in 2013 with 44 catches for 711 yards and four touchdowns. Only four freshmen in the nation averaged more receiving yards per game than Davis in 2013, and only eight rookies had more catches. Not bad for a player who was very lightly recruited after playing in a run-oriented offense at Northside-Warner Robins High School, where he caught only 11 passes as a senior.

ACADEMIC HONORS: Georgia State's first year in the Sun Belt Conference was a positive one in the classroom. The Panthers earned the

league's team academic award with the top grade point average in the conference.

RINGING THE BELL: Backup quarterback Ronnie Bell owns or shares several school records.

He entered his junior season as Georgia State's career leader in passing yards (3,095) and total offense (3,261). He is tied for the career lead with 18 touchdown passes.

Last season, when he started 11 of 12 games, Bell set GSU season records with 2,573 yards passing and 2,686 yards of total offense.

Bell tied the school record with four touchdown passes against Troy, when he completed 22 passes for 370 yards in the game, the third-highest total in GSU annals.

PANTHERS PURSUING NFL DREAMS:

Four former Georgia State players are currently on NFL rosters, including 2013 All-America wide receiver Albert Wilson. Wilson was an undrafted free agent but earned a roster spot with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Offensive tackle Ulrick John was selected in seventh round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts, becoming the second Panther to be drafted. He was injured in the Colts' first preseason game and is on injured reserve.

The Panthers' first draft pick, defensive tackle Christo Bilukidi, was signed by the Baltimore Ravens after playing last year with Cincinnati. Originally selected by the Oakland Raiders in the sixth round of the 2012 NFL Draft, he is in his third season in the league.

Tight end Emmanuel Ogbuehi, a senior in 2012, is on the Raven's practice squad.

One other Panther was in an NFL camp this summer in defensive lineman Theo Agnew (Atlanta Falcons).

COBB NAMED AD: Veteran athletic administrator Charlie Cobb was introduced as Georgia State's Director of Athletics by President Mark Becker on Aug. 15, 2014. Cobb comes to Georgia State after nine years as the Director of Athletics at Appalachian State. During his time there, the Mountaineer football program won three consecutive FCS national titles, and Cobb helped create \$50 million in facilities improvements.

A former offensive lineman at NC State, Cobb also worked in athletic administration at his alma mater before going to App State. He also has Atlanta roots, having worked at the Atlanta Sports Council, the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and the Georgia Dome.

LAST OF THE FIRSTS: Georgia State has just 14 seniors on its roster. Of that group, only four were members of Georgia State's inaugural team in 2010: center Tim Wynn, linebacker Jarrell Robinson, center Ronald Martin and defensive lineman Marcus Stetzer. Wynn is the only one who actually played during that season; the other three red-shirted.

NFL FACILITIES: Georgia State is one of eight Division I programs to play its home games in the same facility as an NFL team. The others are Miami, Pittsburgh, San Diego State, Temple, USF, Tennessee State and UMass.

HEAD COACH TRENT MILES

A PROVEN PROGRAM-BUILDER, Trent Miles was introduced as Georgia State's second head football coach on Dec. 3, 2012 and charged with the task of building the fledgling program as it jumped to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) and the Sun Belt Conference.



Miles, a former assistant coach at Stanford, Notre Dame and Washington, demonstrated the ability to build a winning program in five seasons as the head coach at Indiana State. The remarkable rebuilding job he did there earned notice, and Georgia State President Mark P. Becker and then-Director of Athletics Cheryl L. Levick jumped at the chance to bring Miles to Atlanta following the retirement of Bill Curry, the program's head coach from its inception in 2008.

Taking over a Georgia State program that had been playing for just three seasons, Miles immediately began to lay the foundation to enable the Panthers to compete at the highest level of college football. Miles and his staff are building the program through recruiting, player development and the establishment of a winning culture, all within the framework of a strong family atmosphere.

Despite playing at the FBS level for the first time with an undermanned roster, Miles' first Georgia State team showed progress throughout the 2013 season. Taking Miles' mantra of "Pounding the Rock" to heart, the Panthers earned respect for their hard-nosed play and competitiveness throughout a challenging season.

Under Miles' tutelage, wide receiver and return specialist Albert Wilson earned all-conference and All-America recognition with a record-setting season in 2013. Following the season, Wilson became the first Georgia State player to earn an invitation to the prestigious National Football League Scouting Combine and then signed a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs. Miles also helped develop Ulrick John into an NFL prospect as the offensive tackle was drafted in the seventh round by the Indianapolis Colts, becoming the second draft pick in Georgia State's brief history.

Miles' emphasis on the total development of his student-athletes was in evidence as the Panthers earned the Sun Belt Conference's team academic award as the football program with highest grade point average in the league.

Miles' first head-coaching job was at his alma mater, Indiana State, where he took over a struggling program that had won just one game in the three seasons before his arrival in 2008. But it took just three years for him to produce a winning season, the first of three straight winning campaigns for Miles in Terre Haute.

After leading his 2010 Sycamores to a 6-5 mark for the school's first winning record since 1996, Miles was recognized as Missouri Valley Football Conference Coach of the Year. He was named a finalist for the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year honor.

Miles guided ISU to another winning season in 2011 and then a 7-4 record in 2012, including

a 5-3 mark in the MVFC. No Sycamore team had won more games since the 1984 squad on which Miles played, and the school's run of three straight winning seasons under Miles was the longest in Terre Haute since ISU had six straight from 1964-69.

Following the 2012 season, Miles was honored as the American Football Coaches Association Region Four Coach of the Year, earning that distinction for the second time in three seasons.

Throughout his career, Miles has coached on both sides of the ball and possesses more than 20 years of college coaching experience as well as one year as a National Football League assistant with the Green Bay Packers. As an offensive assistant for the Packers in 2000, Miles worked with wide receivers and quality control. He coached NFL All-Pro receiver Antonio Freeman.

In the seven years following at Stanford (wide receivers, 2001), Notre Dame (wide receivers, 2002-04) and Washington (running backs, 2005-07), Miles also coached and developed many talented skill players. Among his pupils were Stanford's Teyo Johnson, a second-round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2003, Notre Dame's Maurice Stovall and Arnaz Battle, both of whom went on to the NFL, Jeff Samardzija, an All-America wide receiver at Notre Dame who is now a Major League Baseball pitcher, and Louis Rankin, a 1,000-yard rusher at Washington.

Miles began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Indiana State (1987), New Mexico (1988-89) and Oklahoma (1990). While at New Mexico, one of his mentors was Marvin Lewis, now the head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals.

Miles moved to an assistant coaching position at Northern Illinois for four seasons, working with receivers (1991-93) and then defensive backs (1994). Miles then headed west for a two-year stint at Hawai'i, where he coached wide receivers (1995) and defensive backs (1996).

As wide receivers coach at Fresno State from 1997-99, Miles helped the Bulldogs to a share of the 1999 Mountain West Conference title and a berth in the Las Vegas Bowl. He also recruited and coached future NFL standout Bernard Berrian.

Miles, 51, is a native of Terre Haute, Ind., and a 1987 graduate of Indiana State with a degree in criminology. He was a wide receiver for the Sycamores from 1982-86, playing on the 1983 and 1984 squads that each won nine games and reached the FCS playoffs. The 1984 Sycamores were ranked No. 1 in the nation for much of the season, and that team was inducted into the Indiana State University Hall of Fame in 2002.

He is married to the former Bridget Hogan, and the couple has three daughters, Kaylee, Anna, and Charlie Elizabeth, and one son, Noah Michael.

Playing the first FBS game of the year, Georgia State roared back with 17 fourth-quarter points including Wil Lutz's game-winning 26-yard field goal with 4 seconds remaining for a 38-37 win over Abilene Christian at the Georgia Dome.

In his first game for Georgia State, quarterback Nick Arbuckle led the come-from-behind victory as he threw for 413 yards -- just one shy of the school record--on 31 of 47 passing with four touchdowns, which tied the GSU mark.

The Panthers' winning drive began at their own 19 with 2:41 on the clock and included a 56-yard scoring pass to Donovan Harden that was called back on a holding penalty. Arbuckle made the miscue a distant memory as he continued to push the Panthers down the field, twice converting on fourth down to keep the drive alive. On 4th-and-5 at the GSU 24, Arbuckle found Ruiz for 12 yards, and on 4th-and-19 at the GSU 27, he hit Blair for 24 yards out to midfield.

Arbuckle rushed 13 yards to the ACU 26 and then 17 yards to nine to set up the winning field goal.

Arbuckle tossed touchdowns to Joel Ruiz (34 yards and 9 yards), Avery Sweeting (41 yards) and LynQuez Blair (27 yards) while finishing one yard shy of tying the school record for passing yards.

In the fourth quarter, Arbuckle led GSU on scoring drives of 44 yards, 77 yards and the final drive of 72 yards, 30 yards of which he covered on the ground in the final 30 seconds.

Before Arbuckle helped GSU to 189 total yards in the fourth quarter, the Panthers had stalled, being outgained 132-75 in the third, including just five yards on the ground. During that stretch, Georgia State struggled without starting running back Krysten Hammon in the lineup after he suffered an injury early in the second period. Hammon, a true freshman, rushed for 60 yards on 10 carries in the opening half and finished with 74 yards on 13 attempts.

Hammon's return early in the fourth period along with linebacker Joseph Peterson's first career interception gave the Panthers life. Senior Lynquez Blair pulled GSU back within 30-28 with his first career touchdown reception as he caught a quick out and curled the first-down attempt up the middle for a 27-yard score.

Georgia State got its second score of the fourth quarter when Arbuckle hit Ruiz with a 9-yarder to cap a 77-yard drive and pull the Panthers within 37-35 with 4:31 to play. That was GSU's third scoring drive of at least 70 yards on the night.

Abilene Christian started the season's scoring with a 25-yard field to open the game and ended the first half with a 60-yard Cedric Gilbert catch and run for a score. The field goal was forced after GSU held on third down inside the 10-yard line, which was a common theme early on.

Georgia State got on the board for the first time this season with a five-play, 58-yard drive that took only 1:34 off the clock and ended with a 34-yard pass from Arbuckle to Ruiz.

The Panther defense played well in the first half, especially on third downs. On the crucial down, GSU limited ACU to just three conversions on eight attempts. The Panthers were 6 of 7 on third downs in the opening frame.

Georgia State led at halftime for the fourth time in five season-opening games, including the second straight year.

With 12:00 to play in the second quarter, Georgia State fullback Jonathan Lytle scored on a 2-yard run to give the Panthers a 14-3 advantage. A Wildcat pass interference penalty kept the drive alive and then Ruiz came to life again, exciting the crowd with a nifty leaping catch for 19 yards to the ACU 2.

GSU ended the half with a 302 to 243 advantage in yards, and had converted six of its seven third-down attempts. On the game, the Panthers combined for a school-record 566 total yards, including 153 on the ground. Hammon finished with 74 yards while Tyler Neal added 46.

Peterson led the way on defense with 11 tackles, a QB hurry and the interception while Bruce Dukes had eight tackles and a pass breakup.

Parker McKenzie led Abilene Christian with 403 passing yards by hitting 30 of 40 attempts with four touchdowns. Demarcus Thompson reeled in 156 receiving yards.

NOTING THE PANTHERS:

- Senior linebacker Jarrell Robinson had the best game of his career with four tackles for loss, including two sacks to tie the school record. He also broke up a pass.
- Senior LynQuez Blair recorded career bests with eight catches for 118 yards.
- Junior tight end Joel Ruiz, also playing his first game for Georgia State, had career highs with seven catches for 111 yards and two touchdowns.
- Sophomore Robert Davis added eight receptions, his career high, for 90 yards.
- Georgia State played 15 true freshmen during the 2013 season. This year it started with seven in the opening game including: G Alex Stoehr (in starting lineup), RB Krysten Hammon (in starting lineup), CB Chandon Sullivan, CB B.J. Clay, WR Glenn Smith, WR Todd Boyd and CB Antreal Allen.
- Nick Arbuckle, a junior college transfer, became the fifth different opening day starter at quarterback in five years for the Panthers after coming out of the huddle on the opening drive of the season.
- Arbuckle was a team captain before the game started and was joined for the coin toss by linebackers Joseph Peterson and Jarrell Robinson.

Tyler Rogers' 11-yard touchdown pass to Teldrick Morgan with 15 seconds to play capped a wild comeback as New Mexico State rallied for a 34-31 victory against Georgia State.

In the Panthers' second straight game that was decided in the final seconds, Georgia State fell to 1-1 on the year and 0-1 in Sun Belt play despite leading 24-10 early in the third quarter.

Rogers passed for 241 yards, including hitting Morgan with the winning strike as NMSU (2-0, 1-0 SBC) ended the game trailing just 456-435 in total offense after the late surge. Rogers also finished with three passing TDs including hitting Morgan for a 36-yarder in the third quarter and Joseph Matthews with a 5-yarder midway through the fourth.

The Aggies were under pressure in the final minutes as GSU took the lead with just 2:30 to play. Quarterback Nick Arbuckle scored on a 1-yard keeper to push Georgia State back in front 31-27.

New Mexico State methodically came back, moving down the field 83 yards in 12 plays to collect the winning score. The Aggies capitalized all day as they also took advantage of Panther turnovers. GSU lost two fumbles at key times and had an interception late in the first half, two of them that turned into NMSU points. The second fumble led to an Aggie 30-yard field goal to get within four points, and the interception late in the first half was returned 40 yards for a score to cut the Panthers' halftime lead to just seven.

Early on, it was all Georgia State as the Panthers raced to a 17-0 lead behind Arbuckle and running back Krysten Hammon. Arbuckle made big plays down the field early, hitting Donovan Harden for a 68-yard scoring pass to get GSU on the board and added a 51-yarder to Robert Davis for his first two completions. He finished hitting 21 of 37 pass attempts for 294 yards with a touchdown.

Hammon was a workhorse in his first full collegiate game, after showing glimpses early last week before being sidelined part of the second half with an injury. Hammon had 123 yards on 26 rushes and scored his first two career TDs.

The second scoring TD by the 5-7 Hammon came on a 54-yard scamper up the left sideline and helped him become the first freshman in school history to rush for more than 100 yards in a game. He also scored on an 8-yard run early in the second quarter and helped GSU to 162 rushing yards as a team.

NOTING THE PANTHERS:

- Nick Arbuckle's 68-yard scoring pass to Donovan Harden was the eighth longest play from scrimmage, and the seventh longest pass play in school history. The strike was also the seventh longest TD play since the program began in 2010.
- Krysten Hammon rushed for 123 yards and two scores. He was the first freshman in school history to rush for 100 yards in a game, and his 54-yard run was the third-longest scoring run in school history and tied for the fourth-longest rush overall. It was the 11th 100-yard game in program history.
- Joseph Peterson recorded 15 tackles, one off his school record of 16 set last year against Troy.
- Safety Bryan Williams had eight tackles, an interception -- the first of his career -- and a fumble recovery. Georgia State forced three turnovers on the game.
- Captains for the game were Nick Arbuckle, Joseph Peterson and Shawayne Lawrence.

AIR FORCE 48, GEORGIA STATE 38

**Game 3: Sept. 13, 2014 • 2 p.m. (ESPN3)
 Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga.**

Air Force won a high-flying affair in the Georgia Dome as the Falcons eased to a 48-38 victory against host Georgia State. The 86 combined points were the most ever in a Panther game since GSU started its program started in 2010.

In their first home game against a non-conference FBS opponent, the Panthers kept clawing back, pulling within 45-31 early in the fourth quarter on LynQuez Blair's second touchdown reception of the game. Blair hauled in TD passes of 15 and 13 yards while finishing with five catches for 74 yards.

Blair's other score came midway through the third quarter as he helped GSU cut the deficit to 31-17. The teams then traded scores the rest of the way with GSU outscoring Air Force 28-17 in the second half.

The run-oriented Falcons finished with 539 yards of total offense, including 315 on the ground. Air Force made the difference in the passing game where quarterback Kale Pearson was more than efficient, finishing 12 of 15 for 224 yards and two scores through the air. He also ran for just five yards on nine attempts, and added a pair of rushing touchdowns despite running for only five yards on nine carries.

Pearson's second rushing score put Air Force ahead with its largest lead of the game at 38-17 before the Panthers rallied.

Georgia State outgained the Falcons by 10 yards, putting up 549 yards of total offense, the second-highest total in school history. The air game was a large part of that as it was working well behind quarterback Nick Arbuckle. The junior signal-caller finished 26 of 42 in the air, surpassing 1,000 passing

yards for the season in just three games. He tossed a pair of TD strikes in the contest and ran for a 1-yard score as the Panthers fell to 1-2 on the season.

Arbuckle's last completion was a 73-yard catch-and-run to Kyle Neal, and helped Arbuckle tie the school single-game mark for passing yards with 414. He had finished one yard shy of the record with 413 yards in the season-opening victory against Abilene Christian.

When Arbuckle wasn't pushing the ball down the field through the air, the Panther ground game was effective with first-time starter Neal in the backfield. He had a career high rushing yards in the first half and finished with 80 yards on 10 carries to go along with his three catches for 91 yards.

Neal had the Panthers' first scoring play on a 25-yard rush in the second quarter, one of three rushing scores for GSU on the day. Along with Neal and Arbuckle, Duvall Smith crossed the goal line on the ground, scoring from 2 yards out with the final points of the game with 4:57 to play.

NOTING THE PANTHERS:

- The contest was the highest-scoring game in Georgia State history with 86 combined points. The previous record was 80 points in the GSU-Old Dominion (ODU 53, GSU 27) contest in 2012.
- RB Kyle Neal had his first career score on a career-long 25-yard run, as he rushed around the left end to pull GSU within 14-7 with 12:49 remaining in the second quarter.
- Neal also hauled in a pass he turned into an impressive 73-yard catch-and-run to set up the Panthers' last score. It was the seventh longest play from scrimmage in school history, and the sixth longest pass play.
- RB Duvall Smith also had a career-long rush as he reeled off a 32-yarder in the third quarter that set up the Panthers' second touchdown. Smith also had a fourth-down conversion late in the third period to keep a GSU drive alive in its own territory. Smith finished with a career-best 50 yards on six carries including his first rushing touchdown.
- LB Joseph Peterson's 200th career tackle came on special teams as he bolted out of the left side to cut the returner short, breaking the school record originally set by Robert Ferguson. He finished with 13 total tackles on the day and has 207 tackles in his three-year Panther career.
- TE Joel Ruiz and WR Donovan Harden each finished with at least 90 yards receiving (95 and 90, respectively), marking the second time in three games this year a pair of Panther receivers had at least 90 yards through the air.
- PK Wil Lutz recorded his 100th career point during the contest and now has 102 points for his career. He ranks first among placekickers and is second overall in the Panther record book. He trails only Albert Wilson, who owns school record with 156 points.
- Game captains were Joel Ruiz, Sean Jeppesen and Joseph Peterson.

WASHINGTON 45, GEORGIA STATE 14

A strong first half staked Georgia State to a 14-0 lead at Washington, but the undefeated Huskies scored 45 unanswered points in the second half en route to a 45-14 victory Saturday afternoon at Husky Stadium.

Georgia State took a 14-0 lead into the locker room after quarterback Nick Arbuckle passed for 184 yards and two touchdowns in the second

quarter.

With the Panthers still (1-3) leading 14-7 late in the third quarter, Washington (4-0) tied the game on Cyler Miles' 10-yard touchdown pass to Kendyl Taylor.

On the first play of Georgia State's ensuing possession, Arbuckle hit Avery Sweeting for a short gain. Sweeting appeared to be down at the GSU 25, but the play was ruled a fumble and Washington took over. Four plays later, Miles found Kasen Williams for a 3-yard touchdown, giving the Huskies a 21-14 lead with 2:25 to play in the third quarter.

Georgia State dominated the first half, outgaining the Huskies 231-73. The Panthers ran 48 plays to 27 for Washington and controlled the clock for 21 minutes.

Late in a scoreless first quarter, the Panthers took possession at midfield. Arbuckle found Donovan Harden for 21 yards and Avery Sweeting for 24 to move to the UW 5-yard line. Three plays later, Arbuckle connected with tight end Keith Rucker for a 2-yard touchdown to give Georgia State a 7-0 lead with 13:42 remaining in the second quarter.

After another Washington punt, the Panthers were pinned at their own 9-yard line but marched down the field behind the passing of Arbuckle and the running of Kyle Neal. On 3rd-and-4 at the GSU 26, Arbuckle connected with Donovan Harden for 13 yards and then found Robert Davis for 17 yards to the Washington 44. He converted on 3rd-and-7 at the UW 24 with a 12-yard completion to LynQuez Blair. After Neal picked up three yards on first down, the Georgia State quarterback finished the drive with hitting Davis for a 9-yard scoring pass with 47 seconds left in the half. The Davis touchdown, his first of the season, capped a 13-play, 91-yard drive that chewed up 6:31 on the clock.

Washington came alive in the third quarter, aided by excellent field position provided by Dante Pettis, who returned four punts for 98 yards. The Huskies started four third-quarter possessions in Georgia State territory.

NOTING THE PANTHERS:

- Arbuckle completed 21-of-33 passes for 194 yards but threw three interceptions, including one tipped ball that was returned by John Timu 35 yards for a score.
- Harden finished with a season-high seven catches for 64 yards, while Sweeting, Davis and Blair had four catches each.
- Neal carried 16 times for 57 yards but missed much of the second half due to injury.
- Junior linebacker Joseph Peterson led the Panthers with 14 tackles, including two sacks. Making his first career start at linebacker, Trey Payne had a career-high 13 tackles, one tackle for loss and a forced fumble.

UL LAFAYETTE 34, GEORGIA STATE 31

Game 5: Oct. 4, 2014 • 7 p.m. (ESPN3)

UL Lafayette scored the go-ahead touchdown with 3:34 left and then held on for a 34-31 victory over Georgia State in a back-and-forth Sun Belt Conference game Saturday night at Cajun Field.

Georgia State (1-4, 0-2 Sun Belt) took a 31-28 lead with 6:35 to play on Marcus Caffey's 2-yard touchdown run, his school-record third score of the day, but the Ragin' Cajuns (2-3, 1-0 Sun Belt) answered on Terrance Broadway's 21-yard touchdown pass to Jamal Robinson. One play earlier, the Panthers had a chance to sack backup quarterback Brooks Haack on third down at the GSU 43, but the 6-1, 219-pounder shook off the tackle and flung the ball to sideline, where Al Riles made a diving catch that was ruled just in bounds.

But UL Lafayette missed the extra point, leaving Georgia State down 34-31 with 3:34 to play. The Panthers took over on the 25, and after Caffey gained eight yards on first down, two crucial penalties nullified gains, including a 30-yard pass to LynQuez Blair at the ULL 42. On 4th-and-6, Nick Arbuckle hit Robert Davis across the middle but he was tackled short of the first down with a minute left.

"We're right there, and we keep getting bit by lack of execution at crucial times. We haven't figured out how to win, and that's my job to get these kids to do that," head coach Trent Miles said. "Hats off to Louisiana Lafayette. When they had to stop us at the end, they did. Our kids are playing hard, they're fighting their tails off, and it's my job to make sure they learn how to win."

Playing his first game at running back after moving to offense this week, Caffey carried the ball a GSU-record 27 times for 90 yards and scored three touchdowns on runs of 12, one and two yards. He is the first Panther to rush for three touchdowns in a game. Duvall Smith added a 1-yard scoring run for the Panthers.

Arbuckle completed 19 of 27 passes for 276 yards with no interceptions. Davis finished with six catches for 63 yards, while Donovan Harden had four receptions for 91 yards, and Joel Ruiz added catches four for 75 yards.

The game featured seven lead changes. UL Lafayette jumped to a 7-0 lead on its opening possession on a 54-yard touchdown run by Elijah McGuire. Georgia State countered with two long touchdown drives, a 91-yard march capped by Smith's 1-yard run, and then a 96-yard drive that resulted in a Caffey's 12-yard run that gave the Panthers a 14-7 lead with five minutes left in the first half.

After ULL tied the game on Broadway's 19-yard touchdown pass to Robinson, Wil Lutz booted a 48-yard field goal on the final play of the first half sent the Panthers into the locker room with a 17-14 advantage.

The Ragin' Cajuns took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove 75 yards for Alonzo Harris' 1-yard touchdown run and a 21-17 lead.

Arbuckle connected with Harden for a 62-yard gain down to the 1-yard line, and then Caffey took it in for his second score of the day as Georgia State regained the lead at 24-21 with two minutes left in the third quarter.

After UL Lafayette answered with another 1-yard touchdown run by Harris to lead 28-24 with 11 minutes to play, Arbuckle led the Panthers on a 10-play, 75-yard drive. Caffey again found the end zone from two yards out, and Georgia State led 31-28 with 6:35 to play.

ARKANSAS STATE 52, GEORGIA STATE 10

Game 6: Oct. 11, 2014 • 2 p.m. (ESPN3)
Georgia Dome • Atlanta, Ga. • Homecoming

Arkansas State jumped ahead early and never looked back as the Red Wolves rolled to a 52-10 victory against Georgia State during the Panthers' Homecoming game on Saturday at the Georgia Dome.

A-State amassed a 618-269 advantage in total offense. It was the second-most yards the Panthers had given up in a Sun Belt game and the fifth time in program history an opponent had gained 600 or more yards.

Michael Gordon led the way, rushing 18 times for 188 yards – including 150 in the first half -- while punching in a pair of touchdowns. He and quarterback Fredi Knighten carried the load literally, gaining more than 280 combined yards on the ground on 30 carries.

Knighten got the Red Wolves moving, easily taking them down the field on the Red Wolves' first four drives, each resulting in a score. Knighten threw a touchdown pass on the opening drive and after a field goal, Gordon burst up the middle for a 50-yard TD run to open a 17-point lead. The last score of the stretch was a 2-yard touchdown pass from Knighten to Kenneth Rains for a 24-0 advantage on the final play of the first quarter.

Georgia State mounted its only scoring drive of the opening half late in the frame, ending at 4:05 to play in the second period on Wil Lutz's 28-yard field goal. The drive began as the Panther defense came up big with Trey Payne recovering a fumble at the ASU 28. Quarterback Nick Arbuckle scrambled for 10 yards to move the Panthers early before the drive stalled on third down inside the 10-yard line to set up the kick, which capped a nine-play, 18-yard drive.

A-State added another score 35 seconds later on Johnston White's 13-yard rush to make it 31-3 Arkansas State at halftime. Gordon set up that touchdown with a 53-yard rush, his second run of at least 50 yards on the day. Knighten also got in the mix with a 51-yard rush of his own to score the first touchdown of the second half for a 45-3 lead with 4:43 to play in the third quarter.

The Red Wolves' defense pressured Georgia State all day, repeatedly forcing the Panther offense into difficult situations behind nine tackles for loss by the Red Wolves. Arbuckle came into the game ranked among the top 15 passers in the country with 318.2 passing yards per game over the first five contests. On Saturday, the junior college transfer completed just 18 of 36 attempts for 162 yards.

The offensive output was uncommon for the Panthers this year, who had scored at least 31 points each game at home this season. Saturday ended with just 10 points as backup quarterback Ben McLane led a fourth-quarter drive for the only GSU touchdown. He tossed a 31-yard completion to Joel Brooks at the A-State 2 to set up a Gerald Howse touchdown to cap a drive that took 6:06 off the clock.

Georgia State returns to action next weekend when it hits the road to play at South Alabama on Saturday, Oct. 18. Kickoff is set for 7:30 p.m. ET and the game will be seen on ESPN3 and heard on 1340 the Fan 3 and 88.5 FM.

NOTING THE PANTHERS:

- Dontavis Crocker made his first career start, opening the game at running back. He finished with 10 carries for 27 yards after coming into the game with three carries for six yards on the season.
- RB Gerald Howse also had his best game of the season, coming in late to rush 11 times for a career-best 29 yards and scored the Panthers' only touchdown of the game.
- A pair of true freshmen made their debuts for the Panthers as linebackers James Traylor and Malik Ricks saw the first action of their careers. Traylor recovered a fumble in the fourth quarter and had seven tackles, while Ricks recorded one tackle.
- Game captains for Georgia State were TE Keith Rucker, QB Nick Arbuckle, and LB Joe Peterson.

SOUTH ALABAMA 30, GEORGIA STATE 27

Game 7: Oct. 18, 2014 • 7:30 p.m. (ESPN3)

Nick Arbuckle passed for 311 yards and three touchdowns, two of them to Donovan Harden, to give Georgia State a fourth-quarter lead, but South Alabama scored the winning touchdown with four minutes left for a 30-27 victory at Ladd-Peebles Stadium.

Georgia State (1-6, 0-4 Sun Belt) suffered its third Sun Belt Conference loss by three points. In each game, the Panthers scored a go-ahead touchdown

in the fourth quarter and held the lead in the final five minutes.

“Our kids came in here and battled, and we had opportunities to win the game, but give South Alabama credit. They stepped up and did it at the end when they had to,” Georgia State head coach Trent Miles said. “Our kids are battling their tails off, and we are going to start winning football games. I don’t know when it’s going to happen, but it will. I’m proud of our football team.”

With Georgia State trailing 23-21, Arbuckle led the Panthers on an 11-play, 76-yard drive, capped by Duvall Smith’s 1-yard touchdown run. The key play on the drive was an Arbuckle-to-Robert Davis completion for 29 yards down the sideline to the USA 16-yard line. After a pass interference penalty gave Georgia State first-and-goal at the two, Smith punched it in on third down, giving the Panthers a 27-23 lead with 9:48 left.

The GSU defense forced a punt and the Panthers managed one first down, but a sack—South Alabama’s (4-2, 3-1 Sun Belt) fifth of the day—derailed the drive. Georgia State had to punt, and the Jaguars took over at their own 15-yard line with five minutes left.

On South Alabama’s first play, quarterback Brandon Bridge, who rushed for 137 yards on the night, ran 65 yards down to the GSU 20. On the next snap, the ball came loose and Georgia State recovered, but running back Jay Jones was ruled down, and after review, the call stood.

One play later, Bridge hit Danny Woodson for an 18-yard touchdown to put the Jaguars ahead 30-27 with 4:02 remaining.

After a short kickoff and pass interference penalty, Georgia State had a first down at the South Alabama 41. A run on first down and two incomplete passes made it 4th-and-9, and Arbuckle, forced to scramble, gained six yards but was tackled shy of the first down.

South Alabama drove for a touchdown on its first possession, the Panthers answered by driving 66 yards on five plays. On first down at midfield, Arbuckle found Harden down the left sideline for the 44-yard touchdown, tying the game at 7-all midway through the first quarter.

A Georgia State fumble gave the Jaguars the ball at the GSU 45, but the Panthers defense forced a 43-yard field goal, and South Alabama led 10-7 with three minutes to play in the first quarter.

Georgia State drove down the field for a first-and-goal inside the five, but Arbuckle was stopped just short on fourth down at the 1-yard line. But the Georgia State defense forced a three-and-out, and the Panthers regained possession at the 50. This time, the Panthers punched it in as Arbuckle hit Ruiz on third down for a 1-yard scoring pass and a 14-10 lead that Georgia State took into the locker room.

South Alabama struck first in the second half, moving ahead 17-14 on Bridge’s 15-yard touchdown pas to Shavarez Smith, but Georgia State answered with a 75-play drive. Harden caught his second touchdown of the day on a five-yard completion from Arbuckle.

The Georgia State defense then forced field goal attempts on the Jaguars next three possessions, and Aleem Sunanon made two of them to South Alabama ahead 23-21 early in the fourth quarter.

NOTING THE PANTHERS

• Donovan Harden had his best game in a Georgia State uniform with a career-high 10 catches for 132 yards, including touchdown receptions of 44 and five yards. His 10 receptions are one shy of the Georgia State record of 11 (Danny Williams vs. Old Dominion in 2010). His 132 yards receiving are

five yard shy of his career best, set when he was at Illinois State.

• Robert Davis finished with four catches for 108 yards (two yards shy of his career high), giving the Panthers two 100-yard receivers in the same game for the second time this season and the fifth time in school history.

• Gerald Howse rushed for a career-high 53 yards in his first start since the 2013 season opener. Howse is the fifth different running back to start this season.

• Georgia State’s drive for the go-ahead touchdown in the fourth quarter covered 76 yards, the Panthers’ 15th touchdown drive of the season of 70 or more yards.
